

North Africa Riots Kill 430 Sudan Army Revolt Spreads

KHARTOUM — The Sudan government said Saturday night the rebellion of army troops in the South is spreading on both sides of the Far Upper Nile.

Loyal troops from the North were being flown to the area throughout the day. It is in the Central African lands of the most primitive African tribes, 1,200 miles south of Khartoum.

An attempted assassination by bow and arrow early this month may have figured in the early stages of the revolt. A Southern soldier tried to kill the Juba postmaster but his arrow misfired and killed another soldier instead.

Investigation of the assassination attempt disclosed a plot, the government said, and Sudan defense force leaders ordered several companies of Equatoria Province troops to Malakal and Wau to disperse them and prevent an indicated uprising.

Reason Unknown
The exact reasons for the rebellion were unknown but there has been ill feeling on the part of the Southern Sudanese soldiers, who long have been commanded by British officers, for the new officers who are mainly Northern Sudanese.

Government officials claim Egyptian agents have been agitating against them in the South in Egypt's campaign for union with this million-square-mile country.

Major Problem
The mutiny now has become a major problem for the young government of Prime Minister Ismail El Azhary. It is on the road to independence from foreign rule. Britain, with Egypt as partner, has ruled the Sudan for 56 years and now is preparing to withdraw.

The Southern soldiers mutinied against the Northern officers Thursday at Torit, battalion headquarters 84 miles east of Juba, the capital of Equatoria Province.

Woman Misses Boat, Falls 40 Feet Into Water

LONGVIEW, Wash. — A woman passenger was rescued from the Columbia River at the Port of Longview Saturday afternoon after she missed her jump onto the Norwegian ship Phorshall and fell forty feet into the water.

Miss Margaret Emery, Cleveland, Ohio, had traveled around the world on the ship this summer. She lost her wallet and glasses in the plunge. Longshoremen working the vessel made a collection to help offset her loss.

Her rescuers were Billy Birk, Longview longshoreman, and Nils Strandli, ship's steward, who both burned their hands going down a ship's rope to her rescue.

Ex-burlesque Queen Wins Divorce Suit

HOLLYWOOD (UP) — Margie Hart, former top-ranking burlesque queen, won a divorce from her former press agent, Seaman Jacobs, on charges he referred to her large family as "a bunch of shanty Irish."

The onetime queen of strippers was granted a divorce by Superior Judge J. F. Moroney after saying Jacobs, now a television writer, would "hole up" in his room when her family came for a visit.

Miss Hart and Jacobs married July 4, 1942 and separated last June. They have a 21-month-old son.

WENDOVER AIR FORCE BASE, Utah (UP) — Col. H. H. (Hank) Norman Jr., commanding officer of Clovis Air Force Base, N. M., was killed Saturday when his F-86 Sabrejet "flamed out" and crashed on the Western Utah desert salt flats near here.

Norman was leading the 31st Fighter-Bomber group from Clovis AFB in the Ninth Air Force gunnery and bombing meet here.

Idaho Crash Kills Teacher

GRANGEVILLE, Idaho (UP) — A school teacher from Quincy, Wash., was killed and two men injured Saturday in a car-truck collision on a country road near here.

The dead woman was identified as Mrs. Zelle Kuhnly, 53. In serious condition at a hospital here were her husband, Fred Kuhnly, a water master on the Columbia Basin Reclamation Project, and Walter Cash, Grangeville area rancher. Kuhnly received a severe concussion and Cash leg and internal injuries.

The Kuhnlys were driving to Caldwell, Idaho to visit relatives, state police said, when they collided with the pickup driven by Cash. Mrs. Kuhnly was thrown from the car and pinned under the vehicle.

Policeman Switches Professions; Jailed

PUEBLO, Colo. (UP) — Raymond V. Shrock, 26, former Pueblo policeman began Saturday serving a one-to-two-year term in prison for possessing burglar's tools.

Shrock said he quit the police force earlier this summer because the pay was too low.

Commiss Say Downed Flier Died in Crash

PANMUNJOM (UP) — The Communists Sunday told the U. N. Command that Army Capt. Charles W. Brown, West Louisville, Ky., was killed in the crash of a small, unarmed training plane shot down Wednesday by Red anti-aircraft fire.

The Communists had said earlier that Air Force 2nd Lt. Guy Bumpas, Jackson, Miss., suffered head injuries but is alive.

The Communists said they would return Bumpas and Brown's body at 3:30 p. m. Tuesday.

North Korean Maj. Gen. Jung Kook Rok submitted a brief medical report which said Bumpas was injured on the right side of his forehead and "appears to have a cracked skull."

The Reds made their report at a meeting of the Military Armistice Commission.

He said Bumpas would be returned, providing he agrees to return in his present condition.

The Communist general said Bumpas had regained consciousness and appeared to be in fair condition and good spirits.

Maj. Gen. Harlan C. Parks, senior allied delegate, accepted the Red offer to return Bumpas and Brown's body. He offered to send a helicopter to pick up the injured man.

The Reds did not specifically accept the helicopter offer, Parks said, and so he then proposed that a Swiss doctor with the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission be sent to the area where Bumpas is hospitalized.

The doctor would examine Bumpas and determine if he is in condition to be moved and what medical equipment would be needed.

Again, Parks said, the Reds were evasive and noncommittal.

The Reds said they would return Bumpas and Brown's body at Korisil, which they said is close to the site where the unarmed training plane was shot down.

That would place it north of the demilitarized zone about seven miles northeast of the "iron triangle" town of Kumhwa in South Korea.

Police Kill Slayer of Patrolmen

DETROIT, Mich. (UP) — Detroit police flushed a drunken Shelbyville, Ind., man from his estranged wife's apartment with tear gas and shot and killed him early Saturday after the man fatally wounded patrolman George Krueger, 23, of Detroit.

Police said Ellis Bailey, 30, arrived here Friday and bought a shotgun, vowing to kill his wife, Linda, 22.

Patrolman Krueger and three other officers answered a call to investigate a "drunk with a shotgun" shortly after midnight at a downriver address, they said. The officers walked by the door of the Bailey apartment and Krueger, last in the file, was felled by a blast in the chest.

He died less than two hours later in Detroit Receiving Hospital. Police said they dispatched several more cars to the building and shot Bailey when they flushed him gun in hand, from the apartment with tear gas.

Bailey was the father of four small children. Krueger is survived by his wife and three children, the youngest five months old.

U.S. Airman Sets Official Speed Mark

LOS ANGELES (UP) — An Air Force pilot Saturday established the world's first official supersonic speed record with a North American Super Sabrejet flying between 800 and 900 miles an hour at high altitude over the Mojave Desert, the Times reported.

Col. Horace A. (Dude) Hanes, flight test director at Edwards Air Force Base, made the level flight run after a week's series of speed flights at 35,000 feet.

The Times' aviation writer, Marvin Miles, said Charles Logsdon, chief tester of the National Aeronautic Assn., verified that supersonic record operations were underway on the desert. Exact time of the new mark is to be announced by the Air Force at a Philadelphia air show Sept. 3-5, Miles said.

The previous world speed record was set by Lt. Col. F. K. (Pete) Everest, test pilot at Edwards, on Oct. 29, 1953. He flew a swept-wing Super Sabrejet (F-100 C) at 755.149 m. p. h. in level flight passes over a 15-kilometer course (9.32 miles) at the Salton Sea.

This mark was just under the speed of sound.

The plane, built at the North American plant here, is the first supersonic, level flight fighter developed for the Air Force and reportedly has streaked at a top speed of 910 m. p. h. in unofficial high altitude tests.

Foresters May Leave Cones To Squirrels

OLYMPIA (UP) — The squirrels may get a break this year. They may not have to compete with state foresters for their winter supply of food.

Last fall the foresters collected 2,893 gunny sacks of cones from douglas fir and ponderosa pine trees that might otherwise have been banquets for the bushytails.

But, said State Forester L. T. Webster Saturday, this year's cone crop is so poor he may leave it all to the squirrels.

Cone collecting isn't as squirrelly as it sounds.

Last year's cone harvest produced 2,393 pounds of seed, 95 per cent douglas fir, which will be used to restock the state's cutover forest lands.

It is used both for direct reseeded and for starting seedling trees in the State Division of Forestry's nursery in the Black Hills south-west of here.

"Our aim is to collect 6,000 sacks of cones in each good cone-producing year and as much in other years as is possible," Webster said adding that good cone years occur about once every seven years.

That amount would allow the state to fill its own needs and increase sales of seed to individuals and firms that want to put their lands into tree production.

The decision to gather or not to gather cones in any particular year is based on a cone crop report developed recently by the Forestry Division.

Headed by Assistant Forestry Supervisor Don Hopkins, a committee of state, federal Forest Service and industry representatives worked out a system of collecting information from sample areas of trees throughout the state. The information is used to develop maps showing the cone crop in all parts of the state.

Report Available
The report is made available to persons or companies interested in obtaining cones.

Cone gathering isn't an exclusive operation of the state and the squirrels. The U. S. Forest Service, timber companies and commercial seed companies also harvest them.

When the cones are brought to the state nursery they undergo an involved process, Webster explained.

They are dried in a kiln and put through a threshing machine to remove the seed. The seed is run through a cylinder, where brushes remove the wings (which enable seed to travel in the wind) and the seed is subjected to air blasts to separate the dead from the healthy seed.

Then it is stored in airtight glass containers until it is needed. Douglas fir seed will keep six to seven years if properly handled, Webster said.

This year Webster's men planted enough seed to raise 10 million trees.

When those trees are two years old they will be transplanted on cutover lands where they will grow and produce more cones for the foresters and the squirrels.
