Lebanon Lass Set to Seek National Strawberry Crown

LEBANON—Miss Darlene Edwards, queen of this year's Lebanon strawberry festival, will be a contestant in the national finals to select a strawberry fair queen of the nation at Glenwood Springs, Colo., this Saturday.

The 18-year-old strawberries and cream girl will represent the far west in competition with other queens from Colorado, Utah, Florida, Ohio and Tennessee.

The queen and her mother, Mrs. Lela Edwards of 371 E. St., will leave Wednesday morning by auto, traveling with Lebanon Express news editor and Mrs. Mervin Jenkins.

All contestants will be housed in Glenwood Springs resort Hotel Colorado.

Friday will be play day for the queens, with a round of sight-seeing tours arranged in their honor. The girls will visit ski areas, be guests at lake lodges, be taken on motor boat rides and make preliminary appearances for cameramen and newsmen.

Judging Saturday morning commences at the hotel's mammoth outdoor swimming pool, where judges will select a bathing beauty winner.

Luncheon at noon will be followed by participation in the city's Days of '49 parade. Each queen will ride horseback through the line of march, then ride to the afternoon's rodeo, where they will be guests of the roundup.

Selection of the final winner on poise, personality, and beauty will be made at a dinner in the hotel that evening.

The judges' selection will be made known later the same evening at a queen's ball concluding the two-day event.

Plays of barley. Growers delivering to participating warehouses will indicate which load of barley is to be sampled. Warehouses are co-operating by drawing a one gallon sample of barley.

For growers using private warehouses or delivering to non-participating warehouses in the area, arrangements should be made with a member of the Hanchen barley contest committee to draw the samples. The sample when drawn, must represent one truckload or more of barley.

After the sample has been drawn, one half of this goes to the Portland judging and grading committee while the other half stays here to be exhibited in the Polk County Barley Day.

National Attention
Points to be considered in the judging will be moisture content, weight per bushel, percentage of skinned and broken kernels, thin kernels and purity of the sample. "Purity" refers, Lorence explains, to freedom from other seeds and grains.

Polk County has received nationwide attention on its effort to produce a better quality of malting barley through the annual contest. Every Polk County Hanchen barley grower may take part, Lorence adds.

"We hold this contest in order to focus attention on the improved production of Hanchen barley — a one million dollar crop to Polk County," N. John Hansen, Polk County extension agent, said Monday in endorsing the contest.

The contest provides that entries will be made from field-run samples.

Judging of the barley will be done by the USDA grading branch in Portland. Assisting will be Oren Kelleys, master of the Great Western Malting Company, Vancouver, Wash., and D. H. Hill, head of the farm crops department, Oregon State College.

Death Claims Rev. Steder At Mt. Angel

MT. ANGEL—The Rev. Alphonse Mary Steder, OSB, died early Monday evening. He was 75 years old and had been in retirement at the abbey for the past six years. Death came after a lingering illness.

He was born March 7, 1880, in Wies, Germany, the seventh child of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Steder. He is survived by one brother who lives in Greece and two cousins in this country.

His college years were spent in Germany and Italy and after a year at the Benedictine Abbey of Engelberg, Switzerland, he came to the United States to join the order.

He was received at Mt. Angel abbey, Sept. 16, 1912. His first assignment in 1922 was in the mission area around Nenzel, Neb.

Adviser Board On Insurance Re-Created

Gov. Patterson Monday re-created a state advisory council on employment and unemployment insurance.

While this council is authorized by federal law, Oregon has not had one for the past several years.

In making the appointments, Gov. Patterson said, "It is my desire that an advisory council composed of Labor, management and the public be created in order that they might study the operation of the new law, its administration and the effect of such law. They will then be in a very good position to make recommendations as to any changes that might be indicated from their actual experience with the present law."

The group will hold its first meeting Aug. 31 in Salem.

Those appointed are: Jesse A. Bell, president, Oregon State Industrial Union Council, Portland; Anthony F. Vavrus, statistician, Portland Council of Teamsters No. 57, Portland; Henry E. Baldridge, in charge of logging operation for Publishers Paper Co., Portland; James G. Swindells, attorney, Portland; and the fifth member, who represents women and the public on the council, Dr. Jessie M. Smith, University of Oregon, Eugene.

Following that, he held various pastorates in Washington, Idaho and Oregon as well as teaching posts at Mt. Angel abbey where he specialized in Latin and German. His last assignment was in Leavenworth, Wash.

Requiem mass will be held in the Abbey church Thursday at 10 a.m. and interment will be in the Abbey cemetery.
