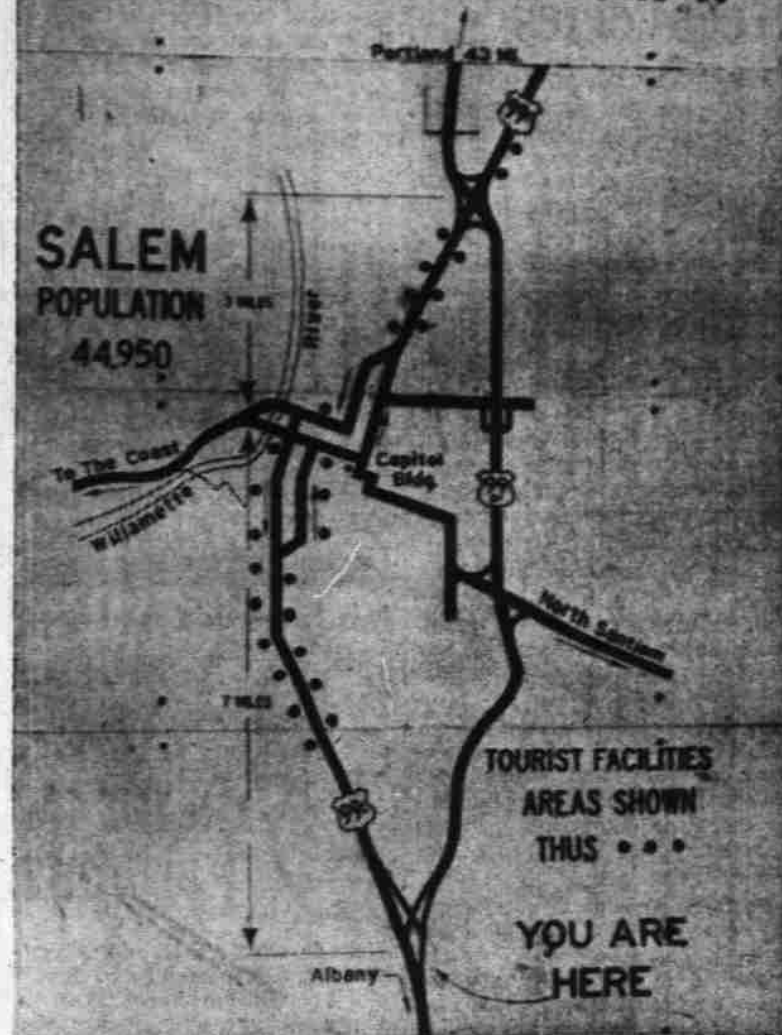


Highway Sign Tested

Opening at 10 a.m., the department will hear arguments for and against repeal of or additions to standard containers for raspberries, loganberries, blackberries, dewberries, and strawberries.

John Walker's Final Rites Set Thursday

Margarine Plant Site Dedicated

Ground was broken Tuesday for a building to house a new Salem industry—production of margarine—at 3371 Portland Rd. The building is expected to be completed in time to begin production in October.

The firm, Dutch Maid, plans to have a capacity of about 12,000 pounds of margarine each eight hour shift and will use a ton of milk daily.

Present at ground-breaking ceremonies were V. J. Osko, president; James B. Daniels, secretary-treasurer, and directors Ed Anderson, A. C. Battalio, Henry Blankevoort, A. J. Crose and Stanley Grove.

The building is being constructed by W. T. Sullivan for the company. Of concrete construction, it will contain about 2,500 square feet.

Arthur Bone, Ill, Resting Comfortably

Arthur Bone, editor of Farmers Union, who was taken ill Sunday while looking after property at Vale, is reported improving at the Ontario Hospital, where he was rushed for emergency major surgery.

4-H Auction Of Fat Stock To Top Show

The climax to the Marion County 4-H fall show being held at the State Fairgrounds Aug. 24-26 will be the 4-H Fat Stock auction sale. The sale is scheduled for the final night at 8 p.m. under the sponsorship of the Salem Lions Club.

Members of the Lions club in charge of the event this year are Lloyd Mason and Bill Leeper. Lane Sudell will be the auctioneer for the big event.

All animals sold through the sale must have been entered and shown in the 4-H classes at the show during the preceding days. Any animal that cannot be shown and handled by the club member alone will not be sold through the sales ring, Mason reports.

Builders' UF Goal Placed At \$14,500

The United Fund goal for the contractors' and builders' division was set at \$14,500 Tuesday noon at a meeting of the division's two co-chairmen, E. S. Ritter and Alfred Chivers, with Campaign Chairman Kenneth Potts and other members of the UF cabinet.

The division was the second to set its goal. The professional division goal is \$20,000. Over-all UF goal for 1955 is \$205,000.

The Tuesday meeting was at the Senator Hotel. Division leaders announced that key assistants would be named soon and that another meeting would be set within a few days.

Oregon Records Over Two Fires Per Day for Time

Oregon had an average of 2 1/2 forest fires every day from the start of the fire season April 1 through July 31, the state forestry department said Tuesday.

Of the 291 fires on state and private lands in that period, 114 were caused by lightning.

The burned-over acreage totaled 1,262, or 80 more than in the same period last year.

Causes for fires also included: smokers 55, logging 25, careless campers 9, incendiaries 3.
