Rosy World

Posies, We're Told, Make Good Jam, Jelly, Pie With Upper Crust

"A rose by any other name... 'ok, ok, how about calling it jam, or beads, or ice cream and eating, instead of smelling it?'"

This has been done, my friend, and often as rose petal jam is an old Turkish dish, and I once ate rose petal ice cream at Omar Khayyam's in San Francisco, where you could also buy rose petal jelly for a dollar a jar.

Here is a recipe for Rose Petal Jam from Hampshire House, a New York hotel. Read over carefully before starting, to avoid pitfalls in recipe.

ROSE PETAL JAM

Pick 1 pound mixed white and red rose petals. Measure out 3 pounds sugar. In a large jar arrange the dark petals alternating with sugar, packing down tightly. In another jar, arrange the lighter petals with the sugar in the same way. Pour 3/4 cup hot water into each jar and cover jars with damp cloth. After three days, strain off juice from jar of light colored petals, discarding the leaves.

Now take remaining sugar, add enough water to melt it, and boil in a saucepan until a heavy syrup results. Add both petals and juice from the other jar and juice from the light petal jar and bring to a boil over a low flame and simmer until it reaches the consistency of honey.

Remove from flame, squeeze in the juice of a lemon and stir twice. Ladle into jars as soon as jam begins to cool.

Rose Leaf pie is another of the old recipes we've run across and preserved. Here's our original recipe, said to be very delicious.

ROSE LEAF PIE

A very large double rose named "The Hundred-Leaf Rose" was used. The petals are removed, examined carefully and mashed. Prepare an unbaked pie crust, full as possible with the mashed petals. Sugar as for a fruit pie, put on top crust and bake as usual.

Then there are rose beads, the salt and petal method is one of the ways to make the beads, which harden with age and are sweet scented.

ROSE BEADS

(From Godey's Ladies' Book)

1 pound rose petals 1/4 pound dry salt

1 ounce each cloves, allspice

Pound spices and rose petals in a mortar until paste, adding salt as you work. Make into pellets, pierce each with a large needle and let dry. Harden with age.

And by the way, have you tried this?

ROSE HIP JAM

Make a puree by grinding 2 pounds rose hips and boiling with 1 1/2 pints water for 20 minutes. (This can be processed in hot water bath for 20 minutes and kept for using in meat stock and for soups.) To 2 cups of the rose hip puree use 1 lemon, sliced and 1 1/2 pounds sugar. Slice the lemon thin, cook in a small amount of water and then combine with sugar and puree and cook until clear.

Is it good? We don't know, but think we'll try it, too!

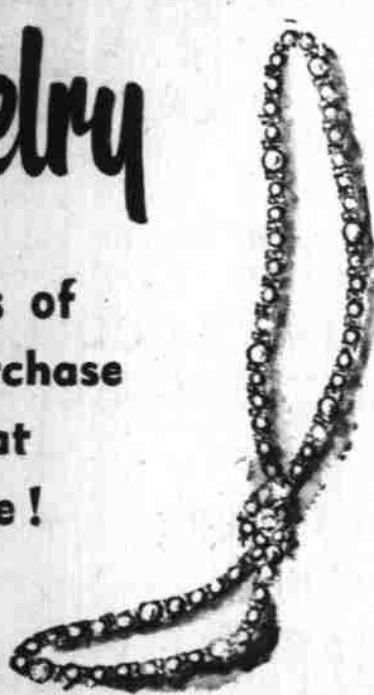
