

Three in Family Drown

Friend Tells of Saving 2 Girls; All From Oregon

VICTORIA, B.C. (U) — "Save mother, father's gone." That was the call of Sally and Mary Louise Stevens, 12- and 9-year-old daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Bailey Stevens and sisters of 5-year-old Sonja after the boat they were all in overturned in St. Mary's lake near here Sunday.

The two girls' father, mother and sister drowned in the lake on Salt Spring Island, 20 miles from Victoria, during a fishing trip.

Eric V. Edwards of Victoria, who with his wife rescued the two girls, described the drowning of the Milton-Freewater, Ore., family.

Full of Fun

"We watched the Stevens leave to go fishing," said Edwards. "They seemed full of fun and in good spirits."

"It was just getting dusk, about 8:30 p.m."

"We were going fishing too, myself, my wife and our two daughters, Vaughn and Claudia."

"Out on the lake we suddenly heard a cry for help. We could see nothing as there was a point of land between us and where the sound of the cry came from. It seemed about half a mile away."

"Save Me"

"I rowed as fast as I could to the spot, I heard a man's voice crying 'save me.'"

He said the two girls "were clinging to an upturned boat when we arrived."

"Save mother. Father is gone," they cried.

"I dived in the water but all was dark."

The two children saved said the boat capsized while their father was standing up fly-casting for fish.

Sudan Troops Attack Village

KHARTOUM, Sudan (U) — Airborne government troops Monday attacked Torit, mudhut village on the Nile River in Southern Sudan seized by rebellious soldiers Wednesday.

There were signs that the army uprising in the three Southern provinces was collapsing. In Cairo, a British Embassy spokesman said the Torit mutineers had radioed they were ready to give up. The spokesman added 136 mutineers had surrendered at Oraba, just north of the British protectorate of Uganda.

Earlier, a communique by the government here said 158 mutineers had surrendered at Yei, 100 miles south of Juba, capital of Equatoria Province. They threw down their arms after being rounded up by loyal forces from Northern Sudan.

Britain and Egypt agreed in 1949 to administer the Sudan jointly as a condominium. Two years ago the two countries decided to let the Sudanese determine their own political future. They have agreed to withdraw their remaining 1,600 troops from the country within three months.

Reds to Return Wounded Pilot

SEOUL (U) — A wounded U. S. pilot and the body of his comrade — the subject of one of the angriest exchanges of the armistice — will be returned Tuesday by the Communists.

Lt. Guy H. Bumpas, Jackson, Miss., suffered a head injury when his plane was shot down last week near the neutral zone by the Communists. Capt. Charles W. Brown, West Louisville, Ky., was killed.

Bumpas will accompany his comrade's body across the neutral zone near Kumwha, some 80 miles north of Seoul.

Ex-County Judge Dies at Age 100

ROSEBURG (U) — A former county judge, Arba Stearns, died in a hospital here Sunday. He was 100.

A native of Scottsburg, Stearns spent his entire life in Douglas County where he served as county judge. He operated a hardware store for 73 years at Oakland, where he lived until just before his death.

A big celebration was held by residents of the area for Stearns when he marked his 100th birthday anniversary last Oct. 24.

Benson at Red Reception, But Not Marilyn

WASHINGTON (U) — The Soviet Embassy held a big vodka and caviar reception Monday night in honor of the visiting Soviet delegation of farm leaders.

Marilyn Monroe didn't come, though she had been invited—but Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson did.

Benson didn't however down any vodka. He said the Soviet farm delegation leader Vladimir Matskevich did not offer him any, knowing his preference for soft drinks. He had some ginger ale, he said.

Benson said there were no toasts Monday night but added there had been earlier in the day at luncheon in the Department of Agriculture. But they were drunk down in milk, he explained.

An embassy spokesman estimated there were about 370 guests. More than just vodka was furnished for the guests to drink. On one table alone there was Moscow vodka, American sautee, ginger ale, tomato juice, scotch, orange juice, soda water, beaumont wine, and bourbon.

The reception was televised by special arrangement with the Soviet Embassy. This is the first time this has been done.

The Soviet charge d'affaires, Sergei Strigunov, and Matskevich stood in a receiving line in a room at the head of the stairs. They were beneath a large picture of Stalin and opposite it was another of Lenin.

Rites Set for Driver Who Died Hero

Funeral services will be held today, 1:30 p.m. at Howell-Edwards Chapel for Robert J. Short, 28, who reportedly died a hero's death in the Sunday crash of his logging truck at Oregon City.

Short, a resident of 4230 Auburn Rd., but employed for the past several months at Yamhill, guided his runaway truck through downtown Oregon City after the brakes failed. He was killed when the heavily loaded vehicle crashed against a retaining wall at the city's new municipal elevator.

Officers who witnessed the accident said several persons owed their lives to the fact that Short stuck with the truck, sounding the horn all the while. The truck narrowly missed some children.

Concluding services for Short will be held at City View Cemetery.

Fire Leaves No Stone Unturned

Diverse Public Issues Draw Council Crowd

A "disappearing" stop sign at Hood and Church streets, a new Safeway store site in South Salem and lack of sidewalks in the East Englewood area were the diverse public issues which attracted 125 citizens to Salem City Council's meeting in City Hall.

Hearing out the issues resulted in no immediate action from the council, but a draft of legislation in one case was promised.

Alderman Edward E. Roth of the Englewood ward told The Statesman after the council session he would sponsor a resolution aimed at declaring a city policy that only curb walks would be permitted in the big East Englewood area generally from 22nd Street to city limits between D and Market Streets.

Express Views

About 70 citizens of the area came to express their views, almost unanimously in favor of curb walks rather than the standard sidewalks one foot outside the property line. Hundreds of other citizens of the area were represented on petitions presented, also favoring curb walks.

Many of the citizens said they preferred no walks at all at present, but wanted to make sure curb walks would be permitted if at any future time the council orders walks in.

Their principal arguments: Standard walks would disrupt present landscaping of front yards and the unpaved street area; curb walks look better with ranch-style houses which predominate in area because deeper front yard needed; not enough pedestrian traffic to justify cost of sidewalks; motorists parking at curb have to walk through wet grass to get to sidewalk.

In Opposition

The South Salem delegation came from Sonora Way in opposition to development of a parking lot behind the Safeway store now under construction at Commercial and Boice Streets.

They asked if the council could intervene in any way to help protect their property from the unexpected "encroachment."

Sonora residents said they had understood from real estate agents their property was separated from the commercial district along the highway, then found out some lots had been sold for the parking area under provisions of the city zoning code allowing "transition" uses of residentially-zoned property adjacent to business zones, to a maximum depth of 165 feet.

Permit Issued

The city has already issued Safeway a building permit. A letter from Safeway indicated a cedar hedge would screen the parking lot and no driveways would enter from Sonora Way.

Aldermen directed the city attorney and manager to find out if the city could take any action in the matter. Mayor Robert F. White promised to call a special meeting soon if the city can do anything.

A petition from 231 residents was brought in by a North Salem group objecting to removal of a stop sign on Hood Street at Church, shortly after it was installed by the city recently. This matter was referred to Alderman James Nicholson.

Other Council action:

Passed milk inspection code conforming with state law; passed traffic code incorporating recent state law changes.

Cocktail License

Recommended to State Liquor Commission a new cocktail license for Cline's Food Shop (at the bus station), and transfer of the tavern license for Burroughs Inn, 2395 N. Front, to Donald Keniston.

Approved city water service for 11 lots of Laurel Springs district adjacent to city limits, with water lines to be installed to city specifications by Werner Brown, John Hughes and James Minty.

Ordered stop signs on all four corners of Crestview and Hansen Avenue, but rejected earlier proposal to make Hansen Avenue and Acacia Drive a through street.

Marion County Engineer John Anderson has decided to turn down requests from individuals to install their own culverts along streets being improved through the county's revolving fund.

Anderson said property owners who petition the court for a 20-foot paved road with a five-foot shoulder and drainage ditch on each side of the paving, sometimes later decide they do not like a ditch in front of their property.

When they undertake to install their own culverts, he said, there is a tendency for the pipeline to plug and the drainage to become haphazard. This, he said, means there is too great an expenditure for the benefit received.

For about \$1 more per property foot, the county could build a 34-foot paved road with concrete curbs.

In a memorandum which will be mailed to people petitioning for road work, Anderson said: "It is hoped that individual property owners will weigh all factors concerned, talk it over with neighbors and decide on the type of work which best suits their desires and their pocket-books."

HOUSTON (U) — India's ambassador to the United States was asked Monday to leave the public section of a plush Houston restaurant. Witnesses said the restaurant supervisor thought he was a Negro.

The Houston Post said at least six witnesses told of hearing the supervisor ask the ambassador, Gaganvihari Lalubhai Mehta, and his secretary to go to a small private dining room behind the cashier's cage.

The incident occurred in the Horizon House Restaurant at Houston's International Airport. The Indians were enroute to Mexico City.

Mother Waits In Vain for Airman Son

PORTLAND (U) — Mrs. Ray Peters waited in vain Monday for her son, Daniel Schmidt, to arrive here for his long expected visit.

The 22-year-old airman, who was released recently from a Communist Chinese prison camp, has been in California since his return to the United States. He has been trying to straighten out the complicated marital tangle that resulted when his wife, Una, remarried while he was prisoner. The wife said she believed that Schmidt had filed suit for divorce and is asking custody of their 24-year-old son.

Mrs. Peters, who has been ill with a heart condition, was resting Monday. A neighbor, who has been handling telephone calls to her modest motel apartment, said Mrs. Peters had not heard from her son since last Thursday.

She said a San Francisco newspaper, which she did not identify, had called to tell her that Schmidt had left Red Bluff, Calif.—where he had been visiting—early Monday and was due here Tuesday.

Bids for New Health Unit To Begin Soon

Bids to provide a building for Marion County's health department will be opened Sept. 15 at 10 a.m., County Judge Rex Hartley said Monday.

The new building, which will have 5,000 square feet, is to be erected by private investors and rented to the department.

Bidders, Hartley said, must state location and monthly rental. The health department now pays \$285 a month for quarters in the Masonic Building, but an \$8,000 rent item in the 1955-56 budget was provided so the department could obtain a new location.

Floor plans, now on file with the county clerk, call for seven clinic rooms, six offices, facilities for sanitarians, a large board room, a group meeting room, a nurses' work area, store rooms and two waiting rooms.

The county will begin advertising for bids today.
