Washington's Summer Heat Stops Even Men From Tropics

WASHINGTON-Local citizens have gotten used to panting Foster. and fanning themselves through Washington's muggy summers, or August 4 is the date set for the staking themselves out in some air-conditioned haven. The heat-next monthly play-off of the humidity combine takes the starch out of newcomers, even though they come from what is generally believed to be the world's hottest ACBL.




