

Church Plans 100th Anniversary Week

Salem's First Christian Church will open on Sunday a full week's celebration of its 100th anniversary.

Period costumes appropriate to the centennial will be worn by many of the congregation during the week.

A big silver wine cannister and two silver communion goblets, which comprise the church's original communion set, will be exhibited in a new church display case in the narthex.

Into a new leatherbound volume will go memorials and other documents connected with building in recent years of the present church at Marion and Cottage Streets.

The centennial is occasion also for other new installations at the church, including a new cross for the communion table and a new clock for the sanctuary.

History of First Christian Church is depicted in a "Centennial Story" booklet prepared by Dr. and Mrs. Leslie Carson and scheduled for dedication at the morning worship service this Sunday.

At the worship a week from Sunday is scheduled a sermon by former pastor the Rev. Dudley Strain of Lubbock, Tex.

Two Long-Time Salem Postal Workers Honored at Dinner

Two Salem postal employees, who together have given 65 years service to handling the mail, were honored Wednesday night by fellow workers at a dinner party at St. John's Lutheran church.

Lloyd Drorbaugh, 67, of 3810 Lancaster Dr., will retire Aug. 1 after 35 years with the Salem postal service. A clerk, Drorbaugh has spent most of his time at the downtown post office, but has been working recently part of the day at the West Salem branch.

William O'Neill, 60, 4285 Gardner Rd., retired as a rural carrier July 1. He started with the Salem post office in 1925 as a city mail carrier. In 1939, he became a supervisor and ten years later he has been carrying the mail in the Keizer, Quinaby and Hope-mere areas.

Drorbaugh and O'Neill were presented watches by the more than 100 employees honoring them at the dinner. O'Neill was also presented with a retirement certificate by Postmaster Albert Gragg. A similar certificate for Drorbaugh did not arrive in time for the party.

Both men expressed a desire to spend part of their retirement time traveling as well as gardening and growing flowers.

State Unit Reverses Ruling by Clackamas County Assessor

The Oregon State Tax Commission ruled Wednesday that the Clackamas County assessor can assess the northern half of Moore's Island at Oregon City, on which is located the Crown-Zellerbach paper mill and a generating plant.

In the past, the commission has assessed the whole island, which is owned by PGE.

The commission valued the land at \$10,000 an acre, in contrast to County Assessor, Gus Meyers' assessment of \$30,000 an acre.

Wednesday's decision holds the northern half of the 20-acre island to be non-operating.

Meyers had ruled void past assessments on the island, but the commission held that no assessor can rule void any order of the commission.

On the opposite side of the river, land occupied by Publishers Paper Co., and also owned by PGE, is assessed at \$30,000 an acre. The commission said this assessment would be reduced in the near future.

Liquor Sales Report Made

Approximately 24 per cent of whisky and other distilled spirits consumed during the past year in Oregon was in taverns, restaurants and similar establishments, licensed by the State Liquor Control Commission, Gov. Paul L. Patterson was advised in a report released here Wednesday.

Total combined sales of liquor to consumers and licensees was \$42,918,476 for 846,376 cases of spirits and wines. This was a decline of \$153,347 or 8.96 per cent, and represented 5,913 fewer cases sold.

Price increases in May helped sustain the dollar volume for the last two months of the fiscal year, when case sales decreased but dollar volume increased.

During the year 294,897 permits were issued, this being 1,700 fewer than issued the preceding 12 months.

They have air-conditioned their squad car with discarded dry ice

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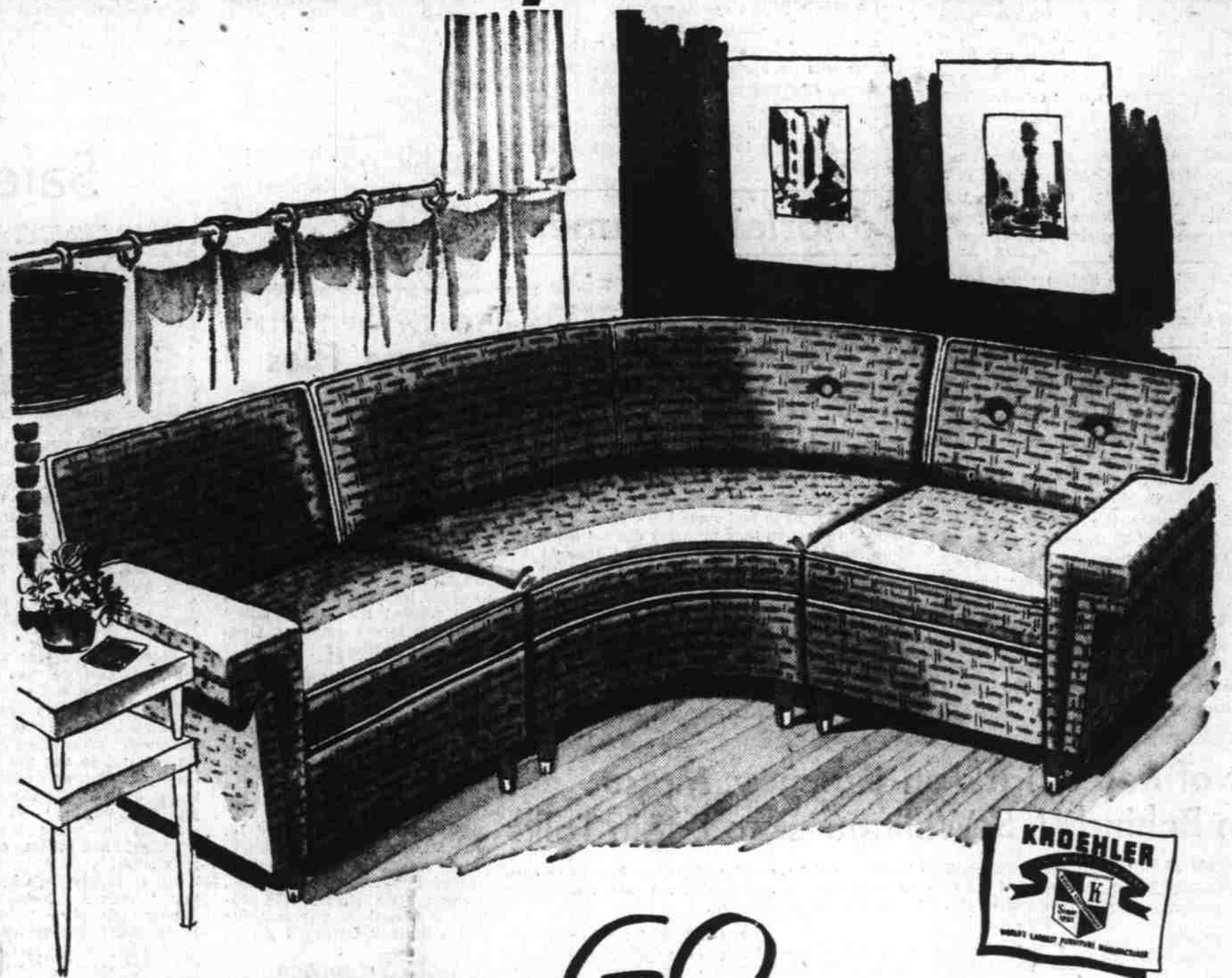
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
