State Income Tax Collections Down

Oregon state income tax collections totaled \$55,100,834 in the 11 months ended June 1, the state tax commission reported Thursday.

The total was \$620,000 less than it was in the corresponding 11 months a year ago. The record for the period was \$63,970,603 in 1951-52.

Oregon's State Tax Commission Thursday set county by county, the tax ratios for use in levying property tax against utilities and, if it were to become necessary, levying state property tax. The ratio is that percentage of true cash value which is considered the assessed valuation for levy purposes.

Marion County's was set at 32 per cent, compared with 33 per cent the past year; Polk's is 28, compared with 30; Yamhill, 37, compared with 39; Linn, 30 instead of 33.

At the time they enacted legislation to bring utilities under corporate excise taxes, state legislators instructed the Tax Commission to gradually bring the ratio in line with ratios applied by county assessors in levying taxes against other classes of property. In the past utilities have paid a proportionately higher share of taxes because the ratios affecting them have been higher than other ratios.

The tax commission studies each county's assessment policies and methods in determining what ratios to set, reported Tax Commissioner Samuel B. Stewart. Most decreases in ratios were one to four points. But Deschutes ratio was increased nine points and Jackson six because of heavy blanket increases of 50 and 40 per cent, respectively, on their locally assessed real property valuation.

Garbage Man Fined \$5 in License Case

A collector for the Suburban Garbage Service Thursday was found guilty of a city charge of collecting garbage without a license in a recently-annexed section of Salem which has an exclusive collection franchise with the Sanitary Service Co.

Municipal Judge Douglas Hay fined Roderick Harvey Hendrickson, brother of Suburban's owner Emery Hendrickson, \$5.

The arrest, made March 10, was between D and Market Streets along a section of Park Avenue annexed to the city Dec. 17. Prior to that time and since, both garbage collection companies have maintained service in that area.

Hendrickson's company, which operates primarily outside the city, serves its customers without benefit of a franchise.

Hendrickson, who claims to have made an unsuccessful attempt to get a city license, said he desires only to continue operations in areas in which he is already established.

Also contacted was William Schmitt, partner in Sanitary, who said he feels the issue will have to be decided by the city attorney or city manager.
