Ford Racks Win In All-American

CHICAGO (AP)—National PGA champion Doug Ford successfully battled a tough field and a brisk wind for a closing 70 to capture the \$3,420 first prize in the All-American golf tourney by three strokes Sunday.

Ford's 72-hole total of 227 was 11 below Tam O'Shanter par. The 33-year-old Ford, fourth leading money winner this year, had rounds of 69-69-69-70 as he overhauled Australia's Peter Thomson on a final round which was ruffled by a cool, 15-mile-per-hour wind.

Grabbing the second prize of \$2,360 with 280 was Leo Biagetti, surprising pro from Willoughby, Ohio, who started the final round four strokes behind and buzzed to a closing 70.

Thomson had led at 54 holes with 206, followed by Ford and Freddie Haas Jr., at 207. The All-American, paying \$25,000 to 40 places, was merely a prelude to Tam's \$100,000 "world" championship tourney next week which has golf's biggest winning first place payoff, \$50,000.

About 107 players, all of whom had to compete in the All-American, will play in the "world," also a 72-hole medal play showdown. The four-ringed All-American fairways circuit also produced these champions:

Women's pro—Patty Berg, with a windup 75 for 302 and the \$1,000 first prize.

Men's amateur—Doug Sanders, 22, Cedarhurst, Ga., with a closing 74 and 286 for a five-stroke margin.

Women's amateur—Wiffi Smith, 18, St. Clair, Mich., with a final 81 for 322 and a 10-stroke triumph.

Ford, who now has earned \$19,000 this year, started Sunday with a bogey five on the first hole, but easily outsteered Thomson, who played in the same three-some along with Gardner Dickinson.

Combating a wind that was tricky and gusty, Ford bagged birdies on the second and fourth for an opening 35. He grabbed a birdie four on the 10th and after a bogey five on the 12th, sewed up the tournament with a birdie three on the 13th to go 11 under par.

Defending champion Jerry Barber wound up far off the pace with 291, while the people's choice, Sammy Sneed, could do no better than 286 with a poor fourth round of 73.

The year's leading money-winner, Cary Middlecott, wobbled to a 287. Third place in the All-American men's pro was shared at 283 by four players—Ted Kroll, Tony Holguin, Jimmy Demaret and Freddie Haas Jr.

Thomson, who last year also led at the 54-hole mark with 206, collapsed for a feeble 78 to finish seventh with 284.

Bosox Creep Up In Torrid Derby

Chicago clung to first place in the American League by three percentage points Sunday after playing a 12-inning 2-2 tie with Baltimore while New York split and Cleveland lost. Boston edged within 1 1/2 games of the top by bombing Kansas City in a single game.

The weatherman stuck his nose into the pennant fight, washing out scheduled second games for the White Sox and Indians and stopping Chicago before it could finish its first game.

A heavy rainstorm forced the calling of the Chicago-Baltimore game with Jim Busby on second base and two out in the top of the 13th. The game went into the record as an official 12-inning tie and all individual performances count.

However, it will be played over in its entirety along with the rained-out second game when the Sox visit Baltimore for the last time in September.

Mantle Hits Homers

Mickey Mantle's 10th inning homer, his 26th of the season and second of the ball game, enabled the Yankees to down Detroit 3-2 and take over undisputed possession of second place. Detroit had won the opener 4-2 on successive doubles by Al Kaline and Jack Phillips and Ray Boone's triple.

Washington continued to haunt the Cleveland club, beating the Indians 9-3 in the first game behind Johnny Schmitz. The second game was rained out in the last of the third with both teams scoreless.

As a result of the defeat, the Indians dropped to third place, a half game behind Chicago.

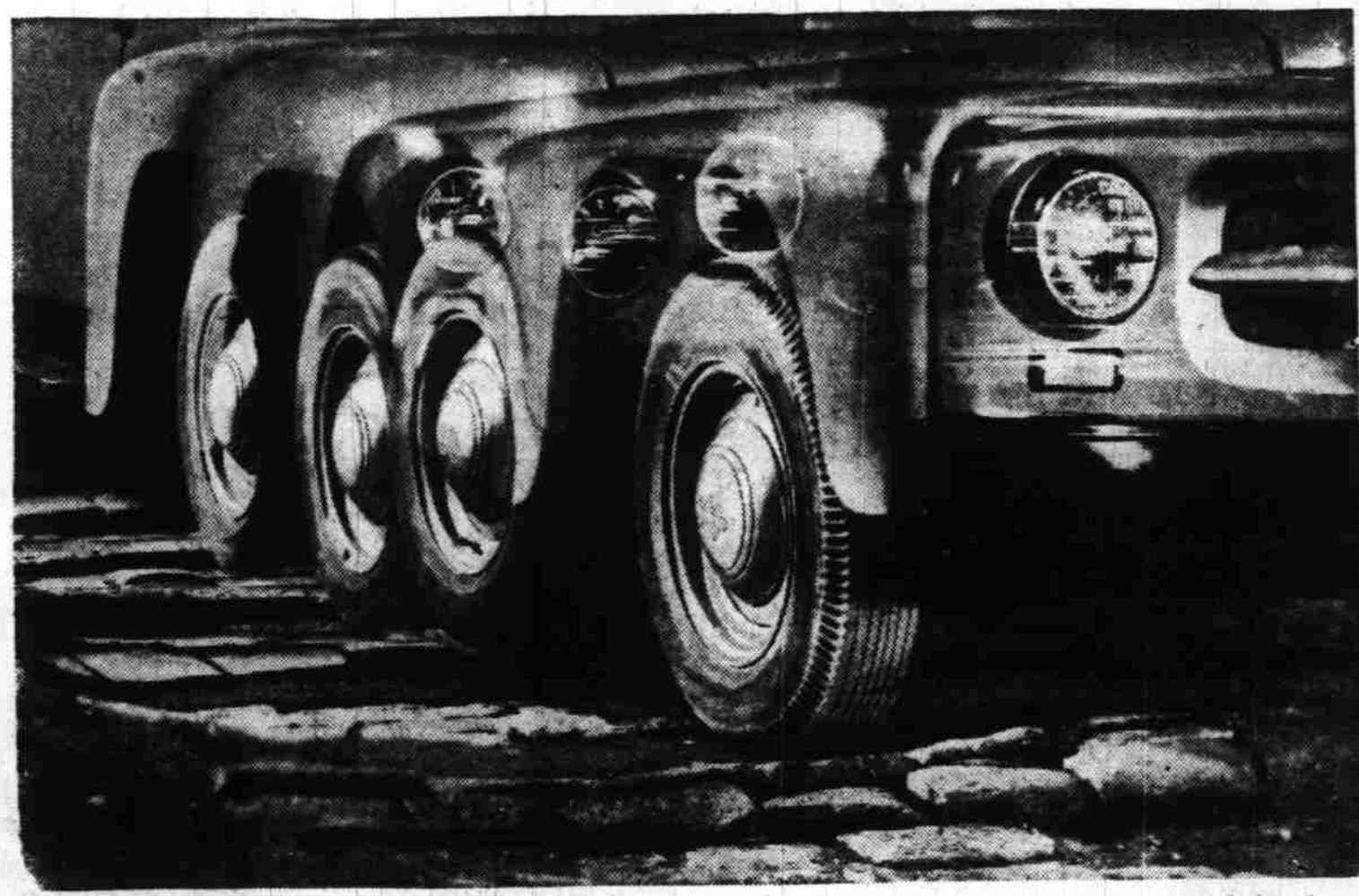
