Walker Blisters Cards With Talk

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Harry (The Hat) Walker, usually mild-mannered manager of the young St. Louis Cardinals, has blistered his players for their "pink tea" brand of baseball.

Walker, who has exhibited unusual patience since he took over from the fired Eddie Stanky, was thoroughly angered after the seventh-place Cardinals lost to Philadelphia 7-4 Friday night for their 11th defeat in 14 games.

He all but exploded when some of the Cardinals yelled "Dirty play" at the way Jim Greengrass of the Phils bullied his way into home plate, accidentally spiking catcher Bill Sarni and permitting the Phils to go ahead.

Tongue Lashing
Then, after the game and behind closed doors, the scowling Walker gave the Cardinals a goin'over. "It's about time that the Cardinals' tradition means something to some of these fellows," Walker said later. "I'm fed up with those blanky-blank bases on balls and the tense pitching that gets pitchers behind hitters to the point they groove a fat one."

"I'm fed up with our right-handed hitters not hitting left-handers. 'No Pink Tea'."

"But mainly, I'm fed up because some of these fellows seem satisfied to sit back. You've got to step out and take charge in this game or go back to the bushes."

"It's no pink tea up here." Of Greengrass' rugged slide into home, Walker said "That's the way to play ball—the way guys like (Enos) Slaughter and others won reputations as well as ball games and championships."

But the Japanese won the relay—in world record time—and picked up points in the 400 meter freestyle, blanking American ace Bill Woolsey of Indiana University. Woolsey is representing the Hawaii Swim Club.

Both Break Record
Japan was clocked in 3:46.8 in the relay, bettering the old standard of 3:47.9 set by Yale University in 1951. The Americans also smashed the old mark, finishing in 3:47.6.

The team was composed of Dave McIntyre of the University of North Carolina; Woolsey; Reid Patterson of the University of Georgia; and Sandy Gideon of Yale.

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Friction Subsides . . .

Cup Race Classic Awaits Fastest Boats

SEATTLE (AP)—Ten of America's fastest speedboats are set for Sunday's Gold Cup racing classic on Lake Washington.

As driver friction—which was overshadowing piston friction—subsided during a series of meetings Saturday, it looked by the hour more like the premier speedboat event it always has been and less like a lakeshore wrangle.

One of the final points of contention was eliminated Saturday afternoon when the drivers' committee reversed a morning decision and agreed to let Col. Russ Schlee, an old hand at jet airplanes, drive the Rebel Suh of Norfolk, Va.

He had been judged previously as lacking in qualifications for the tricky and dangerous job of piloting a high speed hydroplane in the crowded field on the 3 1/4-mile course.

Threat Ends
The reversal of the ruling on Schlee ended the threat of the withdrawal of the Rebel and Miss Thriftway, a new Seattle entry, from the race.

Ted Jones, designer of both boats had threatened to keep the Rebel "on the beach" if Schlee could not drive it. The Thriftway's owner had said he might do the same.

The drivers' committee, the Gold Cup Committee of the American Power Boat Assn., voted unanimously last Saturday afternoon to ban a straightaway "flying start" for the race.

A dispute over the type of racing start had brought the resignation of Mel Crook, Montclair, N. J., the referee, and the threat of a race boycott by Detroit drivers.

It was a ruling against flying starts by Referee Crook that led to controversy and his resignation Friday.

Too Dangerous
His successor, Stanley Donogh of Seattle, polled drivers on the issue Saturday morning, and all but the driver of one Seattle entry opposed the "flying start." They have criticized the straightaway run to the starting line as too dangerous.

Meanwhile, Lou Fagel of Kent, Ohio, famed racing driver who was injured severely Friday when the Sno-mo-shun V, the defending champion, was wrecked, was reported to have a punctured lung, broken ribs and muscle injuries.

A doctor said he had been lucky "to pull through" and that he faces a week to 10 days in the hospital.

The Sno-mo V is definitely out of the race. Ten other boats, including the sister Sno-mo IV of Seattle, have qualified for Sunday's spectacular 90-mile race.

Sheddy Quits At Holy Cross
WORCESTER, Mass. (AP)—Lester H. (Buster) Shedd, resigned Saturday as basketball coach at Holy Cross College in a salary dispute.

Shedd has coached the Crusaders since the spring of 1948 and in seven seasons his teams won 155 games while losing only 36.

His teams were in tournaments in six of the seven seasons and in 1954 Holy Cross won the Sugar Bowl and National Invitational Tournament championships.

Both Holy Cross officials and Shedd admitted that salary terms prompted the resignation.

In a hasty interview Shedd said he regretted leaving Holy Cross "because of the type of boys I had, and friendships I formed."

He added, "My philosophy has been to make gentlemen as well as basketball players and there is also the philosophy of economy for a family man to consider. I have to look for the right remuneration."

"I'm just going to sit back and await offers," he said.

It is known that at least one Big Seven school (unidentified) and La Salle College, Philadelphia, made overtures to Shedd in the last couple of years.

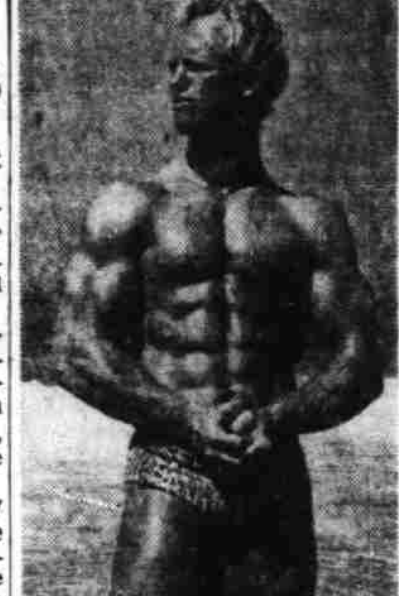
49ers to Battle With Washington
