

U. S. Security Plan For Israel, Arabs Near 'Quick Death'

WASHINGTON (U) — The Eisenhower administration's plan to bring peace to Israelis and Arabs appeared in danger of quick death Saturday.

Great Britain joined the United States in offering to guarantee the permanent frontiers of Israeli and Arab states, but some Arab leaders talked of rejecting the plan outright, and a Democratic lead-

er in the U. S. Congress expressed doubt the plan would ever succeed.

Sen. George of Georgia, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and chief Democratic spokesman in Congress on international affairs, said of the administration proposal: "I am considering it but I have not committed myself. I am in sympathy with the objectives but I doubt very much that this proposal can ever be worked out."

George, in a telephone interview from his Vienna, Ga., home, said he feels that other nations might give only token aid in backing up the peace plan "and the whole burden would fall on us."

One Arab leader said angrily that Secretary of State Dulles was offering Arabs "30 pieces of silver to sell Palestine to the Jews" as a vote-catcher in the 1956 Presidential election.

Dulles said in a New York speech Friday the United States would join in international action to establish and guarantee new Israeli-Arab borders, would subscribe to an international loan to compensate 100,000 Arabs displaced in the Mid-East strife and would aid in water development projects in the area.

New Device Aims to Cut Seasickness

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — Matson Navigation Co. had good news today for people who have the enthusiasm, but not the stomach, for ocean travel.

The company said it has signed an \$800,000 contract for the purchase of two "fin type" stabilizers designed to take the seasickness out of life aboard ship.

The stabilizers, built to offset the rolling effect of waves, were invented by Sperry Gyroscope Co. Matson said it will take two for installation on ships being readied for passenger service to Hawaii and the South Pacific.

Ship to Be Outfitted

Randolph Sevier, Matson president, said the SS Mariposa and Monterey would be outfitted with the stabilizers and ready to sail by late 1956.

Dr. Joseph Chadwick Jr., a Sperry engineer, said his company's stabilizer proved in tests on models that it can eliminate 90 per cent of a ship's roll.

"It is possible to install fins which would give 100 per cent stabilization—no roll at all," Chadwick said. "But then, people would not know they had been to sea."

The device consists of underwater fins, one on each side of the ship midway between the bow and stern. When it is warned of an impending roll, a gyroscope "brain" on the bridge signals the fins to exert up to 3000 foot-tons of anti-rolling force to counter the sea's movement.

Fins Give Ship "Lift"

The fins, which are seven feet long and extend 14 feet from the side of the ship, are equipped with flaps which give added "lift" to the ship.

Similar stabilizers already are in use in the Atlantic, but Sevier said his company would be the first to put them into service in the Pacific.

"In addition to adding immeasurably to the pleasure of passengers, we expect to realize savings in fuel, and in time between ports because the ships will be able to maintain course and speed in heavy weather," Sevier said. "We also expect a reduction in cargo damage and voyage repairs."

Meeting Set On Contracts Discrimination

DENVER (UP)—President Eisenhower approved plans Saturday for an Oct. 25 conference at Washington to map further steps toward eliminating racial and religious discrimination in government contracts.

Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell announced the conference after a 40-minute talk with Mr. Eisenhower at the summer White House on Lowry Air Force Base today.

He said Mr. Eisenhower was "very pleased" with plans for the conference, which will bring together government contractors, labor officials and the President's committee on government contracts.

The committee, headed by vice president Richard M. Nixon, was established to study elimination of discrimination because of race, creed or color in factors filling government contracts. Mitchell is vice chairman.

Mitchell also reported to the President on his department's role in the flood disaster relief program in the Eastern states.

The labor secretary told reporters at a news conference later that as much as \$1,000,000 a week in federal-state unemployment insurance may be paid to workers thrown out of work by flood damage to industrial plants and businesses in the east.

Tonsillitis was given his name by his mother, who had tonsillitis when he was born at Ardmore 22 years ago. The family after that, while generally healthy, just took to diseases for names.

A brother, two years younger, was named Meningitis. There are four girls—Appendicitis, Laryngitis, Peritonitis and Jekitis. Doctors say they are unfamiliar with the last name.

Brink Holdup Figure Taken Under Arrest

FOLLY BEACH, S. C. (U) — FBI agents Saturday night arrested Elmer Francis (Trigger) Burke, 37, described as a "self-professed New York killer" who figured in a "fantastic" jail break a year ago.

He also had figured in some of the ramifications of the famous Brink's million dollar holdup.

Julius Lopez, special agent in charge of the Savannah, Ga., office of the FBI said Burke was arrested as he stood under a streetlight on the main street of this beach resort town 12 miles south of Charleston.

Lopez said Burke surrendered meekly. He was not armed, although he had two pistols and two rifles cased in his rented cottage some five blocks away.

The FBI said Burke had been sought for unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for murder as a result of the fatal shooting of Edward Walsh in New York City on July 24, 1952.

He also was sought for unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for assault with a dangerous weapon on a prison guard during a jail break at Boston on Aug. 28, 1954.

Man Charged After Wreck

A Grants Pass man was arrested on a charge of driving while intoxicated after a two-car collision on Highway 99E at Ward drive Saturday night, state police report.

Lodged in Marion County jail was Henry E. Cromwell. No bail was set. A passenger in the Cromwell car, James Delco, also of Grants Pass, was arrested on a charge of being drunk on a public highway, said state policeman Floyd West.

Driver of the other car was listed as Kenneth R. Swisher, Pasadena, Calif. The vehicles incurred dented fenders and the Cromwell car, said police, knocked down a stop sign after the collision.

No one was injured.

WASHINGTON (U) — The Air Force Saturday quashed ouster proceedings against a young reservist who had been accused of associating with his father, an alleged former Communist or Red sympathizer.

Secretary of the Air Force Charles ruled that Airman 3C Stephen Branzovich, 22, of Farrell, Pa., is not a security risk.

Branzovich had been scheduled to appear before a special board next Tuesday to answer ouster charges.

Quarles, announcing he had determined after personally reviewing the case that Branzovich's continued membership in the reserve is consistent with the interests of the national security, said there would be no hearing.

The elder Branzovich said his son "Reminds you of a guy that has been in a dark prison cell for many years and finally is released."

82 Federal Structures Said Needed

WASHINGTON (U) — Eighty-two new federal buildings, mainly post offices, are officially listed as needed in Oregon.

The list is contained in the biennial report to Congress of "eligible" new federal buildings, filed by the General Services Administration and Post Office Department.

The listing does not mean the buildings will be built in the near future, if ever. The report is merely advisory and at first step toward possible congressional authorization and appropriation.

Projects with a proposed cost ceiling of a million dollars or more include a post office-court house at Klamath Falls costing \$1,190,000 and post office buildings at Eugene (\$1,765,000) and Salem (\$1,000,000).

The carryover list also includes the following post office projects: Albany, \$680,000; Canby, \$220,000; Dallas, \$260,000; Dayton, \$202,000; Independence, \$215,000; Junction City, \$220,000; Lebanon, \$280,000; Mill City, under \$200,000; Monmouth \$211,000; Mount Angel, \$211,000; Brooks, \$211,000.

Los Angeles Held Tight in Smog Clutch

LOS ANGELES (U) — Stinking smog brought the Los Angeles area to the stage of alert Saturday for the second straight day.

The warning to cease all outdoor burning was issued at 12:19 p. m. when the ozone concentration in nearby Pasadena reached .51 parts per million in the air. The alert call is mandatory when the ozone reaches .50 parts per million.

The alert lasted 1 hour and 42 minutes and was called off at 2:01 p. m. when the ozone count in Pasadena had dropped to .36.

Friday the alert remained in effect 2 hours 17 minutes when the thickest smog of the year concentrated in the Vernon industrial area and measured .64.

These alarms have been "first alerts." If the concentration reaches 1.00, a "second alert" would bring a halt to all but essential traffic. The "third alert" is the danger alert and could include shutting down industrial plants.

Scientists report that ozone, the most irritating ingredient of Los Angeles smog, is caused primarily by the action of sun on nitrogen dioxide particles.
