

Detroit Lake, Salem Projects Included in State Highway Bids

Facilities planned as a major expansion of boat launching, camping and picnicking areas at Detroit Lake will be subject of contractors' bidding to be considered at an Aug. 11-12 meeting in Portland of the State Highway Commission.

Skiers 'Blast' Down Slope of Mt. Rainier

YAKIMA (U)—Two experienced mountaineers trudged to the top of Mount Rainier Sunday and blasted back on skis over rugged snow and ice fields slashed with crevasses "big enough to drop a house into."

Marcel Schuster, 37, was rather nonchalant about the feat. "I was happy to have made it," he said Wednesday.

His companion was Robert McCall, 35, a teacher at Yakima Senior High School. "I hope we can find out if anyone else has descended Mount Rainier on skis," he said. "We would like to know if we were the first to do it."

The two men camped at the 8,000-foot mark on the 14,408-foot mountain Saturday night and began their assault on the peak about dawn Sunday. They were wearing crampons (climbing spikes) and carried ice axes and ski poles. The skis were dragged behind.

Schuster signed the log atop the mountain at 1:30 p.m. They swooshed back down on the skis, making the entire descent in the afternoon.

Both men teach skiing during the winter months. Schuster was a professional mountaineering guide in the Bavarian Alps before World War II.

Oil Firm to Drill Second Well in State

PORTLAND (U)—Standard Oil Co. of California Wednesday announced it will begin drilling a second exploratory oil well in Oregon within the next two weeks.

An earlier well, near Astoria, was abandoned as a dry hole. The second well will be in Crook County, about 40 miles southeast of Prineville. Drilling operations will be carried on by Thomas Pike Drilling Co.

The project is a continuation of exploratory tests which follow several years of geological survey throughout the Northwest.

New traffic signal lights for eight Salem city street intersections also will figure in the bidding, as will improvements at two other state parks near Salem and bridges at Dell and Clear Lake.

These are among 32 projects estimated to cost some \$4 million. Several projects are for joint financing by state and other agencies.

The Detroit Lake improvements are part of the development of the new state park at the new lake backed up by Detroit Dam.

Bids Next Month
Up for bidding next month are these projects for the park:

Expanding the boat launching area to a 500-foot stretch of lake-shore, so eight to ten boats can be launched at once and as many as 100 cars can be parked nearby. Oil mat surface is planned.

(This is at the Mongold Road area where citizens launch their own boats which they tow to the area by private cars.)

Oil surface road and spurs at Lakeshore camp one mile east, to provide car spaces for 30 overnight camping parties. Project includes wood stove at each car space, plus water and sanitary facilities serving the area now limited to 12 places.

Adding Tables
Adding 30 picnic tables, 10 stoves and additional water facilities at day-use area of the park. The combined project is estimated to cost about \$30,000.

The Salem traffic light project is principally a city undertaking, although the state is to pay half the cost of lights at three of the intersections located on state highways. Total cost is expected to be about \$18,000.

Lights are to be placed at the intersections of Church Street with State, Court, Chemeketa, Center and Marion Streets; at Mission and High; at 17th and State; at 17th and Center.

Completion Date
Specified completion date is Oct. 31. City officials have indicated they hope the Church Street traffic signals will be in by the time the new Meier & Frank store opens in October because of anticipated heavier traffic in the vicinity of the new store.

Toilet facilities will be placed for the first time at Holman State Park on Dallas Road out of Salem, in another project up for bids next month. Stoves were added there earlier this year, leading to increased use of the park.

Clear Lake Bridge
Toilets and a place for swimmers to change clothes are scheduled in another project for Helmich State Park on the Luckiamute River, three miles south of Monmouth.

A Marion County project in which state and federal funds help pay the bill is a 200-foot concrete bridge over Clear Lake on County Road 604 north of Salem, also in the August bidding.

Bids also will be opened on widening the Rickreall Creek bridge on Levens Street, Dallas.

Solons Study Minimum Pay Change Date

WASHINGTON (U)—A conference committee adjusting the \$1-an-hour minimum wage bills passed by House and Senate agreed Wednesday to make effective date of the legislation next March 1.

The present minimum, for workers in interstate commerce, is 75 cents. President Eisenhower had asked an increase to 90 cents.

Both House and Senate versions disregarded his wishes and set the new minimum at \$1. The biggest difference was that the Senate called for the raise to be effective next January 1, whereas the House version named March 1.

A \$1 rate would mean an automatic increase for about 2,100,000 workers out of the 24 million covered by the federal wage-hour law.

Eisenhower told his news conference Wednesday he'll decide, after talking with Secretary of Labor Mitchell, whether to sign the \$1 measure. Mitchell said last week he would recommend the President sign it.

Libel Action Filed in Libby Proxy Fight

CHICAGO (U)—The president of Libby, McNeill & Libby filed a two million dollar libel suit Wednesday against three New Yorkers waging a proxy fight to gain control of the firm.

Charles S. Bridges, head of the food products company, filed the suit in U.S. District Court. Named as defendants were Mitchell May Jr., Alfred W. Parry Jr., and Wilbur Dow Jr., heading an independent stockholders committee.

The suit was based on a letter which Bridges said the three had circulated on July 13 to 25,000 Libby stockholders.

The May-Parry-Dow group previously had filed a 1 1/2 million dollar libel suit against Bridges.

Northwestern Ports Slated To Ship Grain

WASHINGTON (U)—Roland F. Ballou, assistant deputy administrator for operations of agriculture, testified Wednesday the Commodity Credit Corp. has scheduled 660,000 tons of grain for export through North Pacific ports during July, August and September.

Ballou appeared before the Senate Interstate and Foreign Commerce Subcommittee on box car shortages in harvest areas.

He said the grain consisted of 500,000 tons of barley and 160,000 tons of wheat.

Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) said Ballou didn't say through which ports grain would move but said it would approximate 70 cargoes.

Ballou said the Department of Agriculture is fully aware of the box car shortage and is doing everything possible to alleviate it.

Ancient Drivers License Valid, Claims Woman

A woman, writing from Florida, asked Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry to bring her 30-year-old drivers license up to date.

Newberry replied that her license had not been valid for 20 years.

The woman said her license was issued April 5, 1927, and is marked "valid until suspended or revoked." The 1933 Legislature terminated all such licenses, Newberry said.

Newberry advised the woman that in event she is a resident of Florida she should apply for a Florida license. He said if she is in Florida temporarily it would be necessary that she complete the Oregon examination for a license.

Cigaret Tax Referendum Said Almost Assured

PORTLAND (U)—A representative of the tobacco industry said here Wednesday a referendum against the cigarette tax bill passed by the last Oregon Legislature is almost assured.

Some 19,000 of the 20,047 required signatures have already been certified, Robert A. Bradley, secretary of Tobacco Distributors, said Wednesday. He said the rest would be obtained by Aug. 2.
