

# Salk Polio Vaccine Allocated For Commercial Distribution

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Public Health Service announced Sunday its first allocation of Salk polio vaccine to the states for distribution through commercial channels and local public agencies.

## Bill Squabble Threat to Fast Adjournment

(Story also on page 1) WASHINGTON (AP) - A Senate-House squabble over the "Boodle Bill," appropriation funds for legislative expenses, has threatened to further delay adjournment of Congress.

The Senate added to the bill extra postage and stationery allowances for its members, expense-paid trips home for senatorial employees and pay raises for some of its hired help.

The House had neglected to provide these "fringe benefits" for itself in passing the bill originally. It decided to add them in a Senate-House conference, on the theory the Senate wouldn't object to the traditional procedure of each branch allowing for its own housekeeping needs without interference from the other.

Senators balked, however, one member saying the House pay boosts were even larger than those voted by the Senate.

"I'm at a loss to understand it," Chairman Cannon (D-Mo.) of the House Appropriations Committee told newsmen Sunday.

"They took everything that was loose for themselves and don't want to give us anything. It's an outrageous situation. We are going to sit tight. The next move is up to them."

As passed by the House, the bill appropriated about 60 million dollars. The Senate added nearly 33 million more.

House leaders say they are ready, if necessary, to shoot through a resolution financing Congress on a temporary basis at the rate of last year's appropriations. That would knock out raises for all staff and committee employees.

The stalemate over the congressional appropriation may last longer than the housing deadlock.

Conferees on an omnibus housing bill were expected to reach agreement Monday after going through their annual battle over how many new public housing units should be approved.

"Odds and Ends" Once the housing and congressional money disputes are settled, Congress will be in shape to bang through a few odds and ends of legislation and go home.

Measures still on tap include: A 2 billion dollar boost in the government's authority to make loans for the farm price support program. This has cleared the Senate.

A Senate-passed bill extending the small business administration. A Senate-passed bill providing free polio vaccine for most minors. The House wants to limit free distribution to needy children.

A bill to raise the pay of Cabinet officers and other top government officials. This has passed the House.

A House-passed bill revising and continuing the sugar quota program. This, too, has passed the House.

Each state will determine what proportion of its share of the vaccine will go to public agencies, such as local health departments, and what amount will be distributed by the manufacturers through regular drug channels for use by private physicians.

The Health Service said allocations to the states will be based on each state's proportion of children in the 5 through 9 age group, excluding those children already vaccinated with free shots under the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis program.

The announcement added that the 5-9 age group was chosen in May by the National Advisory Committee on Polio as the most susceptible to polio.

Sunday's announcement followed by one day a statement by the national polio foundation that it has more than enough of the Salk vaccine for its summer inoculations. The foundation will have further heavy requirements for continuation of second shots of the vaccine to children after schools open in the fall.

Since the revised testing procedures for the vaccine were adopted May 26, the government has released 5,068,000 cubic centimeters, all to the foundation.

The 846,000 shots allotted to the states Sunday was left over from the last batch of vaccine released after the needs of the national polio foundation were met.

The Health Service emphasized the voluntary nature of the plan for dividing available vaccine among the states. This plan, it said, follows the proposals for equitable distribution approved by President Eisenhower in May.

It was worked out over several months by the National Advisory Committee, the Public Health Service, the governors' Polio-Myelitis Advisory Committee, the Association of State and Territorial Health Officers, manufacturers of the vaccine, representatives of the medical and pharmaceutical profession, the drug industry and other groups.

The Health Service said it has asked the states to notify the Department of Health, Education and Welfare of the proportion of their allotted vaccine to be shipped to public agencies and to be released through normal drug channels.

As soon as this information is received from the states, the Health Service said, it will be transmitted to the manufacturers, who will make shipments directly into the states.

The service said the American Medical Assn. has requested all physicians to vaccinate only children in the 5 through 9 age group for the present.

When requirements for these children have been filled adequately in enough states, the National Advisory Committee has recommended, the priority age group will be broadened to include younger and older children.

Each state's governor has designated officials to handle the problems of equitable distribution within the state, the Health Service said.

The National Polio Foundation estimates it will need three million shots of vaccine to immunize the nation's children in the fall.

Oregon was allotted 10,491 cubic centimeters, Washington 16,110 and Idaho 3,159.

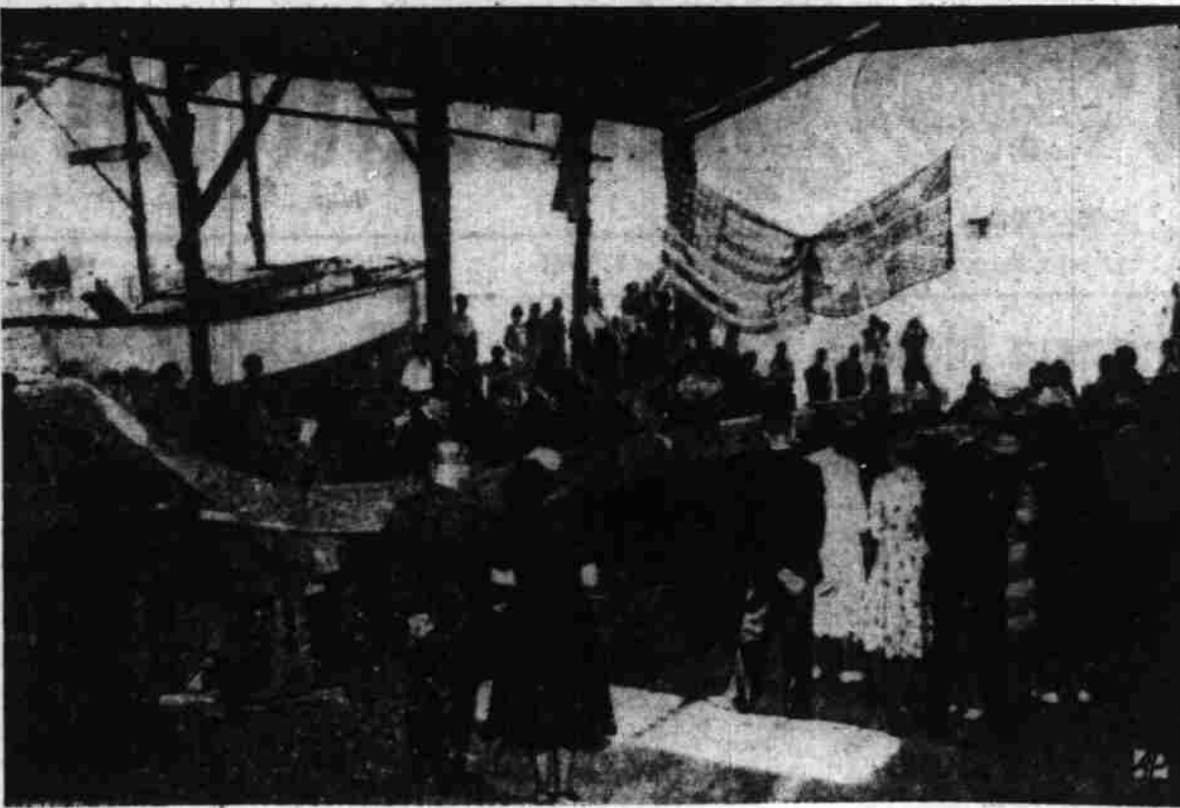

## Mississippi Swimmer in 'Good Spirits'

CAPE GIRARDEAU, Mo. (AP) - Antonio Abertondo, 36-year-old Argentine swimmer, neared this Southeast Missouri town late Sunday in "good spirits" on his second try at setting a Mississippi record.

Abertondo reached the 116-mile point downstream from St. Louis at 6:30 p.m. (CDT). Cape Girardeau is 128 miles from St. Louis where he dived into the water at 9:43 a.m. Saturday.

The government employe, who will celebrate his 47th birthday in the water Monday, was described by members of his party as in "good spirits and confident" he will reach his goal of swimming 300 miles non-stop.

Members of his party, accompanying Abertondo in a boat, said the swimmer was refreshed by a half-hour rain earlier in the afternoon.

He had slowed his stroke from 66-a-minute to 55-per-minute and was reported swimming with no help from a slow current in the river.

Abertondo, who had passed the one-third mark in his endurance swimming attempt, is being fed oat meal, orange juice, broth and a special herb brewed into a tea at regular intervals during the day and night.

Abertondo hopes to reach Cottonwood Bend below Caruthersville, Mo. sometime late Tuesday afternoon. He hopes to beat a record set in 1945 by John Sigmond, St. Louis butcher, who swam the 392 miles to Caruthersville in 89 hours, 52 minutes.

Mary, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Wait of Rickreall, has 18 trophies and 24 medals gathered in baton-twirling contests.

## Young Salem Girl Attacked By Prowler

A 17-year-old baby-sitter early Sunday was surprised by a prowler who stole a revolver from a car parked behind the same duplex and sought immediately to put it to work, Salem police reported.

The girl, who suffered two head bumps apparently inflicted by the gun, was Mary Jane Hastay, 17, 1045 N. Cottage St. She was asleep on the davenport at the 351 Tryon Ave. house of Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Wilkerson.

Unaware that she had been struck, Miss Hastay was awakened about 2:30 a.m. Sunday when she felt someone attempting to place something over her face, she told police. She screamed and the prowler, described as a hatless young man, dashed into the bedroom and through a window.

The prowler, police said, dropped the gun into the davenport. It was shortly identified by Howard H. King, resident of the same one-story duplex, who told police it was taken from his car.

Police said the man entered the Wilkerson house by prying off the bedroom window screen after setting a crude ladder in place.

The object which the prowler was trying to place over Mary's face was believed to be a baby blanket also found on the davenport, the officers said.

The Wilkersons, who arrived home while investigating officers were at the house, said nothing appeared to be missing from the premises.

Upon the prowler's departure, Mary called her mother, who came over by cab, and the two called police. The cab driver reported seeing a car take off hurriedly as he drove toward the Wilkerson house.

The Wilkersons' two children were not disturbed.

Word was received here Sunday that the U.S. House of Representatives Saturday matched a Senate bill permitting the minor daughters of a Salem woman to remain in this country as immigrants.

The girls are Sarah Lucia Venegas, 8, and her sister, Maria Elena, 7, daughters of Mrs. Sarah Venegas, a Willamette University student. Mrs. Venegas lives at 1674 Court St. with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Morse.

Mrs. Morse said the telegram announcing the latest progress of the bill was received by Attorney Harold Adams of Salem.

The girls, born in Mexico, are technically visitors overstaying their leave in the United States. Their father, from whom Mrs. Venegas was separated in 1949, is an electrical appliance salesman in Mexico.

The girls' present status, Mrs. Morse said, is technical arrest under parole to their mother. The Venegas bill passed the U.S. Senate on March 28.
