

Senators Bow to Spokane in Series Opener 4-2

Giants Joined By All-Stars

Four New Rookies To Add Strength

Four new faces bearing well-known names among the football world were among the New York Giants as they ran through two workouts at McCulloch Stadium Monday. The four were the Giant rookies who played a big part in the College All-Stars win over the world champion Cleveland Browns last Friday.

They were Joe Heap, halfback from Notre Dame who was New York's No. 1 draft choice; Mel Triplett, 215-pound fullback from Toledo who scored one of the Stars' touchdowns against the Browns; Roosevelt Grier, 261-pound tackle from Penn State and a standout on defense for the All-Stars; and Rex Boggan, another Mississippi contribution to the Giants, who fills a tackle position well with his 245-pound frame.

The four huskies joined the Giants in both a morning and afternoon workout as Head Coach Jim Lee Howell and his staff began preparing them for their next game. That will be against the San Francisco 49ers in an exhibition clash at Seattle Saturday.

Few Injuries
Only a few players were on the sidelines Monday as a result of injuries received in last Saturday's battle with the Green Bay Packers that the Packers won, 31-24, in the last 45 seconds of the game. These included Bill Austin, who was hobbled by a bad knee, and Hal Mitchell, who suffered a slight concussion.

Both of the new rookie tackles should be of some help in adding strength to the Giant line. Howell pinpointed defensive weakness at middle guard in the game with the Packers.

Grier, the bigger of the two new tackles, was quite a track star in his college days as well as bolstering the Penn State line. He won the ICA shot put championship last spring with his 57-foot tosses. He was also a whiz at the discus.

Heap Best Known
Heap is probably the best known of the rookies but didn't get too much chance to show his ability in the game against Cleveland. The 23-year-old Notre Dame star was a big factor in the impressive winning streak built up by Notre Dame, which earned him top choice in the Giant draft call.

Two more workouts are scheduled for the New Yorkers Tuesday but this may be cut to one daily before they leave Friday for Seattle.

Boxing Seeks Congress Help

DETROIT (AP) — The National Boxing Assn. Monday launched a campaign to clean up big-time boxing, unanimously adopting a resolution calling for a congressional investigation of the sport.

Earlier, delegates to the group's annual convention here learned the FBI already is investigating professional boxing, long under fire for its alleged infiltration by underworld influences.

Gov. George M. Leader of Pennsylvania who suspended professional boxing in his state last May, joined the move to clean up the sport. In a keynote address Monday, he called for adoption of a uniform athletic code to regulate boxing across the nation.

Response Enthusiastic
His talk drew enthusiastic response from nearly 150 representatives of 47 state boxing commissions and Canada and several Latin American countries. Only New York is not a member of the NBA.

Anthony Petronella, NBA president, said he would appoint a seven-man committee Tuesday to meet with Leader in an effort to develop such a code.

The resolution recommended that an appropriate committee of the U. S. Congress inaugurate at the earliest possible moment a complete investigation into the conduct of boxing in the United States in every respect to determine whether there do exist such undesirable interests as has been publicly charged.

Under Investigation
Professional boxing has not yet come under the scrutiny of Congress, but George A. Barton, former president of the NBA and now chairman of the Minnesota Athletic Commission, disclosed the FBI has been investigating the sport since last June.

He called the FBI probe "the probable salvation of boxing." Barton said he expects to be called to Washington to testify before a Senate investigating committee. He said Julius Helfand, chairman of the New York Athletic Commission, also had agreed to testify.

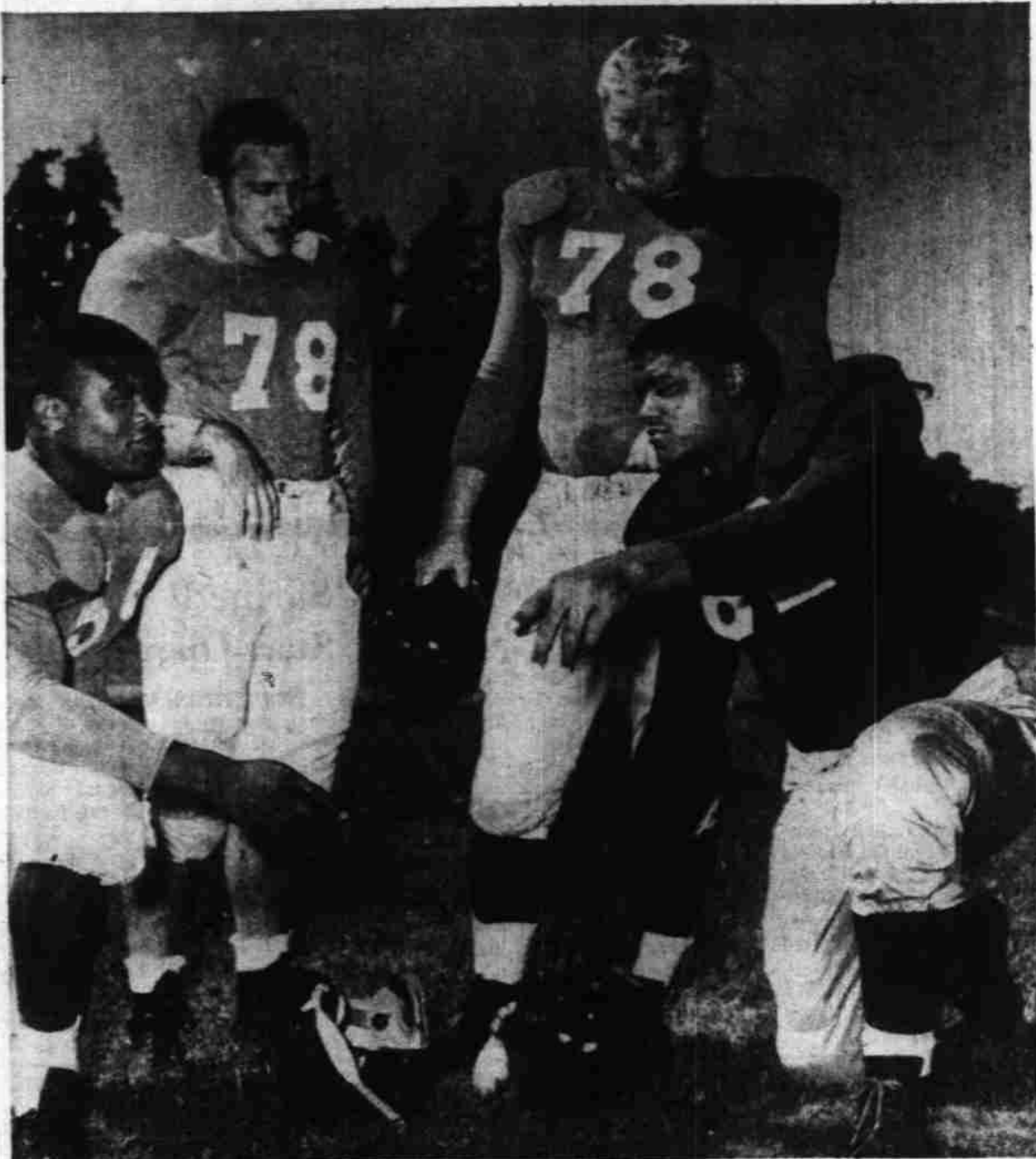

Yankees Grab AL Top Spot

New York Sweeps Two From Orioles

The New York Yankees rolled back into the American League lead Monday night by sweeping a second doubleheader from Baltimore in less than 48 hours, pushing idle Cleveland into second place, a half game behind.

The Yanks won 5-4 and 12-6. In the only other AL action, fourth place Boston trounced Washington 8-4 to stay within 3½ games of the lead.

New York, in third place Saturday, followed Chicago's White Sox and Cleveland as the third team to hold the lead in the tight flag fight in the last seven days. The White Sox, first a week ago, also were idle Sunday and wound up 1½ games behind in third.

Homers Bring Win

The Yankees, who slipped out of first place July 23, rode past the last place Orioles on home runs. Hank Bauer, slugging his third in two days, won the opener with his 13th homer in the ninth inning, breaking a 4-4 tie.

In the nightcap, Mickey Mantle slammed his 28th homer, batting left-handed, with two on as the Yanks took an 8-0 lead in the fourth inning. In the sixth, batting right-handed, Mickey hit No. 29 with none on while the Bombers made it a 10-2 lead.

Rookie Johnny Kucks was the first game winner, relieving Bob Wiesler, who gave way as the Orioles scored four runs in the fifth to tie the score.

Bill Wright went all the way for Baltimore, losing his fourth. Bauer's homer was one of two hits allowed by the southpaw after the fourth inning.

Coleman Victor

Manager Casey Stengel started rookie Gary (Rip) Coleman, added Sunday from Denver, in the second contest. The young left-hander was credited with his first major league victory, although needing relief help from Bob Grimm, just off the disabled list, when the Orioles scored four in the sixth.

Ted Williams got the Red Sox rolling with his 13th grand slam homer of his career as Boston hopped to a 6-0 lead in the second inning.

It was a 450-foot wallop off Ted Abernathy and the 20th home run of the year for Boston's batting wizard — who now is tied with Ralph Kiner for the grand slam lead among active players.

Piersall Homers

Boston got the other two runs on Jim Piersall's one-on homer in the seventh after Washington had chased starter Mel Parnell with four in the third as Roy Sievers homered with two on base.

Southpaw Leo Kiehl ended the Nats' rally and checked them on one hit the rest of the way for his second triumph.

Milwaukee routed the St. Louis Cardinals, 12-1, running up a 5-0 lead while chasing Willard Schmidt, who one-hit the Braves last week. Eddie Mathews hit his 31st homer with one on in the first while Warren Spahn, winning his 11th, drove in three runs with a triple and homer.

Aussie Net Stars Gain Final Round

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Australia blasted its way into the Davis Cup challenge round Monday when Lew Hoad and Rex Hartwig crushed Italy's Nicola Pietrangeli and Orlando Sirola in the doubles to take an insurmountable 3-0 lead in the inter-zone tennis final.

The scores were 7-5, 13-11, 7-5. The defending champion United States and Australia, two old sparring partners, will meet in the challenge round for the coveted cup in Forest Hills, Aug. 26, 27, 28.

King's Home Run Avoids a Shutout

The town Senators should have tried the Spokane Indians at softball in their Northwest League series opener, last night at Waters Field. They might have fared better. The Solons surprisingly spilled the City League All-Star softballers in the brief preliminary exhibition, by a 4-2 score, but then lost by the same count to Eddie Lake's Tribe in the main event. And were it not for a last-ditch home run in the ninth inning, by Ronnie King, the home clan would have absorbed its seventh shutout defeat.

Young Pat Trierweiler, he of the strong arm and tongue-twisting name, was the culprit who did it to our men in the baseball game. The youthful right-hander buzzed his way through the Solons in impressive fashion until the ninth. Then King clouted his first round-tripper of the season over the right field wall, with Jack Steinagel aboard.

For other than King's sudden blast Trierweiler was in serious trouble only once in going for his 10th victory of the season. That once came in the sixth when both Gene Tansell and Don Frailey slashed singles with two out. Agosta next up shot a liner toward right field, but waiting to haul it in for the third out was First-sacker Joe Porter.

Trierweiler whiffed seven and walked three in topping Big Bill Walsh of the Salems. He gave eight hits, three to Agosta.

Walsh turned in a creditable outing himself, but happened to be matched against too much opposition. An opening single by Eddie Murphy, followed by a couple of throwing errors tossed in Spokane's initial run, and Walsh walked the second one across in the fifth, after a walk, a base hit and a hit batter.

The final two tallies off the giant of the Solon staff came in the eighth on a bunt-hit by Porter and singles by Dick Hogan and Bill Sheets which loaded the bases. The first run scored on Bob Cerrato's roller to short and the second romped in on a wild pitch.

Walsh was touched for 12 hits, half of which were of the "bleeder" type. He fanned seven also, and walked four.

Second game of the series tonight, at eight o'clock, pitted Lefty Marion Cowdell of the Senators against Southpaw Phil Page of the Spokes.

In last night's opener the Senators, aided by a couple of Spokane players, surprised everyone in the arena (including themselves) by banging in three first-inning runs off Norv Hifficker, one of the top City League softy flingers. Mel Krause tripled, Bill Steinel singled and Don Frailey also singled around a walk and a wild pitch for the three tallies. Then in the third inning Steinel, noted for his ability to clout baseball out of sight, teed off on a Carl Beyer pitch and almost banged the left field fence with it for a home run. Even the softball veterans on hand opined it was the longest poke they'd ever seen anyone author in their favorite sport.

Bill Shields pitched the three-inning game for the Senators. He lost a run in the first on a hit batter and an error. Al Wickert's double turned out to be the second run, in the second, and it was the only bingle the All-Stars got off Shields, who has had some softball hurling experience.

The lineups for the softball game included Dunn, Krause, Steinel, Frailey, Tansell, Ray Webster and Shields for the Senators, with Bud Francis, Agosta, Bill Whitson and John Wortham also getting into the act. Johnny Hoffert, Woody Hall, Claude Weaver, Don Vandervort, Wickert, Dick Norton, Ward Jacobson, Wallie Unruh and Norv Hifficker made up the starting lineup for the Stars, with Carl Beyer, Jim Stewart and Fritz Beyer taking over for Mgr. Benn Valdez' troupe.

Following the softball game the Dallas Cub Baseball League champion Shell Oilers were presented with their title trophy by Hugh Luby, who pinch-hit for Dallas Mayor Hollis Smith. Also, Steinagel was presented with a suit of clothing by Ralph Cooley of Bishop's Clothing Store for his having hit the Bishop's ad atop the scoreboard in a recent series here.
