Mother Grets Schmidt in Joyful Meeting

PORTLAND (U)—Airman Daniel Schmidt, whose wife said she remarried while he was in a Communist Chinese prison camp, arrived home Tuesday night to talk over his complicated marital tangle with his mother.

Neither Schmidt nor his mother, Mrs. Ray Peters, would talk to reporters, but a neighbor said their reunion was a very happy one.

Schmidt was accompanied by his mother-in-law, Mrs. Walter Ferguson, who has sided with him in his dispute with her daughter, Una.

Describes Scene
The neighbor, Mrs. Robert Thomas, who lives next door to Mrs. Peters in a modest motel here, described the reunion.

She said Mrs. Peters ran into her apartment this evening, "speechless and pointing to a car that was slowly traveling down the highway."

Mrs. Thomas ran to the door of her apartment and shouted out Danny's name. The car pulled in and Schmidt and his mother fell into each other's arms, she said.

Mrs. Thomas said she talked to the 22-year-old airman briefly and that he had mentioned his marital difficulties only in passing.

Asks Custody
Schmidt recently filed suit for divorce against his young wife. He also has asked custody of their 2½-year-old son.

Mrs. Thomas said she left the family happily seated around a dinner table. Present besides Schmidt, Mrs. Ferguson and Mrs. Peters, were Mrs. Peters' husband, a younger son, Larry Schmidt, 17, and Larry's girl friend.

Schmidt was a B29 gunner in the Korean War. He was shot down and held a prisoner by the Communists for 32 months and released only a short time ago.

Mrs. Thomas said she thought the family planned to talk with reporters Wednesday.

'Square' Tells Of Using Rifle To Kill Mother

PALMDALE, Calif. (U)—Thirteen-year-old Jimmy Thomson, tired of being called a square because he was never in trouble, was held Tuesday for the slaying of his mother.

Sheriff's deputies said Jimmy admitted loading his rifle and lying in wait two hours for his mother to come home. They quoted the boy as saying he fired three shots while his mother, Mrs. Hilda Thomson, 51, sat reading.

Officers, summoned to the home by Jimmy, said Mrs. Thomson's blouse and pedal pushers were ripped. They booked Jimmy on suspicion of murder.

The boy's father, Harry, and an older brother, John, civilian workers at Edwards Air Force Base, were at work. They joined Lt. Al Etzel in asking Jimmy, "Why?"

"I don't know," the boy mumbled over and over, until finally he blurted:

"The kids at school kept calling me a square because I wouldn't steal or anything. I didn't want to be a sissy. I was tired of being a square."

Morse Flies To Milwaukee On Way Home

WASHINGTON (U)—Sen. Morse (D-Ore)—last of the Oregon lawmakers to leave the capital—flew Wednesday to Milwaukee, Wis., on route home.

The senator speaks Wednesday night in the Wisconsin city before the International Woodworkers of America, then continues to Oregon. He is due in Portland Thursday morning and will headquarter at the Roosevelt Hotel.

Morse has several speaking engagements in and around Portland and will go to Los Angeles for a Labor Day address before the Greater Los Angeles CIO Council.

He expects to return to Washington around Sept. 10 to enter some of his prize livestock in nearby Maryland fair and will go back to Oregon later that month.

Cloudburst Hits Mojave Desert Hard
SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (U)—A heavy cloudburst struck the Mojave desert Tuesday afternoon and rain was still falling Tuesday night in Barstow, where hundreds of automobiles were held up in the season's king-sized traffic jam by flooded roads.

All but one of the highways out of Barstow were closed. U.S. Highways 66 and 91 eastbound were impassable, as was California Highway 466 westbound.

Public dining room of Houston's International Airport Monday, Mrs. Mary Alley, restaurant supervisor, decided they must be negroes. So she asked them to move to a small private dining room in such polite tones that they thought they were getting de luxe treatment reserved for important visitors.

But when news that the ambassador had been segregated came out, worry and agitation spread from Houston to Washington. An international furor was feared. Relations between India and the United States have been somewhat difficult for years because of the nationalist line taken by Prime Minister Nehru in the struggle between Communism and the Western world.

Regret Expressed
The State Department in the person of Secretary of State Dulles, hastened to telegraph an apology to Mehta. It also sent an official expression of regret to the Indian government at New Delhi.

Mayor Roy Hofheinz of Houston, offered an apology "in behalf of every citizen of Houston."

Frank Mullen, manager of the airport dining room, said he was "terribly embarrassed and upset by the unfortunate incident."

The Civil Aeronautics Administration launched an investigation of racial segregation at the airport, which was built with the aid of more than \$3,500,000 in federal funds.

No Comment
Mrs. Alley, the restaurant supervisor, would not comment.

But witnesses of the incident said Monday that Mrs. Alley explained she thought the two Indians were negroes and said "the law's the law."

Texas law forbids serving Negroes and white persons in the same dining room.

Mehta was on a plane journey from Washington to Mexico City when he stopped in Houston. After enjoying his meal, he resumed his flight.

He said at Mexico City Tuesday that he left Houston without knowing the reason for changing rooms.

He added that he is still making an inquiry and will decide later what steps to take.

Navy Names Shipyards for A-Sub Work
WASHINGTON (U)—The navy designated Tuesday the shipyards where four new atomic-powered submarines will be constructed. Eight have now been authorized and the money appropriated.

Two of them will be built at the Groton, Conn., yards of the General Dynamics Corp., builders of the first atomic submarine, the Nautilus. One of the two will be another nuclear submarine designated to attack enemy surface shipping. The other will be a radar picket submarine.

One nuclear submarine will be built at the Mare Island, Calif., shipyard, which will also build a guided missile submarine, not atomic powered.

The fourth nuclear sub was assigned to the Portsmouth, N.H., Naval Shipyard which will also build an attack submarine, designed to combat other submarines, but not atomic powered.

It was also announced that construction of a new super carrier of the Forrestal class, the largest in the world, will be offered on a competitive basis to qualified private shipyards.

Secretary of the Navy Thomas in all, announced shipyard assignments for 11 new ships and conversion of 26 existing ships. The total program for the year which began July 1 covers 33 new ships.

Assignments announced included: Wash.

Conversion assignments: Puget Sound Naval Shipyard, two aircraft carriers.

Plant Speeds Production
All five looms at the new Astoria plant in West Salem probably will be producing dryer felt by the end of next week, and operations soon will go on a multi-shift basis, it was declared Tuesday by E. A. Walther, vice president.

Three of the huge looms are already turning, he said, and more than a score of persons already are employed.

The plant, utilizing the physical facilities of the Oregon Flax Textile operation which closed some months ago, produces material in the manufacture of paper.

Headquarters of Astoria-Hill is in Philadelphia. The company negotiated lease on the Oregon Flax Textiles property through Jack Bannister, president of National Automotive Fibres which owns the plant.

McKay Blasts 'Lies' About His Policies
PORTLAND (U)—Secretary of the Interior McKay Tuesday night defended his department against what he said were "misleading and outright false statements made for partisan political advantage."

Speaking before the Portland chapter of the Izaak Walton League, a conservation organization, the Secretary reviewed the department's policy and practices in the fields of conservation and resources work.

He said the sprawling Pacific Northwest Bonneville Power Administration, far from being dismantled as some political opponents said it would be under the Eisenhower administration, has substantially expanded its facilities and service. He said that since he has been secretary, Bonneville has collected more than seven million dollars in net revenue, has integrated a total of 1,260,000 kilowatts of federally produced power into the system, and has built 1,000 miles of transmission lines and 34 new substations.

Power Benefits
"Although I am an advocate of hydro-electric development, I have opposed construction of dams where damage to wildlife, fish or recreation will exceed the power benefits," McKay said, adding that among dams that he had opposed as harmful to conservation values, was the Glacier View Dam in Montana.

On the subject of proposed hydroelectric development in Echo Park, he said the late President Roosevelt's order creating Echo Park made reservation for possible later hydro development. "In view of this reservation and the need for the comprehensive development of the Rocky Mountain region, the Department could not oppose the Echo Park undertaking" in the Colorado River Project.

McKay said there had been speculation in some quarters on whether the department intends to "give away" several waterfowl and big game refuges.

National Asset
"These refuges, as well as national parks and forests, are an irreplaceable national asset. I feel strongly that these resources of which the federal government is the guardian on behalf of all the people should and must be preserved," he said.

On the subject of national parks, McKay said the department added 65,000 acres to the national parks system in 1953 and 40,000 acres were acquired last year.

"The National Park Service has adopted a program of long-range planning for the parks with which I am in hearty accord," McKay said.

Discussing the so-called "tidelands," McKay said that since the law was enacted affirming state ownership of the tidelands, a total of 250 million dollars as bonus payments in oil and gas leases executed, plus ground rentals, had been turned into the Treasury.

McKay to Leave For U. S. Capital
Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay, who has been vacationing at his beach home at Neskowin, will leave from Portland by airplane Wednesday for Washington, D.C.

During his stay in Oregon McKay participated in the dedication of the boyhood home of ex-president Herbert Hoover as a national shrine and several other events.

The secretary was accompanied to Salem and Neskowin by Mrs. McKay. While in Salem they visited at the home of their sons-in-law and daughters, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Hadley and Mr. and Mrs. Lester Green.

Walla Walla Pen Inmates Face Charge
WALLA WALLA (U)—Information charging 20 inmates of the Washington State Prison with prison riot have been prepared but no date for filing charges in court has been determined. Prosecuting Attorney Arthur L. Hawman said Tuesday.

The prosecutor said his office has compiled files on 39 persons in connection with the July 5 revolt at the prison.

"Since the fall jury term of Superior Court does not convene until Sept. 26, there is plenty of time to properly prepare the charges," Hawman said.

"We are in no hurry. These 20 inmates will be available. They aren't going any place. They'll be on hand for the trial," he added.

In a prepared release, Hawman criticized "the abnormal interest in my duties" on the part of State Sen. Neil Hoff, chairman of the legislative council's public institutions committee.

Hoff said earlier if Hawman did not act within a week, Atty. Gen. Don Eastwood should proceed against the prisoners.
