Help of Public Requested by Postal Service

The public can aid greatly in speeding flow of mail by posting letters and other first-class matter as early in the day as possible, Salem Postmaster Albert Gragg said Friday.

Gragg added that the Post Office Department, faced with increasing heavy mail volume, is taking every step to facilitate processing. Public cooperation will help, he added.

The Salem office, according to Gragg, handled approximately 2,100,000 pieces of first class mail in July—averaging 67,000 pieces a day. That was about 198,000 above the July figure for a year ago.

Larger Boxes

New-type mail boxes, with five or six times the capacity of the old box-on-a-post type, have been in place on five downtown street corners for some time now.

Gragg said more new boxes will be added in the city as volume further increases.

The postmaster pointed out that the public benefits itself by early posting of mail. As examples, all matter posted by 5:30 p.m. each day makes connection with 7 p.m. truck service to Portland. This is the first leg of distribution to all points on the compass.

5 p.m. Deadline

Air mail, said Gragg, can be on its way the day of mailing if posted by 5 p.m. When room is available, some other mail is carried by plane in what is termed the "air lift" operation. Mail has no chance of making the "air lift" unless posted by 4:30 p.m.

Mail deposited in the post office at the opening hour of 5 a.m. or shortly after will connect with a 6:30 a.m. train into Portland.

Gragg emphasized that the post-office is open from 5 a.m. until midnight each day. When the office is closed the mailbox on the corner of Court and Church Streets serves as just as speedy a deposit place.

Included in the project are extension of revetments at Dexter Dam, and flood protective facilities and installation of a drainage culvert for a county road near Jasper.

Acts of 84th Congress Appraised by Norblad

Some good, some bad legislation came out of the 84th Congress, said Rep. Walter Norblad here Saturday. Norblad arrived at his Stayton home Friday night following adjournment.

Norblad brushed off a question about possibility of his being a candidate for U. S. senator next year with the statement, "I have no comment regarding any future political plans."

The representative said most members of Congress felt the recent Geneva Conference might have been the "springboard" for eventually bringing the United States and Russia nearer a common ground. Norblad added that the role President Eisenhower played at the conference earned plaudits from many congressmen.

Norblad said he recently received an invitation from a Russian Embassy secretary to visit the Soviet Union. The lawmaker did not say whether he would accept the invitation.

Norblad felt that reducing the personnel of the standing army and increasing the reserves was

among more important legislation enacted by the Congress. Norblad said failure of either of the two proposed highway construction programs to receive approval of the last Congress was regrettable. He attributed defeat of the two bills to the methods of financing proposed but added one bill, with amendments, probably would receive favorable consideration at the next Congress.

Two Programs
A highway program was proposed by President Eisenhower and the other by a Democratic group in Congress.

He said the housing program approved by Congress apparently was not satisfactory to anyone.

Norblad said he had no conclusion on the recent order of the Federal Power commission authorizing construction of three low dams by the Idaho Power Company. "I have always relied on the decisions and recommendations of experts in matters of this kind," Norblad said.

These experts, according to Norblad, studied the dam situation for more than two years.

Prosperity Cited
Business conditions were praised by Norblad. "We have less unemployment and workers are receiving the largest income in history," Norblad averred. "There is slight apprehension in some quarters because economic conditions are so good," Norblad said, "and we should strive to keep this economy on a high level."

Norblad said he would remain in Oregon until Congress reconvenes and would travel over his district. He will maintain temporary offices in the Salem Post-office during his stay in Oregon.

Mrs. Norblad and son preceded the representative to Oregon from Washington.

Polk Forest To Honor Late G. Gerlinger

The George T. Gerlinger state experimental forest, located at Black Rock near Falls City, will be dedicated Aug. 25. The forest consists of 1,000 acres of 40-year old Douglas fir.

Gerlinger was for 30 years a member of the Oregon State Board of Forestry, the longest term ever served, and has been called the father of Oregon's forestry program. His Black Rock and Snow Peak tree farms were among the first certified in the nation.

The dedication program will get underway at noon at the forest site with a luncheon. Gerlinger's widow and family will be introduced.

The forest is hoped someday to provide answers to questions concerning silvicultural management and the economics of utilizing thin-lings in young fir forests.
