

U.N. Truce Command Bars Newsmen From Red Meeting in Korea

PANMUNJOM (U)—The U.N. Command Tuesday barred Allied Newsmen, over their protests, from accepting a rare Communist invitation to a news conference in the 1000-yard circular joint security area here.

The refusal came after the command told the Reds in some of the strongest language it ever used at a Military Armistice Commission (MAC) meeting that their recent "sweet talk" and "peaceful propaganda" was in marked contrast to "your continued willful and flagrant violation of the (Korean) truce agreement."

Two Murderesses Observing 20th Anniversary of Slaying

CHICAGO (U)—Shortly after dinner Tuesday night two women went into solitary confinement for 24 hours to observe the 20th anniversary of a murder for which they are serving 100-year sentences.

Evelyn Smith, now 66, and Blanche Dunkel, 64, were convicted in 1935 of the murder of Ervin J. Lang, 28, Mrs. Dunkel's son-in-law.

In sentencing them to long imprisonment, Judge Cornelius J. Harrington specified that the women spend each anniversary of the crime in solitary confinement.

This provision of the sentence was carried out annually at the until last year. Then, the attorney general's office ruled that the order need not be followed.

However, last month the attorney general's office reversed itself and notified prison officials to resume the once-a-year solitary confinement. At their trial, testimony indicated that Lang was slain after

Picket Line Appears at Lyons Plant

LYONS — AFL workers threw up a picket line at the huge Lyons Plywood division plant of the M and M Woodworking company here Tuesday as the strike over a contract dispute entered its sixth day.

Some 1,500 M and M workers at four plants—Albany, Portland, Lyons and Eureka, Calif.—remained off the job but a fifth operation of the company continued unaffected. The Idanha "Cold Deck" which supplies logs to the Lyons operation was "up" despite persistent reports that it, too, was struck.

The dispute over contract conditions came to a head Thursday at midnight when a union representative said members refused to work without a new pact.

Pickets, making their first appearance since the strike was voted Friday morning, were on duty at both entrances to the plant here. The pickets sat in cars and did no marching. Only sign of a strike banner was a small plywood sign at each entrance which announced M and M was "Unfair to Organized Labor, Local No. 2896."

There were no signs of a settlement to the dispute.

The union said their members are willing to sign an agreement similar to the one which expired. The company, it has been reported, wants conditions included regarding vacation periods and inclusion in the contract of all side agreements.

Cons Hand Mandate To Prison Officials

WALLA WALLA (U)—Rebellious convicts, virtually in control of the Washington State Penitentiary her Tuesday night, gave Dr. Thomas A. Harris, director of institutions, a statement demanding a shake-up of parole and classification procedures and other prison practices.

Earlier, the convicts met in conference with Dr. Harris. Dr. Harris said the ringleaders complained about their representation on the inmate council and said they had not had fair hearings in the disciplinary court. They also complained of the nature of the discipline meted out.

The ringleaders set a 24-hour deadline for improvement of treatment by custodial personnel. Deadline set.

The deadline was set in the conference with Harris, who met with the revolt leaders six hours after the hostages were seized at knife point.

Of the hostages, one of whom was badly beaten, were released but the others were being held in some remote cellblock. Aside from the brief angry outburst which damaged some kitchen implements, the revolt was marked by no particular violence, although half of the 1,784 prisoners in the institution were in the affected area.

Cells in the revolt area were opened by the 33 men who led the original revolt but the men in those wards were reported to be calmly walking about and maintaining discipline.

No attempt was made to leave the prison grounds and at 3 p.m., three of the ringleaders walked boldly across a prison court to meet with Dr. Harris.

List of Grievances
Three hours later, the director reported the men had control of approximately 50 per cent of the prisoners and the physical plant. "They have presented a list of grievances dealing mainly with their treatment by the custodial personnel," Dr. Harris said. "The plan at the present time is to meet individually with a large group of the inmates to hear their grievances as part of a plan for release of the hostages and return of control of the prison to the authorities."

Learn to Swim Classes Begin Here July 11

Registration for Salem's "Learn to Swim Campaign" will begin Monday, July 11, the same day classes start at the city's two pools, Leslie and Olinger.

The swim lessons are sponsored by the Salem City and School Playgrounds office and the Marion County Chapter of the Red Cross.

The classes will start a week later this year than last in an effort to avoid wet weather, according to Vernon Gilmore, recreation director. Classes will be held each week day through July 22.

A water safety instructor's preliminary course will be offered this year to those over 18 years old who hold a current lifesaver's certificate. Gilmore said. The course will prepare students for an instructor's course scheduled for July 25-29. This course will be instructed by Murray Brooks, Red Cross field man.

Schedule for classes this year is as follows:
Beginning boys and girls, 10 and older, 11-1:30 a.m.; boys and girls swimmers, 11-11:30 a.m.; boys and girls intermediate, 11-30-12.

Boy beginners, 6 to 7 years old, 1-1:30 p.m.; girl beginners, 6 to 7, 1:30-2; boy beginners, 8 to 10 years old, 2-2:30; girl beginners, 8 to 10, 2:30-3.

Junior and senior lifesaving course will be taught in conjunction with the water safety instructor's preliminary course from 6 to 7:30 each evening. An adult beginners and intermediate course will be given from 7 to 7:30 p.m.

At Leslie, classes will be taught by Albert Miles, Sidney Kromer and David Anderson. Roy Constock, Patricia Boyer and Gail Dorn will instruct at Olinger pool.

Knifer Kills Rich Divorcee

LOS ANGELES (U)—A wealthy young divorcee was stabbed and throttled to death in her luxurious hilltop home Tuesday and police arrested a man they said is a rejected suitor and former houseboy.

Her white knitted stole knotted around her throat, the body of Mrs. Norma McCauley, 33, was found on a chaise longue in her bedroom. A coroner's surgeon said she had been stabbed five times—twice in the chest—but that cause of death would not be determined until Wednesday.

John R. Crocker, a 34-year-old graduate law student who had worked as a houseboy for Mrs. McCauley since her divorce four months ago, was held on suspicion of murder.

Deputy Police Chief Thad Brown said it was learned the student, who quit UCLA recently, had proposed to Mrs. McCauley and threatened to kill her when she refused him.

State Holiday Accident Toll Sets Record

What is believed to be an all-time high holiday accident death record was set in Oregon over the long Fourth of July weekend.

Sixteen persons met violent deaths and another was believed drowned between 5 p. m. Friday night, when the count started, and midnight Monday.

The most recently reported death was that of Trudy Whitney, 8-month-old daughter of Mrs. Edward Whitney, Klamath Falls. The Whitney car started rolling down an incline just as Mrs. Whitney, carrying the baby, was about to get in. The child was knocked from her arms and crushed under the wheels.

Robert Stone, 10, Portland, was believed drowned in a Columbia River slough while watching fireworks at Jantzen Beach Park Monday night. The body had not been recovered late Tuesday.

Six others died in traffic accidents, three others drowned, three were killed in plane crashes, one died in a fire, one was run over by a train, and a performing daredevil bicyclist was killed at a Hillsboro community show.
