Church Meet Lecturer Asks Tie Kept to 'Curtain' Churches

Militant communism, growing nationalism and resurgent paganism were pictured Thursday as factors which present new problems to Christian missionary work in the world today.

The speaker was Dr. Jack Finegan, professor of New Testament at the Pacific School of Religion, who is delivering morning and evening lectures each day during the annual assembly of the Oregon Christian Missionary Convention in Turner.

More than 1,000 had registered by Thursday with final attendance expected to be about 3,000 before the conference closes Sunday.

Finegan's speech stressed the fact that churches still exist behind the iron and bamboo curtain and that "we as Christians, must maintain contact with these churches in every way possible" to keep them alive.

Russia, he said, has learned that it cannot eradicate religion so it has compromised, allowing it to exist but instilling youth with anti-church beliefs hoping that churches will eventually wither away.

Missionary work in the foreign field, the speaker said, is now in a period of transition with restrictions being placed on entry of new missionaries in nationalistic-minded nations such as India. One result of this is that leadership of mission work abroad is being assumed more and more by natives.

Third factor affecting mission work, Finegan said, is revitalization of eastern religions—Hinduism, Islam, and Buddhism.

The assembly program today, Saturday and Sunday will include reports from various Christian church organizations, song and prayer services, and reports from missionaries in the field. Church business sessions will be held today and Saturday.

Sites Offered For Portland State Hospital

The Board of Control, which ran into lots of trouble before it bought the site for the new State Reformatory to be built north of Salem, is pleasantly surprised that it's smooth sailing for the proposed mental hospital in the Portland area.

Whenever the board considered a site for the reformatory, the farmers in that area protested violently.

But everybody seems to want the mental hospital built near his land.

The committee which is selecting the site will meet in Portland next Thursday, probably to make a recommendation.

"They have four excellent offers of sites, and two others that would be satisfactory," Col. William Ryan, supervisor of institutions, said.

All are west of Portland except for one near Oregon City.

The Board of Control has to pick a name for the hospital.

The Legislature considered a bill to call it Portland State Hospital. But the idea was dropped because of protests by supporters of Portland State College.

They said that if a young person told you he was going to Portland State, how would you know whether he's going to college or the mental hospital?

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Wreck Brings \$25,000 Suit

A \$25,000 damage suit for injuries allegedly resulting from a two-car accident at the intersection of North Summer and Union streets was filed Thursday in Marion County Circuit Court.

Idell Hedges, plaintiff, brought the suit against George A. Hill, the driver of the car in which she was a passenger, and Thomas M. Knight, operator of the second car. The collision happened July 4, 1953.

Both are charged with negligence. Hill was westbound on Union and allegedly failed to stop for a stop sign. Knight, who was going south on Summer, is charged with driving too fast and with failure to keep a proper lookout.

Jury Frees Salem Man of Turkey Count

Jack A. Shoemaker was found innocent Thursday afternoon by a Marion County Circuit Court jury which had heard testimony on an embezzlement by bailee charge against him for 3½ days. Shoemaker, 1165 Chemeketa St., was accused of converting 1,468 turkeys, consigned to him by Arnold Selnes, Turner, to his own use. He was indicted by the grand jury in May and pleaded innocent June 13. The jury deliberated about two hours before bringing in the verdict.

The case was heard before Judge Val D. Sloper.

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
