Senator Knowland's Daughter Serving as His Summer Hostess

WASHINGTON—Estelle Knowland, daughter of Senate Minority Leader William R. Knowland (R-Calif.), is serving as summer hostess for her father and working as full-time secretary in his office on Capitol Hill.

"I'm not on his official payroll," Estelle, who will be 18 in November, hastens to explain, "and I don't expect to go into politics, though I'm getting a good first-hand view of government that ought to help me with my studies at college."

Estelle, who is a student at Stanford University, is majoring in political science and modern European history. She hasn't decided on a career as yet. She has shown considerable talent as an artist and has done a number of portraits in oil, and pencil and charcoal sketches, including some of her father.

Her mother, Helen Knowland, has written several mystery stories, one of which "Madame Baltimore," with a Washington setting, was published in 1949. She is now at the family home in Piedmont. Currently, she is concerned with the construction of a swimming pool. Estelle believes she is also working on another book.

"She has talked of writing some serious, historical novels, but Mother keeps her writing to herself," Estelle explained.

Breakfast Every Morning

Meanwhile Estelle is keeping things running smoothly for her father in Washington where the family has a two-bedroom apartment. The senator and his daughter breakfast every morning at eight in the Senate dining room. Estelle works in her father's office from 9 to 5 p.m., mainly answering correspondence dealing with legislation. She stays on the Hill until the Senate adjourns, which is sometimes quite late in the evening.

"When Dad has to go to a party, or reception, I accompany

him as his hostess," Estelle said. "He knows everybody and going to parties day in and day out is strenuous for Dad, but I find it all very interesting and enjoyable."

Estelle is the youngest of the Knowland's three children. Their son, Joseph William Knowland, is drama critic on the Oakland Tribune, which is owned by the Knowland family and Mrs. Harold W. Jewett Jr.
