Court Seeks Silverton Area Road Costs

An effort to obtain an estimate of costs for obtaining right of way from land owners for the controversial re-routing of Market Road 34 from Evergreen School to Silverton will be made by County Engineer John Anderson.

Anderson was asked to contact property holders by Marion County Court after it had viewed a map showing location of three proposed routes for the road change.

One route would cut north for a mile from Harmon Corner through the Leander Davis donation land claim and join the present Salem-Silverton highway about a mile from Silverton.

A second proposal would also begin at Harmon Corner, but would cut across property and join the Salem-Silverton highway near the Silverton drive-in theater. This route would call for building about a mile and a half of highway, according to County Surveyor A. D. Graham.

A third proposal would simply eliminate two curves on the present highway, entailing about one-half mile of construction. This route would enter Silverton on Westfield Street which would carry traffic to McClain Street.

Allan Stevens Gets Diploma In Rare Stones

LOS ANGELES — Allan L. Stevens of Salem has been awarded a diploma in the theory and practice of gemology by the Gemological Institute of America, one of the first awarded in Oregon. Holders of such diplomas are known as graduate gemologists and are recognized by the industry as specialists in the gem field and qualified to identify precious stones.

Courses offered by the institute teach the jeweler the know-how and why of all precious stones and gem minerals. After a designated amount of theory has been mastered by mail, the student may attend resident classes in New York, Chicago or Los Angeles. On the average, three and one half years are required to complete the course.

Stevens is the son in Stevens and Son Jewelers at Salem. He is a director of the Oregon State Jewelers' Association and a member of the International Committee of the American Gem Society. He formerly owned and operated a jewelry store in Camas, Wash.

Final Rites for Ex-Resident of Salem Planned

Funeral services for Louis John Murdock, Eugene-area resident who once taught at Salem High School, will be 2 p. m. Saturday at Mount Crest Abbey Mausoleum. He was 69.

Murdock, who taught and coached here the five years prior to World War I, died Monday at a Salem hospital after suffering a heart attack Thursday at the home of his son Victor T. Murdock, Glen Creek Drive.

Born Feb. 7, 1886, at Lincoln, Neb., Murdock came west with his parents and moved to Monmouth when in his teens. Following his World War I service, he moved to Eugene where he farmed and continued to teach at Florence, Cloverdale and finally Carlton. He retired from Carlton School this year.

He was a member of the American Legion, the Congregational Church and the Odd Fellows.

Besides the Salem son he leaves the widow, Florence, sons Louis J. Murdock Jr., Eugene, and Robert G. Murdock, Forest Grove; a brother, three sisters and nine grandchildren.

The Rev. Julian J. Keiser will officiate at the services. The casket will be open to friends until 1:30 p. m. Saturday at the Virgil T. Golden chapel.
