Final Logging Contests Due At Carnival

ALBANY—Two days of preliminary logging contests will be climaxed Monday in championship events during closing hours of the Albany Timber Carnival.

Crowds jammed the carnival grounds Sunday to view the log-rolling, bucking, climbing, chopping and other contests and events.

A water show will begin at noon Monday at Waverly Lake, followed by the championship logging events at 1:15 p.m. A water show will start at 7 p.m. and the carnival will end with a fireworks display at 9:30 p.m.

Contests and leading competitors include:

Log-rolling — Defending champion Eddie Herron of Kelo, Wash.; J. Wickheim, Sooke, B.C.; Larry Cooper and Jim Herron of Longview, Wash.; Sam Harris and Harley Michele of Kelo, and Bob Harrison of Eureka, Calif.

Log bucking — Leading is Phil Whittaker of Duncan, B.C., defending world's champion with time of 2:06.2 minutes.

Speed climbing — Defending champion Danny Sailor of Winchester Bay, B.C., leading with time of 36.2 seconds which broke his own previous record of 37.1.

Chopping — Defending champion Gus Russell of Otis has leading time of 57.10 seconds.

Axe throwing — Tied are Gus Russell, Andy Balmer of Victoria, B.C.; Stan Lyon of Albany, and Kon Kaelin of Tacoma, Wash.

A special event, the topping of a 100-foot spar, will also take place Monday. Defending six-year champion is Harold Johnson of Morton, Wash.
