City Plans to Add 25 New Fire Hydrants

Salem's city fire and water departments plan to add about 25 fire hydrants to the city system this year.

A fund of \$3,765 for the purpose was set up in the new city budget, effective July 1.

Fire Chief E. L. Smith and Water Manager John Geren Wednesday were studying bids from several firms on 10 five-inch hydrants and 15 four-inch hydrants. The bids will be tabulated and presented to Salem City Council Monday.

Most of the hydrants would serve areas where new water mains are being put in, said the fire chief. Some will replace old hydrants for which parts are no longer on the market.

Preview of Mental Health Films Starts

A Salem group Wednesday began a seven-weeks previewing job on mental health films which might become available later this year for program of local groups interested in health and family life subjects.

The first of the seven weekly movie showings attracted 41 persons, representing schools, churches, organizations interested in health, youth agencies and others.

A film on child-parent relations and another on discrimination in housing were shown by Melvin Murphy, Portland, of the Oregon Mental Health Association which, with the E. C. Brown Trust and the State Board of Health are the groups which may purchase films for Oregon use, at the recommendation of such preview audiences as Salem's.

Arrangements here are made by Marion County Mental Health Advisory Council of which Mrs. William Galloway Jr. is chairman. It is working with the county health department.

Next Wednesday's films for showing at Salem YMCA will be on race prejudice and community health subjects. Group representatives are to notify in advance the county health department office by telephone.

1,800 School Buses Used Over State

More than 1,800 school buses were in operation in Oregon during the last school term. D. V. Price, school bus inspector for the state traffic safety division, reported at a meeting in Salem Wednesday.

The meeting was held largely for the purpose of hearing manufacturers and others explain the latest improvements in bus facilities with particular reference to safety and general operation. Besides a large number of manufacturers, many school district officials were in attendance.

Price said there would be an increase in the number of school buses in operation in Oregon next year.

Any changes in school buses must receive the approval of secretary of state Earl T. Newbury, who is in charge of the state traffic safety division.

New regulations for school buses for the coming school year will be announced by the secretary of state prior to the opening of the fall school term.

Equipment for Playgrounds Given to City

About \$1,200 in playground equipment will be presented to the City of Salem today by the Salem Junior Woman's Club. The equipment has been installed in the southeast section of Bush Park off Yew Street.

Presentation to the city will be made in a brief 2 p.m. ceremony by Margaret White, past president of the club. Representing the city will be Mayor Robert F. White and Walter Wirth, park superintendent.

Equipment includes two sets of swings, two slides, monkey bars, swing rings, merry-go-round and a horizontal ladder.

Former Salem Pastor Dies

The Rev. John Dunn, 58, pastor of St. Vincent DePaul Catholic parish for the year and a half ending June 1938, died Monday in Portland. Services will be 10 a.m. Thursday following Requiem High Mass at St. Patrick's Church in Portland where he was stationed.

Office of the dead will be said 8 p.m. Wednesday at that church. Burial will be in Mt. Calvary Cemetery.

The Rev. Dunn, whose health forced him on a semi-retirement status shortly after leaving here, served at Astoria, Eugene, Baker and finally Portland. Two sisters survive in Canada.

State Board Posts Filled

Dental Charge Hearing Due

Hearing in Illinois Superior Court is expected soon by Mrs. Esther W. Huffman, 580 River-view Dr., in her suit for malpractice and damages, filed in 1951 against Dr. Herbert M. Phillips, a Chicago dental surgeon.

Depositions in connection with the suit are to be taken in Salem. Mrs. Huffman's suit charges that a permanently injured trigemina nerve resulted from dental work done on her in Chicago in 1949.

She is seeking punitive damages. The lawsuit makes the charge that an attempt was made to deprive Mrs. Huffman of proper

medical care by circulating a rumor that her complaint of severe pain was due to mental causes. Another charge was that her apartment in Rome, Italy, was entered illegally for the purpose of putting certain chemical substances on food and clothing to impair her health and cover up effects of the surgery.

Mrs. Huffman, wife of Dr. Norman Huffman of the Willamette University faculty, was at that time studying abroad on a Fulbright research scholarship.
