

Sultan's Removal 'Likely' as Peace Move in Morocco

AIX LES BAINS, France (U)—A bargain appeared developing Thursday to restore peace in Morocco by ousting both the Sultan and the protectorate's top French official, each unpopular with his own people.

Reliable informants at the conference here between Premier Edgar Faure's Cabinet "Committee of Five" and Moroccan leaders said the deal would provide the deposing of Sultan Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafat and the recall of French Resident General Gilbert Grandval.

Faure declined to comment on this possibility, but he said a settlement is in sight.

French Force Chases African Rebel Troops

RABAT, French Morocco (U)—French troops pursued rebellious tribesmen deeper into the mountains Thursday as populous lowland cities nervously awaited shakeups in the government which could set off more trouble.

A strong force of foreign legionnaires and colonial Senegalese soldiers probed deeper into the Atlas Mountains seeking the rebellious Smaala tribesmen who set off one of the worst massacres last weekend at Oued Zem.

Army officers reported about 2,000 Smaala tribesmen, with wives and children probably swelling the number to about 5,000, had disappeared from their former haunts and moved toward the upper peaks of the Middle Atlas Mountains.

The army view is that these tribesmen could form the core of a serious guerrilla situation. Consequently the pursuit is probably being pressed with vigor.

Detailed accounts of the military situation were lacking, not only for Morocco but also Algeria. Apparently the outbreaks have subsided, except for small sporadic clashes in isolated areas.

Official casualty figures for the Moroccan operations are still lacking, but there were indications the official figure would be about 1,000. The sidewalk grapevine of the Moroccans put the figure at about 3,000.

Truck Knocks House From Base, Hurts 1

CORVALLIS (U)—A woman was injured and two houses damaged here Thursday by a freight truck that was forced out of control on a curve.

Mrs. Tobe M. Watkins, 73, received multiple body injuries when the truck struck her home and she was thrown to the floor. The house was knocked from its foundation, glassware shattered and furniture overturned.

The truck also knocked the porch off another house, tore up lawns, shrubbery and trees before finally coming to a halt.

The driver, Arthur G. Friedrich, 26, Portland, suffered bruises and shock. He said a car crowded him off Highway 20 on the curve. The truck belonged to the Pierce Auto Freight Co.

'Edith' Located Over Atlantic by 'Hunter' Plane

MIAMI, Fla. (U)—Hurricane Edith, fifth tropical storm of the year, was found by a hurricane hunter plane Thursday to be in the formative stage with its cloud and squall system poorly organized.

The barometric pressure in its eye was 29.59 inches, showing lack of concentration. But a storm expert took a long range look at it and predicted it would reach a force of about 125 miles by Saturday.

Edith already had winds of hurricane force—75 miles an hour or higher.

The newest hurricane was located at 5 p.m., about 320 miles northeast of San Juan, P.R. This is about 1220 miles southeast of Miami and about 1,140 miles southeast of Cape Hatteras, N.C.

The Miami Weather Bureau said the hurricane had moved approximately 400 miles in the past 24 hours.

Sen. Johnson Home for Rest; Plans Return

STONEWALL, Tex. (U)—Senate majority leader Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.) came home Thursday for a rest from his recent heart attack and to regain strength for the January session of Congress.

"I'm going to get well and going to be back as Senate majority leader when the session opens in January," Johnson told Frank Mayborn, editor and publisher of the Temple (Tex.) Telegram.

"He stood the trip better than most of us," said Sam Houston Johnson, a brother, who accompanied the family on the flight from Washington.

Rites Monday For Minister At Sublimity

SUBILITY—The Rev. Joseph Scherbring, Catholic pastor here who died Thursday morning in his sleep, was born in Petersburg, Iowa, on Sept. 16, 1888.

He was educated at colleges in Calvary, Wis., and was trained for the priesthood at the Seminary of St. Thomas, Denver, Colo. He was ordained at Sioux City, Iowa, June 2, 1917.

Following a visit to his brother the Rev. Francis Scherbring in Oregon, Father Joseph Scherbring was transferred to Oregon in 1920 and assigned as pastor of St. Paul's at Silverton.

He became Sublimity parish's first resident pastor on Oct. 18, 1931. During his pastorate there a modern brick rectory was built. When his brother, as pastor at Sublimity, died in 1938, Father Joseph was transferred to Sublimity on Oct. 18 of that year.

Since coming to Sublimity he has directed construction of a new high school, gymnasium building, sisters convent and the Marion Convalescent Home.

Father Scherbring is survived by a brother, John of Earlville, Iowa, and by numerous nieces and nephews including Mrs. Frank Wolf of Sublimity and Mrs. George Wolf of Mt. Angel.

Recitation of the Rosary will take place at St. Boniface Church Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights at 8 o'clock. Funeral services will take place at the church Monday at 10:30 a.m.

Clinton Olson, Shevlin weather observer, reported a minimum reading last night of 20 degrees above zero. The little town recently records the nation's coldest wintertime temperatures.

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Damage Suits Filed Against Portland Man

PORTLAND (U)—Libel and damage suits totaling nearly 1 1/2 million dollars were filed here Thursday against Thomas Wyatt, head of the Wings of Healing Church, and several of his associates.

Wyatt, whose evangelistic program is carried twice weekly over the full Mutual Broadcasting Co. network and once weekly over part of the American Broadcasting Co. network, promptly called the suits the work of "disgruntled people" seeking to discredit him.

The largest suit, for 1 1/2 million, was brought by Mr. and Mrs. Kent Wong, former missionaries from China. They said in their complaint that Wyatt accused them of being Communists.

The Wongs also accused Jonathan E. Perkins, Wyatt's publicity man, of writing "libelous, malicious, and false circulars" which said the Wongs were related to the head of the secret police in Communist China.

The Rev. John Warwick also filed suit for \$200,000 damages. He said circulars distributed by Wyatt and Perkins reported him to be a Communist sympathizer.

In another suit, William D. Bennett, a realtor, accused Wyatt of fraudulently taking money from him to buy a revival tent.

He accused Wyatt of entering into a conspiracy with Charles L. Jessup of Guilford, Miss., and Jessup's six brothers, all Evangelists, to collect money for a tent. Then, Bennett charged, Wyatt and Jessup divided the money collected. The Jessups were named co-defendants.

Wyatt said he came here from Jasper County, Iowa, and established his church in 1940. He said it had become the largest evangelistic program in the world.

Wyatt said the suits were "just another step in a series of defamatory actions plotted and executed to hinder or destroy if possible the evangelistic missionary program carried on by the Wings of Healing on the radio networks of America. . . I am sure the good common sense of our American citizens will see through this matter."

In addition to the Jessup brothers, defendants in the suits include Wyatt's wife and his son, Max Wyatt.

The Jessups conducted services here while he was in Africa, Wyatt said, adding that other than knowing of their evangelistic work "we don't know too much about them."

Sale of Flax Company Told At Mt. Angel

MT. ANGEL—Official announcement of the sale of the Mt. Angel Flax Plant was made Thursday by directors of the plant.

New owners are Mr. and Mrs. David L. Clark and Mr. and Mrs. Joe F. Clark, formerly of Blythe, Calif. They are using the plant facilities to fatten beef cattle for market.

The Mt. Angel Flax plant was started in 1936 with high hopes of making it a permanent industry. But it failed to compete with foreign flax fiber imported at low cost.

Red Chinese Admit Short Grain Supply

TOKYO (U)—Peiping radio said Thursday Red China is "not so very well off in grain" and indicated "hoarding" was a factor in imposing grain rationing effective this November.

The radio broadcast the comments of People's Daily on the state council's decrees Wednesday ordering grain rationing and clamping down controls which will force peasants to deliver more grain to the state.

In one breath People's Daily said "China's grain output is now sufficient to meet needs." In the next it observed that "The level of China's grain output is still very low and China is not so very well off in grain."

It then sought to explain this contradiction by citing the demands for large-scale industrial production under the 5-year plan and the attitude of the peasants.

"With the peasants life having been improved, their consumption of grain has increased," said People's Daily. "Moreover, they are no longer anxious to sell their grain."

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
