Slow, Varied

NEW YORK (P) - Slow trading and mixed prices marked Monday's activity on the stock exchange as it continued where last week left off.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged at 171.30. Industrials were down 20 cents, rails were higher by 60 cents and utilities were down 20 cents.

Losers were well ahead of gainers as 472 declined and 394 advanced out of 1,117 individual issues traded. New highs for the year were reached by 23 stocks and new lows by 19.

The day's volume totaled 1,430,000 shares compared with 1,400,000 traded on Friday.

Grain Market Prices Drop

CHICAGO (P) - Grains sold off on the Board of Trade Monday but managed to close considerably above the day's lows. In most cases these lows were set in the first hour of trading.

Corn and soybeans lost the most. On the recovery wheat did best, although the only contract to close higher was March oats. Other oats contracts showed wider losses than did wheat futures.

Wheat closed 1/4-3/8 lower, corn 1/4-1/2 lower, oats 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, rye 1/4-1/2 lower, soybeans 1/2-2/4 lower and lard 12 to 20 cents a hundred pounds lower.

Wheat started to firm after export circles reported Italy had requested offers on two million bushels of the grain after the close. These sources also said Japan was scheduled to buy 500,000 bushels of American or Canadian feed wheat Wednesday.
