



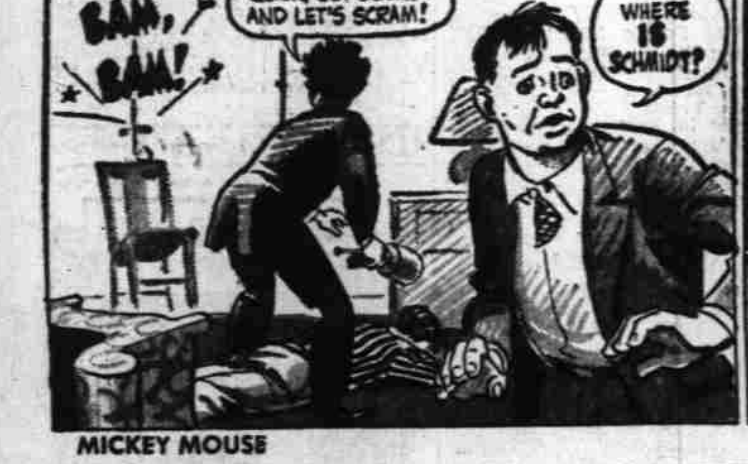
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Congressional Jobs Tough, Says Doctor

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — The nation's lawmakers are so busy taking care of the country they often fail to take care of themselves, says Dr. R. W. Gifford, assistant attending physician to Congress.

He terms life in Congress a "process of natural selection" with voters retiring lawmakers who become senile or lose their ability and drive. He says congressmen have hard, tough jobs, physically and mentally.

"Our biggest problem is to get them to take care of themselves," he says. He cites long, tiring sessions of Congress as conducive to heart ailments. Overweight is a major problem; there are too many banquets — they eat on the run, and their habits are irregular.

And, he adds, congressmen generally are reluctant to admit they are under medical care. He says many of them won't even admit they're on a diet.

Dr. Gifford spoke during a visit here.

New Methods for Hog Slaughtering Being Studied

CHICAGO—(UP)—The meat industry is continuing its campaign to make hog slaughtering easier on the animals.

Industry experts are trying to find a replacement for the mallet, used to stun pigs before the actual killing.

Aled P. Davies, director of the department of livestock of the American Meat Institute, said electric shock for stunning was seen as a possible solution.

However, the meat inspection branch of the agriculture department ruled out the method.

"The electrical stunning method caused pathological changes in hogs which made it impossible for the federal meat inspectors to determine the true condition of the animals," Davies said.

Davies said the meatpacking industry is "determined to continue its efforts to improve of dispatching hogs, bearing in mind its humanitarian responsibilities."

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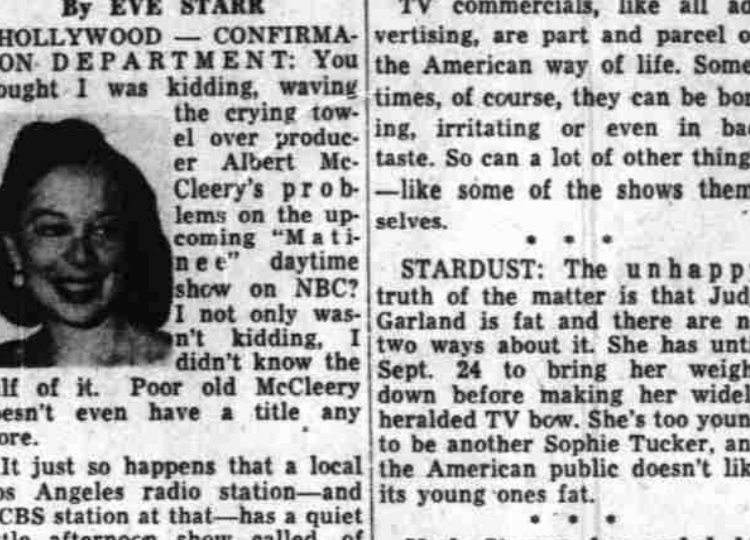
