Stock Hard Tops Race At Hollywood Tonight

The Capital Auto Racing association, the outfit which provided last week's wreck-loaded jolopy destruction derby here, returns to Hollywood Bowl action tonight. Only this time the CAR pilots will do their romping and stomping in stock hard tops during a full program.

Time trials start at 7:45 p.m. Trophy dash, heat races and Class B and A mainers will follow, with the latter event scheduled for 50 laps, the longest race of the season to date, for the stock hard toppers here.

Well over 30 entries are registered for the card, for the McMinnville-Carlton association, which has duelled with the local outfit in dirt track racing battles at Carlton, is to enter a number of cars tonight.

The Capital Association has grown in popularity to the extent that it has provided full racing cards at Portland and Astoria this season. The group was known as the "Maniacs Racing Association" last year, but changed names. After watching them go at it in some of their events, fans are wondering why the change was made. Speedboat Set For Boosters

SEATTLE (AP)—A new speedboat with 40,000 owners may be in the challenge picture when the Gold Cup race is run next year at Detroit.

Workers at the Boeing Airplane Company said Friday they are forming the Boeing Employees' Power Boat Association, Inc., with the idea of capturing the top prize in American speedboat racing.

Jack Errington, spokesman for the 40,000 potential owners, said they would invite a former co-worker—Ted Jones of Seattle—to design the craft. Jones is designer of a number of today's top-flight boats.

Errington said it would not be a company venture, but strictly an employee program—"We're on our own." He said the cost was expected to be about \$40,000 by the time the boat is ready for trials.

"If and when she gets into the water," he added, "She'll take part in all unlimited class races. That's our intent right from the start." The Gold Cup, which was held for five years by the Seattle-owned Sio-mo-shun fleet of two boats, returned to Detroit this year when it was won by Joe Schoenheit's Gale V.

Rain Storms Hinder Sports

Bantam Cloudburst Puts Halt to Events

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Heavy rain storms, floods and the ominous threat of erratic hurricane Connie washed a host of sports events off the calendar in the Eastern United States Friday. In Philadelphia, a bantam cloudburst forced postponement of the opening matches in the Australia-Italy interzone Davis Cup final. With more rain forecast for Saturday, there were problems galore for the tennis officials.

Torrents of rain in New York flooded parts of the city, forcing the New York Giants to call off their night game with the Pittsburgh Pirates and Brooklyn to postpone its night game with Philadelphia.

Means Arise Prospects of more rain Saturday brought means in Brooklyn because the Dodgers have set up a special program to honor their all-time team.

In addition, the regular game will feature a battle between Don Newcombe (18-2) and Robin Roberts (18-9), the two top winners in the majors.

The New York Yankees game in Baltimore, where they were to have faced ex-mate Eddie Lopat, also was postponed. And rain washed out the night game between Washington and the Red Sox at Boston.

Archie Moore was driven indoors at North Adams, Mass., to work out in the YMCA gym in preparation for his Sept. 20 title fight with heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano. In the absence of an indoor ring, he confined his work to punching the bag and skipping rope.

At Saratoga Springs, N. Y., the rain didn't keep Nashua off the track. The colt breezed 7-furlongs in 1:35 in deep mud, getting ready for his big match race with Swaps, Aug. 31 at Chicago.

But the rain did call off the harness race programs at Saratoga as well as at Yonkers and Roosevelt raceways in New York.

It also washed out the Newport Tennis Tourney and left the officials confronted with the problem of how to finish play by Monday, when the national doubles start at Brookline, Mass.

Swimming Mark Topped by Girl

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Despite a driving rain and gusts of wind up to 25 miles per hour, one world record was shattered, one equalled and a meet record in the diving competition as the women's National AAU Swimming and Diving Championships completed its second day in John B. Kelly Pool.

Fifteen-year-old Karin Cone, young unattached entrant from Ridgewood, N. J., set the world mark for a 50-meter course when she won the 200-meter backstroke in 2:45.6; Marie Gillett, Walter Reed Swimming Club, Washington, tied a world mark in the 400-meter individual medley (6:01.5); and 14-year-old Wanda Werner, also of Walter Reed, tied a meet record, winning the 100-meter free style in 1:06.1.

Mother of Three Juno Stover Irwin, 24-year-old Pasadena, Calif., mother of three, turned in the big upset of the meet when she won the platform diving competition from Olympic champion Pat McCormick of Los Angeles.

Mrs. McCormick, America's premier woman diver, thus lost the first of three diving crowns she captured in this meet last year.

Miss Cone's 200-meter backstroke mark broke the old mark set by Judith Termes of Hungary in Berlin in 1951.

In tying the meet record for the 100-meter free style, Miss Werner averaged a defeat in last spring's Pan-American Games by defeating Helen Stewart of the Vancouver B. C. Amateur Swimming Club by three meters.

Mary Ann Marchino of Indianapolis was second to Miss Cone in 2:46.7, followed by Maureen Murphy of Portland, Ore.

Rule Affects Winter Ball NEW YORK (AP)—Willie Mays of the New York Giants and any other major leaguer with more than two years experience, except native Caribbeanans, won't be able to play winter baseball this year in Cuba, Puerto Rico, Venezuela and Panama.

The Caribbean Baseball Confederation reached an agreement with Commissioner Ford Frick and representatives of the majors and minors Friday on a new deal for the 1955-56 winter season.

Under the revised rules, requested by the Caribbean confederation, each club can use four major league players, including native Caribbeanans. The native Caribbean players can have unlimited major league experience but the others must not have played more than two years in the majors.

In addition to the four bona-fide big leaguers, each team can use two men from the major league reserve list. They must have less than 45 days major league experience in the current season.

In effect, this new agreement would rule out a man like Mays, who played winter ball in Puerto Rico last season while Ruben Gomez, of the Giants, a native of Puerto Rico, would be allowed to play.

Haros Fails In Record Bid LONDON (AP)—Lazlo Tabori and Sandor Haros, a pair of Hungarian milers, hit the tape together in 4 minutes, 5 seconds Friday in the much heralded international bid to lower the world record below the present mark of 3:58.

Although they were clocked in the same time, Tabori was awarded first place.

Their tactics—a slow start and then a terrific finish—shunted Chris Chataway and Ken Wood of Great Britain to third and fourth place in the race that featured the first British-Hungarian dual meet.

It was apparent from the very start that the two Hungarians were after points Friday instead of records. The record holder of the 30,000 spectators at White City Stadium withered when it took 66.5 seconds to run the first quarter.

In an added invitation two-mile, Ken Reiser of Oregon finished last in the nine-man field about 100 yards behind the winner, Jack Heywood of Britain who was clocked in 9:02.4.

Dick Blair of Kansas, easily won the invitation 220-yard dash in 2:14 with John Bennett, formerly of Marquette and now of the U. S. Army, second in 2:22.

Then Fordham's power-striding Tom Courtney ran off with the invitation 800, winning in 1:50.2 from a field of seven.
