

Russia Expected To Take 'Tough' Stand at Geneva

MOSCOW (U) — Are the Russians going to take a tough line at the Big Four summit meeting in Geneva? Increasing signs in Moscow say the answer is yes.

For one thing, Premier Nikolai Bulganin has been briefed for many weeks by key Russian policy makers in preparation for his talks with President Eisenhower, Prime

Ike Calls for Demo Backing Of Legislation

WASHINGTON (U) — President Eisenhower Wednesday challenged the Democrat-controlled Congress to pass more of his legislation.

The President said with some warmth that he stands behind his program for a 10-year highway construction program, to be financed in part by a bond issue, "just as strongly as I was when it was organized."

He sharply disagreed that his plan for an atomic-powered exhibit ship to tour the world would be a waste of money. That was an argument used by Democrats Tuesday in the Senate when they defeated his proposal 42-41.

Eisenhower seemed a little exasperated about what has happened to his "peace ship" and his highway program—which the Senate has ditched in favor of a five-year plan pushed by Sen. Gore (D-Tenn).

Joking Answers

However, he good humoredly joked around the question of whether he will run again in 1956.

And he mixed a little humor with gravity when asked about the statement Tuesday of Sen. Lyndon Johnson of Texas, the Senate Democratic leader, that last year's Eisenhower prediction of a Congress-White House cold war has not panned out.

When the question came up, Eisenhower set off laughter by pulling a sheet of paper from his pocket and saying: "You have just given me a big chance to read a little list of legislation I want."

Reserve Plan

At the top of the list he put his request for a law to create a stronger military reserve—"This is vital to all of us. Why are we fooling around about it?"

He ticked off others, which Congress has not completed action on, or has altered from the form he sought:

Military survivor benefits, housing legislation, health program, school construction, a mutual security authorization and appropriation, amendments to the refugee act, water resources projects, customs simplification, minimum wage and other labor bills, the atomic ship and Hawaiian statehood.

Thousands Quit Indiana Town in Evacuation Test

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (U) — Thousands of people rode casually out of South Bend Wednesday in the nation's first evacuation test of a large, cross-sectional population.

Estimates of the size of the voluntary exodus varied. Civil defense officials thought as many as 35,000 left town, but newsmen put the figure at closer to 18,000 or 20,000.

Air spotters estimated the number of vehicles involved at about 8,000.

Civil defense, recording the operation as a success, said it took less than 40 minutes to get all the evacuees out of town.

Burma Premier Gives Check to Ike

WASHINGTON (U) — Prime Minister U Nu of Burma opened a four-day official visit to Washington Wednesday with an unusual gesture.

He presented President Eisenhower with a check for \$5,000 for the children of U. S. servicemen who were killed or injured in the liberation of Burma from Japanese occupation forces during World War II.

Oregon State Gets Fish Research Job

WASHINGTON (U) — The Interior Department announced Wednesday it had entered into contracts totaling \$705,000 for fishery research and marketing development projects.

Oregon State College was given \$50,000 for study of the economics of fish distribution on the Pacific Coast.

Western observers here say the west should be warned not to expect the Belgrade atmosphere at Geneva. When Bulganin and Soviet Communist Party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev visited Yugoslavia President Tito in Belgrade last month Khrushchev apologized publicly for the way in which the Cominform had kicked out Tito's Communist Party in 1948.

Tells of Adenauer

The Communist Party newspaper Pravda Tuesday told off West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer. In effect it said he need not come to Moscow at all under the Soviet invitation June 7 if he thought he was coming with preconditions. It added that "preconditions and a policy of negotiating from strength are doomed to failure."

The same kind of notice is expected to be served soon on the Japanese, who have been driving a hard bargain in negotiations in London with Russian representatives over war prisoners and territory lost in World War II. The London talks were initiated in an effort to agree on a Japanese-Russian peace treaty.

Can the Russians carry through a tough policy at Geneva, with their manifold economic problems at home and the situation in the "people's democracies" and China? Maybe they can't, but it's a good bet they are going to try.

Furthermore, the Russians think they are making headway, especially since India's Prime Minister Nehru on his recent visit to Moscow signed a joint declaration with Bulganin calling for handing over Formosa to the Chinese Reds and for banning even experimentation with nuclear bombs.

There is another indication here of the careful preparations for Geneva—Bulganin, Khrushchev, and First Deputy Premier A. I. Mikoyan have been very circumspect at public parties. Nobody has been tossing drinks around lately.

Khrushchev told this correspondent at the Czech National Day party two months ago Bulganin would represent the Soviet Union at the summit parley and that Khrushchev himself need not go along.

The Belgrade visit is now over. The official Soviet news agency Tass carried only one paragraph Tuesday on Tito's announcement he had accepted an invitation to come to Russia. Nehru's acceptance got reams of copy. It seems a buildup for a tough policy at Geneva.

Clearance for Swiss Rocket Expert Denied

WASHINGTON (U) — The Navy said Wednesday it has withdrawn security clearance from Dr. Fritz Zwicky, a top expert in rocket and jet propulsion, because he has not declared his intention to become an American citizen.

This means Zwicky, a Swiss, will be barred from research projects he originated.

The Navy said it would reconsider the question if the scientist changes his mind. In Pasadena, Calif., Zwicky said he has not sought U. S. citizenship because he felt that as a Swiss he could travel about the world with fewer restrictions and thereby better fight Communism.

A professor of astrophysics at California Institute of Technology and a director of the Aerojet Corp., he founded Aerojet's research department in rocket and jet fuels in 1943 and has continued to head it. The scientist came to the United States in 1925 as a research fellow at Caltech, where he has remained since.

Chicago Man Said Bilking Lumberjack

CHICAGO (U) — A federal grand jury Wednesday indicted a Chicago factory worker for bilking a West Coast lumberjack of \$25,000 over a 14-year period.

Named in the bill returned before U.S. District Judge John P. Barnes was Sidney Francis, 53. Bond of \$1,000 was set for Francis. A warrant for his arrest also was issued.

The government charged Francis wrote a series of 36 letters over a 14-year period to persuade Ewart Emms, now lumberjacking at Keasey, Ore., to advance him money. The government said Francis assured Emms that he soon would inherit a huge fortune from his mother but needed money to tide him over. Francis promised Emms repayment with interest, the indictment said.

Emms told the government he sent Francis money from lumber camps in South Dakota, Montana, California, Oregon and Washington. Emms said he now works for the Long Bell Lumber Co. in Camp Olsen, Keasey, Ore.

Emms became suspicious a year ago and employed a private detective to investigate. The detective learned Francis' mother died in 1942 without leaving any property.

Emms and Francis became acquainted, the government said, when Francis made a trip west in 1940.

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Merger Trend Continues in Paper Industry

NEW YORK (U) — The big merger trend in the nation's paper industry was stepped up Wednesday when two of the largest manufacturers in the field moved toward major acquisitions.

Crown Zellerbach Corp., San Francisco, largest Western producer of printing, wrapping and special papers, and Gaylor Container Corp., St. Louis paperboard maker, announced that they had reached an agreement in principle on a merger of the two concerns.

St. Regis Paper Co., a 200-million dollar enterprise, and General Container Corp., Cleveland, said St. Regis had been granted options to acquire a majority of the holdings of the General Container capital stock. If this transaction is carried off, it will be St. Regis' fourth acquisition in a little more than one year.

The agreement on a possible merger of Crown Zellerbach and Gaylor Container was announced jointly by J. D. Zellerbach, C-Z president, and Edwin J. Spiegel, Gaylor's president, on behalf of their boards of directors.

They said it had been agreed in principle that C-Z may make an offer to Gaylor share owners to exchange two shares of presently authorized but unissued C-Z common stock for each three shares of Gaylor outstanding.

PORTLAND (U) — The Valselt Lumber Co. Wednesday announced purchase of the Heppner Lumber Co., Elgin, Ore., and its timber holdings.

Ike Considering Participation in Oregon Campaign

WASHINGTON (U) — President Eisenhower reportedly promised serious consideration Wednesday to an invitation to participate in Oregon's 1956 senatorial campaign.

Wendell Wyatt, Oregon Republican chairman, and Rep. Norblad (R-Ore) presented the invitation.

Sen. Wayne Morse, elected as a Republican, has announced he will run as a Democrat next year. Wyatt reported that he and Norblad also urged President Eisenhower to back "partnership" construction of the proposed Green Peter Dam.

Sulmonetti New Judge

Alfred T. Sulmonetti, 34-year-old Portland lawyer, Wednesday was appointed a circuit judge of Multnomah county by Gov. Paul L. Patterson.

Sulmonetti succeeds Judge Lowell Mundorff, who died of a heart attack at his home in Portland last week.

Sulmonetti, a partner in the law firm of Feike & Sulmonetti, is a graduate of Drake University law school. He was judge advocate for the Oregon department of the American Legion, and a member of the mayor's interracial committee, board of managers of the YMCA, and the First Christian Church of Portland. Sulmonetti has a wife and two daughters.

No Campfire Permits Needed

PORTLAND (U) — Campers in Oregon won't need campfire permits this year, but starting July 1 they'll be required to carry fire tools and to douse their cigarettes while traveling on secondary roads.

The regional fire control officer of the U. S. Forest Service announced Wednesday that permits will still be needed for burning trash or other forest debris.

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Marine Corps Cut Restored

WASHINGTON (U) — Senate House conferees rejected the administration's plans for a smaller Marine Corps Wednesday when they agreed on a defense program totalling nearly 32 billion dollars.

Rebuffing both President Eisenhower and his military advisers, the conference committee put an additional 46 million in the bill to keep the Marines at a strength of 215,000 men.

The bill, a compromise of earlier House and Senate versions, provides defense funds for the fiscal year beginning Friday.
