Giants Begin Second Practice Week

We have been asked a few times of late just what type of streamer fly is used when feeding silver salmon in salt water. There seems to be quite a bit of added interest this year on the "flies for silvers" operation. We must admit in all fairness that we have never used the big salt water flies ourselves but have spent a bit of time and effort in finding out about them.

Type of fly most favored in Washington and British Columbia waters is dressed on a tandem hook similar to the hook-up used in mooching with herring. The hooks are tied just the same as the mooching hooks are tied except that on most rigs a piece of heavy piano wire is secured between the two hooks. This wire will give the fly tyer something to anchor his tinsel and body material to.

The dressing of course is much longer than on most streamer flies, being about five inches over all in length. The silver tinsel body usually wound over padding extends from the bottom of the front hook down the wire and on to the shank of the trailer hook. The wing is usually of two different colors of polar bear hair. The polar bear hair being preferred over bucktail because of its high gloss.

Tips on the Polar Bear Hair

The first layer of the polar bear hair is white with an overlying wing of green, blue or brown. Some tyers make a large head on the fly and paint eyes on it to make the fly look more like a small candlefish.

The accepted method of hooking the fly up for angling is to slip a small spinner blade on the leader ahead of the fly. Use a small colored bead between the spinner blade and the fly to be certain of a revolving blade. This added flash seems to attract the fish more than the fly by itself and is recommended for productive fishing.

The angler should use the usual six foot leader with a swivel in the center to prevent line twist. One-half to one ounce of lead is all that is needed as the silvers will come to the top readily. Speed is another thing. One need not go so slow in trailing the fly for silvers. Often a boat may be travelling at eight knots with a fly skipping out of the water now and then. The skipping fly very closely resembles a minnow in a desperate evasive measure to elude his enemy.

An Unlimited Thrill, Say Some

One should have a large capacity fly reel with at least 200 yards of line aboard and a nine or ten foot fly rod capable of handling fish up to 15 pounds.

We all know the explosive qualities of the silver salmon and according to the old time salt chuck fly fishermen there is no thrill to equal that found in using a fly rod after the feeding silver salmon.

A few anglers tried flies last season with great success at Coos Bay and took fish when other methods failed. We would imagine by the interest shown thus far this year that a lot of anglers will be trying the big flies at Newport in the coming weeks. It will be interesting to hear of the wild battles had by the fly rod anglers on the salt. More power to them.

Registration for the coaches attending the workshop will take place from 9 to 11 a.m. today in front of the Willamette Gym.

Producing the workshop will be Willamette Menzies Ted Ogden, Jerry Frei, who moves from WU to Oregon this fall, Bill McArthur, the highly successful coach at OCE in Menomouth and Lee Gustafson, the South Salem High coach who guided his Saxons to a state prep championship last season.

The Giants coaching staff of Jim Lee Howell, Vince Lombardi, Tom Landry, Ken Kavanaugh and Ed Kolman will take over the entire workshop program on Friday.

Considerable contact work is on the Giants' practice schedule this week, but not during the morning sessions. They are usually light by comparison with those of the afternoons.

Boston Tops Detroit Twice in Twin Bill

Chicago opened up a one-game lead on both New York and Cleveland in the American League Sunday by winning a doubleheader while the two leading contenders had to settle for splits. Boston, however, kept pace by sweeping two to remain only three games behind the leaders.

Brooklyn pulled out 13½ games ahead of the National League pack by thumping St. Louis 11-2 while Don Newcombe boosted his phenomenal record to 18-1 with a five-hitter.

The Chicago Cubs won two from Philadelphia 7-1 and 6-5 and Cincinnati lowered the boom on Pittsburgh in both games 7-4 and 6-5, winning the second on Ted Kluszewski's single with the bases full in the last of the ninth.

Chisox Pushed
Chicago's White Sox had no easy time at Washington, going 11 innings to take the first game 3-1 and weathering a ninth-inning Washington rally to save the second 6-5.

Jack Harshman allowed only two hits in the opener, none in the last 8 1/3 innings. The Sox tied the score in the eighth when catcher Ed Fitz Gerald led a third strike get away and won it in the 11th when reliever Pedro Ramos hit George Kell and walked Jim Rivera, both with the bases loaded.

An accurate relay by second baseman Nellie Fox nipped Pete Runnels at the plate in the ninth of the second game, trying to score the tying run from first base on a Mickey Vernon double in the ninth.

Kansas City dropped the Yankees a length behind the White Sox by winning the second game 7-1 after Don Larsen, still moved up from Denver, pitched a four-hitter for a 5-2 New York victory in the opener.

Yanks Hit Homers
Hank Bauer, Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra hit home runs in the first inning of the first game for New York. Kansas City trailed 1-0 in the eighth of the second game when Gus Zernial hit a homer with a man on. The A's sent 11 men to bat and scored five runs in the ninth.

Cleveland got six-hit shutout pitching from Art Houtteman to grab the second game from Baltimore 6-0 after the Orioles had rallied.

Woods, a 39-year-old swinger from McMinnville's Riverwood club, had little trouble with Mitchell, Ierulli nearly lost to Milligan, whose three putts on the 36th hole cost him the match.

WENATCHEE (AP)—Wenatchee took both ends of a Northwest League doubleheader Sunday from Lewiston, 6-3 and 10-2, to sweep the four-game series and extend its winning streak to five straight games.

Bob Duretto, Wenatchee right fielder, extended his home run string to 18, getting his 17th homer in the first game and his 18th in a grand slam affair—in the fifth inning of the nightcap. Maglie Sold by Giants To Cleveland Indians

MILWAUKEE (AP)—The New York Giants Sunday sold Sal (The Barber) Maglie to the Cleveland Indians for a reported \$25,000.

"It's tough to leave the Giants," the 38-year-old righthander said. "They've been my only club, but I'm happy to go to Cleveland."

Maglie said he planned to fly to New York Sunday night and join the Indians for their night game with the New York Yankees Tuesday.

In Baltimore, Tribe Manager Al Lopez said, "We're glad to have Maglie. We were a little short on pitching."

"I'll have to see him throw before I know how I'm going to use him. But we're glad to have him." Lopez, whose pitching staff has been suffering from aches and pains, said it's pretty well straightened out now. "Only Lemon is still out," he said. "He's supposed to join us Tuesday in New York, but it will be a few days before he can pitch."

Traveling Secretary Harold Goldstein said, "It's obvious why we got him (Maglie) isn't it? We got him to help us win the pennant."

Goldstein said one player will be dropped from the Cleveland roster before the Tuesday night game to get within the player limit.

The announcement of Maglie's sale contained no details, except that it was straight cash deal and involved the exchange of no other players.

The Giants had to get waivers from the rest of National League in order to deal the Barber to the junior circuit team.

Although the price was not disclosed, it was believed to be in the neighborhood of \$25,000.

The Giants' clubhouse after Sunday's 7-3 victory over the Milwaukee Braves was quiet. Sal stood in the center looking none too happy as he shook hands with his old teammates, but didn't say much.

Most of the players, including team Captain Al Dark, said they were sorry to see the veteran go. Manager Leo Durocher also came up to Sal to wish him luck.

"I think it's a real good break for Maglie," Leo said. "The boys at Cleveland have a real good chance to win the pennant."

Sal had helped the Giants win two pennants—in 1951 and last year. He won 23 and lost only 6 in the New York's thrilling 1951 pennant drive and was 14-6 in 1954.

Ransom Wins Open Tourney

AKRON, Ohio (AP)—Henry Ransom won the Rubber City Open Golf Tournament Sunday on the first hole of a sudden death playoff with three other pros.

Ransom, from St. Andrews, Ill., sank a 12-foot putt to birdie the extra hole and edge out PGA champion Doug Ford of Klamath Lake, N.Y.; Jackson Bradley of Houston, Tex., and Jack Burke of Klamath Lake.

Ransom, with a two stroke lead going into Sunday's final 18 holes, shot a one-under-par 71 over the 6,700-yard Firestone Country Club course.

Burke picked up seven strokes on the final 18 with an eight-under-par 64, low in the tournament. Ford shot a 69 and Bradley a 68.

The Salems were in front in both games, with fairly comfortable leads, but wilted and fell before big innings produced by Don Fries' club.

There has been many a moon since the Waters Fielders lost both sides of a twin bill in their home yard. They turned so sour in July that losing Sunday's pair seemed only natural.

With the Braves now having departed after taking three of the four games here, the Salems attempt to regroup their forces tonight for the start of another four-game series with the front-running Eugene Emeralds. The way things have been going, it's apt to be a right miserable four games for Uncle Hugh Luby's slumping crew.

The Emms have taken 10 of 15 outings with the Solons' already this season.

Show Starts at 7:15
Tonight's opener will be preceded by the annual color and gaiety of "Shrine Night" festivities, which start at 7:15 o'clock. Shrine marching and musical units from both the Portland and Salem Shrine Clubs will perform on the field prior to the eight o'clock clash.

Bill (Red) Whitson, who sported a flossy 11-3 record Sunday morning, after having blanked Wenatchee on three hits last week, was the victim of the 7-5 first game defeat during the warm afternoon.

The redhead had two bad innings, the third and eighth. A walk, Pries' double and Danny Holden's home run cost Whitson three runs in the former, and more bingles by Pries and Holden, an error, another walk and Rich Bergen's two-run single were worth four runs in the eighth.

The latter sweep wiped out a 5-3 Salem lead and knocked Whitson from the box.

Shields Hits Two Homers
Young Don Kenway, who was locking for his first triumph of the campaign, might have had an easy time of it for the Braves were it not for Bill Shields, the Solon outfielder. Bill singled and scored Salem's first run in the second inning, smashed a two-run homer over the Cascade signboard, with Gene Tansell aboard in the fifth.

Thus it was Shields 5, Tri-City 3 until Whitson's rough eighth inning.

Kenway left for a pinch-hitter in the eighth and Vern Kindsfather took over the mound to save the kid's win for him. Ron King was Whitson's successor and checked the visitors successfully during his relief stint. But all the scoring for the game was done when Ron came in.

Krause Batted Out
The Salems batted tall Ralph Burns for five runs in the second inning to take a 5-1 lead in the nightcap. But Mel Krause, who had been doing so well in relief roles that Luby tried him as a starter Sunday, couldn't hold the fort. He was shelled out in the third, when the Braves collected six runs on five hits and three of the ever-present and always damaging bases on balls.

Bill Walsh relieved Krause midway through the rally, but failed to stop it until he walked his way to his sixth defeat.

The Senators peeked at Burns for runs in the third and fourth, gaining a 7-7 tie with the latter. Then came another whopping inning by the Braves, this one the fifth and worth four runs on a combination of three hits, two walks and a couple of errors which made but one of the four runs an earned tally.
