Idled in Northwest League play by another three-day layoff, the Sal. Senators return to exhibition game action Saturday and Sunday, playing the Cheney Lumbermen of Tacoma, at Tacoma. Games are booked for both Saturday and Sunday nights in the Washington city, which may return to organized play next season as a member of the Northwest League.

"I've never seen anyone like him when it comes to stealing the other team's signs. It's amazing the way he does it."

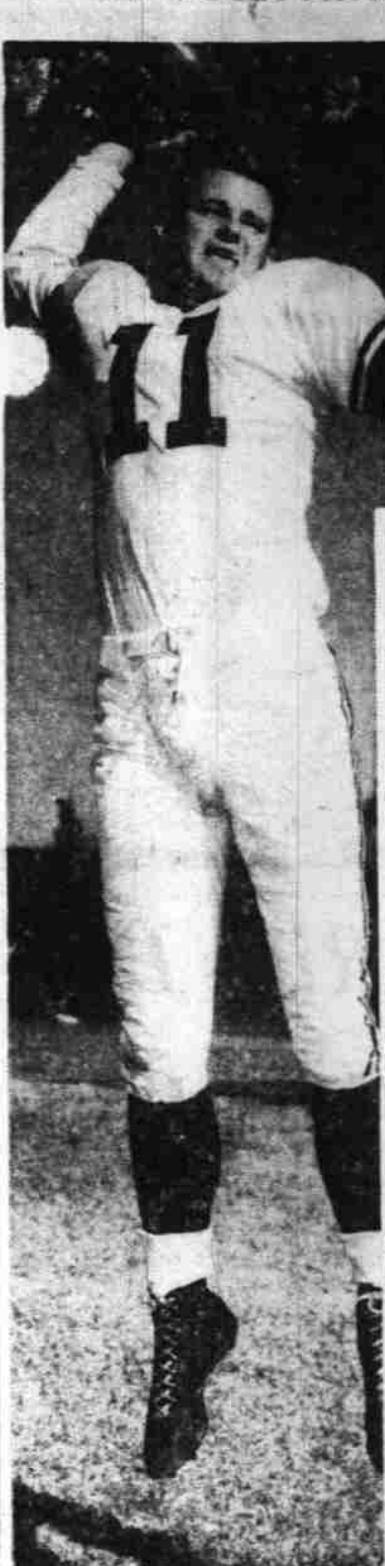
Bowl Lists Destruction Derby

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A spectacular backhanded catch by Portland second baseman Artie Wilson saved Friday night's Pacific Coast League opener for the Beavers, 4-3, but San Francisco took the nightcap, 2-1.

Elsewhere in the PCL, Hollywood belted Seattle, 12-1; Los Angeles Pitcher Joe Hatten shutout San Diego, 7-0, on seven hits, and Danny Baich hit Sacramento's first grand slam homer of the season as the Solons swung past Oakland, 7-3.

Wilson's grab came after Jimmy Moran had hit a two-run single for the Seals in the seventh and last inning, and Carl Scheib had taken over the mound from Glenn Elliott.

Mike Baxes hit one of Scheib's pitches for what looked like a line drive single, but Wilson stabbed for it and came up with the game ending pop. The tying run was on second base at the time.

Seals pitcher Don Fracchia kept the second game under control, but he also faced a hectic last inning. With one out in the ninth, Ed Mickelson singled. Don Egger doubled and Fracchia purposely walked Frankie Austin to load the bases.

Then pinch hitter Bill Eastburn hit a grounder to Baxes, and Baxes sent it right back to home plate to put Mickelson out. Wally Seelake hit a deep fly to right, and the Seals had their first victory in five games.

Swaps Rates As Favorite

It will be Swaps by one length over Nashua in their great match race at Chicago Aug. 31, and the California comet will be clocked in slightly faster time than when he beat the Belair bullet in the Kentucky Derby.

That was the consensus Friday in a countrywide Associated Press poll of sports writers and sportscasters, who picked Swaps the winner, 184 votes to 135.

When Rex Ellsworth's Swaps caused a mild flurry of surprise by drawing away from William Woodward Jr.'s Nashua after the latter made his bid in the Derby stretch, the Nashua crowd said he couldn't do it again.

They said Eddie Arcaro was so busy keeping his eye on Summer Tan, he let Willie Shoemaker steal off to an easy lead with Swaps.

The arguments got warmer, and the owners finally agreed to let them tangle for \$100,000 winner-take-all, over the same mile and one quarter distance as the Derby. Both will have the 16 pounds Derby weight.

Swaps won the Derby, the only time he's met Nashua, by a length and a half, and the time was 2:01.8, for the fourth fastest Derby. In the poll, 30 ballots said the match race time would be 2:01.4.

Los Angeles Team Arrives by Plane

PORTLAND (AP) — The Los Angeles Rams arrived by air Friday afternoon and worked out briefly at Multnomah Stadium, where they'll meet the Pittsburgh Steelers Saturday night in a non-counting exhibition football game expected to draw 25,000 or better.

Representing both divisions of the National Professional Football League, the teams are rated stronger than last year. They have played only four previous games, the Rams winning three and the other ending in a tie.

The Pittsburgh team set up a temporary training camp at Forest Grove, a college town 30 miles west of here. The Steelers flew into Portland Thursday night.

Both offensive attacks will feature top-flight passing, sure to produce crowd-pleasing touchdowns. Each team also has a steady running game.

Norm Van Brocklin and understudy Billy Wade will share the passing for Sid Gillman's Los Angeles team. Skeet Quinlan and Tank Younger are expected to open as Ram halfbacks with Dan Towler at fullback. Speedy Bob Boyd will see duty at half and offensive end. Tom Fears and Bob Long are scheduled to draw the starting assignments at offensive end.

Gillman New Coach
This is Gillman's first year as a pro coach, having come from the head coaching job at the University of Cincinnati.

Pittsburgh Coach Walter Kiesling, starting his second season with the Steelers, will rely on the passing of Jim Finks and the running of Lynn Chandross, Ray Mathews and Fran Rogel.

Clear skies and mild temperatures are likely for the game, which will not be televised in Oregon. Kickoff time is 8:30 p.m.

Giants' Star Forced to Quit

ROCHESTER, Minn. (AP) — Davey Williams, second base key to the 1954 champion New York Giants, is quitting baseball because of a back ailment.

Doctors at the Mayo Clinic told the 26-year-old Texan he was suffering from spinal arthritis and possibly a slipped disc. Williams had come to the clinic Tuesday for a series of examinations. He had been on and off the bench since late June.

"It came as quite a shock after spending all my life in baseball, to have a group of doctors tell me I was all through," said Williams.

"I don't have the faintest idea what the future is."

When Manager Leo Durocher heard the bad news in St. Louis he said Williams would see owner Horace Stohmeyer in New York Saturday.

The Giants had just announced some discouraging news about another second baseman before the Williams' report was released.

In New York, it was revealed Foster Castleman, 24-year-old second baseman with the Minneapolis farm club of the American Assn., would be operated on for removal of a cartilage in his left knee.

He was counted on a replacement for Williams but has been handicapped by chronic knee trouble.

Wayne Terwilliger, current Giants second baseman, also was hitless in his last 3 trips, and his average was down to .205.

The Giants brought up Terwilliger when it became apparent that Williams would spend most of the year on the sidelines.

All-Stars Nip Cards, 9 to 6

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP) — The College All Stars edged the Chicago Cardinals of the National Football League, 9-6, in a game-type scrimmage at Northwestern University Friday.

No extra points, punts or kick-offs were used in the drill designed to prime the Collegians for the 22nd All-Star Game with the Cleveland Browns at Soldier Field in Chicago Aug. 12.

After the Cardinals scored their only touchdown on a Lamar McMan's quarterback sneak, the Collegians scored on a nine-yard pass from quarterback Ralph Guglielmi of Notre Dame to end Henry Hair of Georgia Tech and a 28-yard field goal by Ohio State's Tad Weed.

The All-Star attack featured the consistent pass-grabbing of end Max Boydson of Oklahoma and the running of halfback Dick Moele of Rice, and fullbacks Mel Triplett of Toledo U. and Joe Heap of Notre Dame. Tackle Roney Grier of Penn State starred defensively.

A near free-for-all developed after guard Sam Palumbo of Notre Dame and halfback Ollie Watson of the Cards engaged in a shoving contest. However, order was quickly restored and the two principals shook hands.

Slo-Mo V in Bad Flip During Qualifying Run

SEATTLE (AP) — Darling Lou Fageol, ace of the Gold Cup speed jockeys, narrowly escaped death and the Slo-mo-shun V, defending Gold Cup champion, was knocked out of this year's competition as the boat leaped out of the water and flipped over traveling about 160 miles an hour Friday.

The Slo-mo landed right side up but the rear end was badly battered, causing too much damage for immediate repairs.

Fageol, of Kent, Ohio, president of the Twin Coach Motors Co., dove clear and was promptly picked up, floating unconscious in his lifejacket. A hospital reported later his condition was satisfactory after he received a blood transfusion, oxygen and sedatives. X-rays were to be taken to check for internal injuries.

At his bedside, his wife suggested that he quit racing and he replied: "You're right. I guess I've had it."

Stan Sayres, owner of the Slo-mo V and its sister boat, the Slo-mo-shun IV, said the transom (stern) of the upset boat was badly battered.

"I'm not even going to try to get it ready again," he said, definitely eliminating it from Sunday's big hydroplane racing classic.

In the excitement-filled day, four more boats qualified, bringing to 10 the number set to go Sunday, and a referee's resignation brought a threatened boycott of the big event.

Contrary to previous announcements that Friday was the last one to qualify, the Such Crust III, Detroit, whose stern was ripped by a broken rudder two days ago, and the Zephyr Fury, of Los Angeles, will be given chances to qualify Saturday.

Another development which brought protests from the camp of the Rebel Shuf, Norfolk, Va., was a ruling that Lt. Col. Ross Schleeh, U. S. Air Force, who was at the controls when it qualified Thursday was barred from Sunday's race.

The racing drivers' rating committee said he was too inexperienced. Joe Schoenheit, Detroit, chairman of the committee, also told Ray Crawford, Los Angeles, owner of the Zephyr Fury, that even if he qualified Saturday Crawford would not be permitted to drive in the race. Neither he nor Schleeh have ever driven in an unlimited class race.

Fageol's accident occurred on the third lap of the Slo-mo V's qualifying trial. He had turned two laps at 117.291 miles an hour and was heading into a final turn.

"I was going about 160 miles an hour and slowing down to go into the turn," Fageol said. "A gust of wind set up a fluttering motion."

"I rode her through the first flutters, but when I felt it go into the loop I jumped."

Other drivers and spectators along the log boom said the boat was "actually airborne" when it flipped and when Fageol leaped. Several witnesses said he left the (Continued on next page)

Chicago and Cleveland ran afoul of the second division and wound up in a virtual three-way tie with New York for first place in the rousing American League race Friday night.

The Yankees, riding home on Yogi Berra's three-run homer — defeated fifth place Detroit 3-0 while last place Baltimore scored an unearned run in the 11th inning to knock off the White Sox 2-1, and seventh place Washington whacked the Indians 7-5.

Chicago still claims a two-percentage-point edge on the lead, with the Yanks and Indians tied right behind the White Sox.

Fourth place Boston also was clipped by the also-rans, losing 5-2 to sixth place Kansas City, to remain two games off the pace.

The Phils scored three in the eighth on four walks, and an error to spill the Cards. Del Ennis and Bobby Morgan, each homered for the winners.

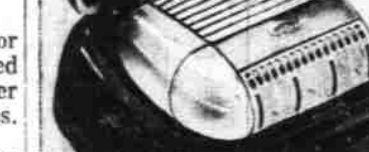
