Official Answers Questions About Grain Storage Law

Grain harvest has begun in the Willamette Valley and the new grain storage warehouse inspection program, approved by the 1955 legislature, is posing a number of questions to warehousemen and grain growers alike.

T. Ralph Harry, Oregon State Department of Agriculture, division of grain inspection and warehouse licensing chief, reports nine questions which have been "repeaters" in recent days. Here are the questions and the answers, Harry names:

1. I have a small warehouse. Do I have to obtain a license? The answer is, says Harry, "Yes, you need a new license regardless of size of the warehouse. Every warehouse does unless it is licensed and bonded under the U.S. Warehouse Act."

Load Slips
2. I handle grain only a short time and issue load slips. Do I need a license?

The answer: Yes, if you hold stocks of grain that are not your own you need a license.

3. What grains are covered? Answer: All of them. The law also includes dry beans and dry peas.

4. How about seeds? I store only seeds.

Answer: Then you don't need a public warehouse license. Seeds are not covered by this law. But public warehouses which store both grain and seeds do need a license. Also, if you store only hay you do not need a license. Hay is not covered in the warehouse act. The department inspects hay but does not license its storage if that is the only commodity stored.

Must Be Bonded
5. Do I have to have a bond? Answer: Yes, public warehouses—and that term includes mills, elevators, or any place where grain from the public is stored, shipped or handled—must be bonded. When you apply for a license, the department will notify you of the cost of the bond. The bond must be approved by the department.

6. What is the license fee? Answer: That depends upon the bushel capacity of the warehouse... \$25 for up to 100,000 bushels; \$50 for 100,001 bushels, and \$100 for everything over a half million bushels.

7. When is the license due? Answer: Every year on July 1. This new law carried the emergency clause and is now in operation.

tion. Make application to the department's grain and warehouse licensing division in Portland, 1517 N.W. Hoyt Street, rather than to Salem headquarters.

Rates Schedule
8. What else should I know about this law?

Answer: You should have posted a schedule of storage and handling rates the first week in July and these you cannot legally change for one year. Also, the law prohibits discriminatory practices or favoritism of any kind. It requires each warehouse to have a sign showing the license number.

9. Any certain size of sign? Answer: Yes, both size and form. The letters and numbers must be at least eight inches high.

The agriculture department is now preparing to launch a full-scale inspection of all public grain storage structures. This will include a survey of stocks to determine if they cover obligations. J. E. Wallin of the grain division has been assigned to the job of warehouse inspector.

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State Library Open House To Mark 50th Anniversary

Every staff member will be on duty that night to help explain activities of the library. Special chairmen include: David C. Duniway, hospitality; Mrs. Lester Wilcox, refreshments; Miss Loretta Fisher, tours, and Miss Brenda Glass, exhibits.

Mail Marked
All Oregon State Library mail from now on until the close of this year will carry the stamp: "Fifty Years of Service," and a series of publications as being issued to commemorate the event. Already published are "Pioneer Spirit in the Library," Cornelia Marvin Pierce, who was the first librarian, serving from 1905 to 1927; "Public Library Buildings in Oregon," (dedicated to Harriet C. Long), Eloise Ebert, and "Oregon's Public Records," David C. Duniway.

Yet to come from the press are "Gift from the State to Oregonians," Eleanor Stephens; "The Library's Collections," Jo-

sephine Baumgartner; "Some Book rarities," Mirpah Blair.

Urged to Attend
Library board members from throughout the state are particularly urged to attend the open house, Miss Stephens said, as she called special attention to the help which may be gained by Miss Ebert's publication. It will prove invaluable, she added, to libraries planning building promotion.

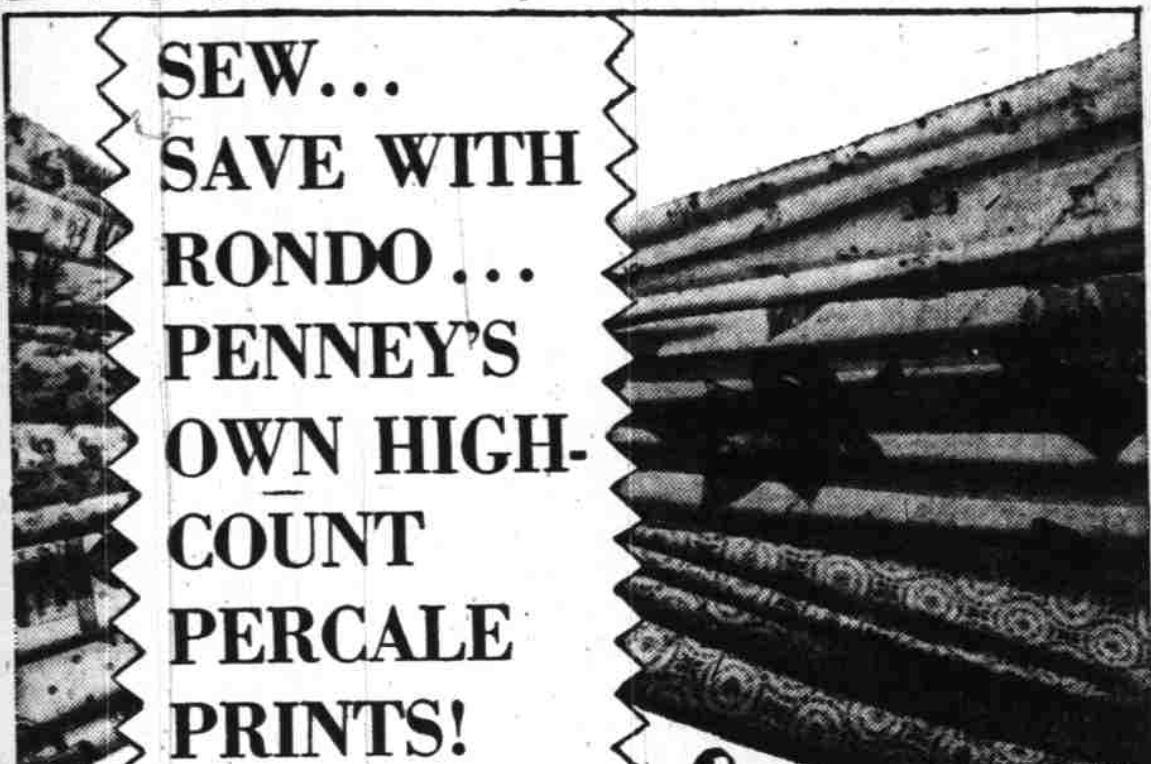
"Nearly every week's mail bring queries from some part of the state where interested citizens are working to promote better housing for their local libraries. Library board members should study the tables at the end of the booklet to see how many years it has been since they made a physical improvement in their plant, and how the investment in their building compares with that of towns of similar size," Miss Stephens explained.

Comparison Asked
She added that "another useful comparison which citizens may make as the state observes its half-century mark in the library, is 'that of money invested in library buildings in the various cities, with the cost of local schools, since increase in population affects libraries as well as schools.'"

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
