Thursday, Sept. 1, scattergunners will get in their first lick of the current wing shooting at game birds when dove and pigeon season gets under way. At this writing there are more doves in evidence this year than last. We have seen many of them of late, darting and speeding through the evening skies. It has made little difference in the direction we have taken from Salem. Doves seem to be any place and every place. They are particularly noticeable in areas where grain is the chief crop.

The Perrydale district usually has an abundance of doves as does the Kings Valley area and the area between Salem and Silverton. Doves are now plentiful in the Homere district and on toward Woodburn and Hubbard. Plenty of the speedsters are gathered in the fields between Albany and Lebanon. It truly looks like a good year for the dove shooter.

Pigeons, on the other hand, have been reported as few and far between. Their range and habits, however, differ greatly from those of the dove. The pigeon lovels elder berries and haunts the mineral springs scattered throughout the state. Unless a person knows right where to hunt he may go for years and never see a band-tailed pigeon.

Tricky Pigeon Due for Deek

Regardless, there will be plenty of pigeons for those who know where to go. They're tough birds to down and more than one gunner has been fooled by an apparently easy shot.

The shot choice with the pigeon shooters is No. 6 while the dove shooters prefer a lighter load, usually a size 8 shot in a low base shell. Gunners after either bird will fare better with a modified choke on their blunderbuss except that in some pigeon areas it may be that long shots require a full choke barrel.

We'll be out for a while on Thursday to see if we can bag a dove or two for Deek. After the last trial our dog figures he would much rather hunt without judgment being passed on his failure to find a bird in 60 seconds.

Detroit reservoir has come back into the trout fishing picture with many good catches being made from the deep water near the log boom. Bait fishing with single eggs has been producing the better catches although trolling has accounted for some as has fly fishing in the upper end of the reservoir.

Wickup Reservoir on Upswing

Wickup Reservoir is now on the upswing again with the algae starting to clear away. The water in Wickup is at an extremely low point and some mighty fine trout are awaiting the fly and spin fishermen. For the big ones use a large hopper fly, a large caddis bucktail or a large royal coachman bucktail.

The Santiam is still offering top fly fishing to local anglers and although the average fish may be in the 8 to 10 inch class there are numerous larger fish in the river. We have heard of several fish this season large enough to walk off with fly and leader. Too, several large fish have been creel to make the last ones seem like "fish tales."

Hoad, Rosewall Finish Sweep
Over U.S. Team in Davis Cup

FOREST HILLS, N. Y. (AP)—Lewis Hoad and Ken Rosewall scored repeat singles victories just for the record book Sunday to give Australia a 5-0 sweep over the United States in the Davis Cup challenge round.

It marked the first complete shutout for American tennis forces since a British team led by Fred Perry and Bunny Austin crushed a U.S. squad headed by Don Budge in 1935 at Wimbledon.

With the cup already clinched as the result of Saturday's marathon doubles victory, Hoad subdue Seixas, U.S. titleholder, 7-9, 6-1, 6-4, 6-4, and the line-splitting Rosewall turned back young Hamilton Richardson of Baton Rouge, La., 6-4, 3-6, 6-1, 6-4.

Richardson was a substitute for Wimbledon champion Tony Trabert, who turned up with blisters on his racket hand in his losing battle with Hoad on Friday. It was the first challenge round appearance for Richardson, a team member for the last four years.

The Davis Cup changed hands in televised ceremonies between matches.

Vice President Richard Nixon, who acknowledged he'd never seen a big time tennis match before, presented the trophy to Harry Hopman, Australian captain, but warned:

"Don't get over-confident. Rest assured we'll be back trying to win the cup next year."

Tribe Humbled By Washington

Dodgers Top Cards; Pirates Belt Braves

The New York Yankees remained at the head of the American League parade Sunday but the Chicago White Sox replaced Cleveland as the runner-ups as the lowly Washington Senators dealt the Indians' pennant hopes a severe blow.

The Yanks and White Sox split their doubleheader to remain a half-game apart as New York won the opener 6-1 and Chicago the second 3-2 before 50,990, the largest crowd of the season at Comiskey Park.

But the Indians, who went into the day tied for first with the Yankees, were the victims of a Washington uprising 8-2 and 13-4 and dropped a full game off the pace.

Meantime, the Boston Red Sox picked up a half-game by clouting the Kansas City Athletics 14-2. The victory coupled with the Yanks' split moved them within 3 1/2 games of the top. Baltimore and the Tigers were rained out at Detroit and the game was scheduled as part of a doubleheader Monday.

Homers Play Role

Home runs played a big role in both of the Yankee-White Sox games. In the first Mickey Mantle hit a three-run homer in the third inning to give Whitney Ford a comfortable margin.

Yogi Berra also homered with one on in the fifth. It was Mickey's 34th and Berra's 23rd. Ford racked up his 15th victory of the season.

Bob Kennedy accounted for all of the Sox runs in the nightcap. With two mates aboard he homered in the first inning off Bob Turley, and Dixie Howell protected the margin with sharp relief pitching after Billy Pierce left in the seventh.

The Senators bunched nine hits, six of them for extra bases, in the middle three innings to score all of their runs in winning the first game from the Indians. One of the extra base hits was a homer by Chuck Courtney.

Chuck Stobbs was the winning pitcher on the strength of one-hit relief hurrying for 6 1/3 innings.

Senators Rally

The second game looked like a pitchers' battle between Mike Garcia and Mickey McDermott until the seventh when the Senators racked up eight runs. The Solons sent 13 men to the plate in the rally as they battered Garcia, Don Mossi and Ray Narleski.

McDermott checked the Indians with six hits, including homers by Ralph Kiner and Al Smith.

Brooklyn all but locked up the National League flag. The Dodgers picked up a game and a half on second place Milwaukee and now lead the Braves by 1 1/2 games with 27 games to play.

While the Dodgers were defeating the St. Louis Cardinals 6-1, the last place Pittsburgh Pirates were taking two from the stunned Braves 5-3 and 2-0.

Philadelphia solidified its hold on third place, three and a half behind Milwaukee, with a pair of victories over Cincinnati 7-6 and 8-3. The Chicago Cubs handed the New York Giants their fourth straight defeat 3-0.

Spooner Hurts Victory

Karl Spooner had one of his good days, pitching a six-hitter and striking out nine as his Dodgers mates supported him with an 11-hit attack against loser Larry Jackson and Allen Gettel. Homers by Gil Hodges, No. 24, and Hoy Campanella, No. 29, settled the issue.

Bob Hall and Vernon Law limited the Braves to seven and four hits, respectively. The Pirates, held to three hits through seven innings by Ray Crone, broke loose for four runs in the eighth to win the opener.

Frank Thomas' two-run single with the bases full drove in the tying and winning runs. Thomas also drove in one of Pittsburgh's two runs in the second game with a double.

Uncle Hugh Luby's strategy was to then walk Hammermeister purposely, filling the sacks. This backfired rather auspiciously as Herm Lewis, next up, coaxed another walk from Dials which forced across the winning run.

Senator Goofed

The Solons came from their 3-5 deficit with single tallies in the eighth and ninth. Gene Tansell driving in the first with a single to center. There should have been more than the one of the ninth, but the Solons goofed things up just as they've been doing so many times during the second half of the pennant chase.

Bill Shields started the surge with a pinch-hit double. Dials failed to bunt him to third as ordered, fouling off a third strike attempt. But then Mel Krause walked and Jack Dunn shot a single to right, scoring Shields and sending Krause to third. The score was now tied, with the potential winning tally resting at third base but one out.

Floyd Robinson as next up rolled softly to Hammermeister, who bluffed at Krause before (Continued on next page)

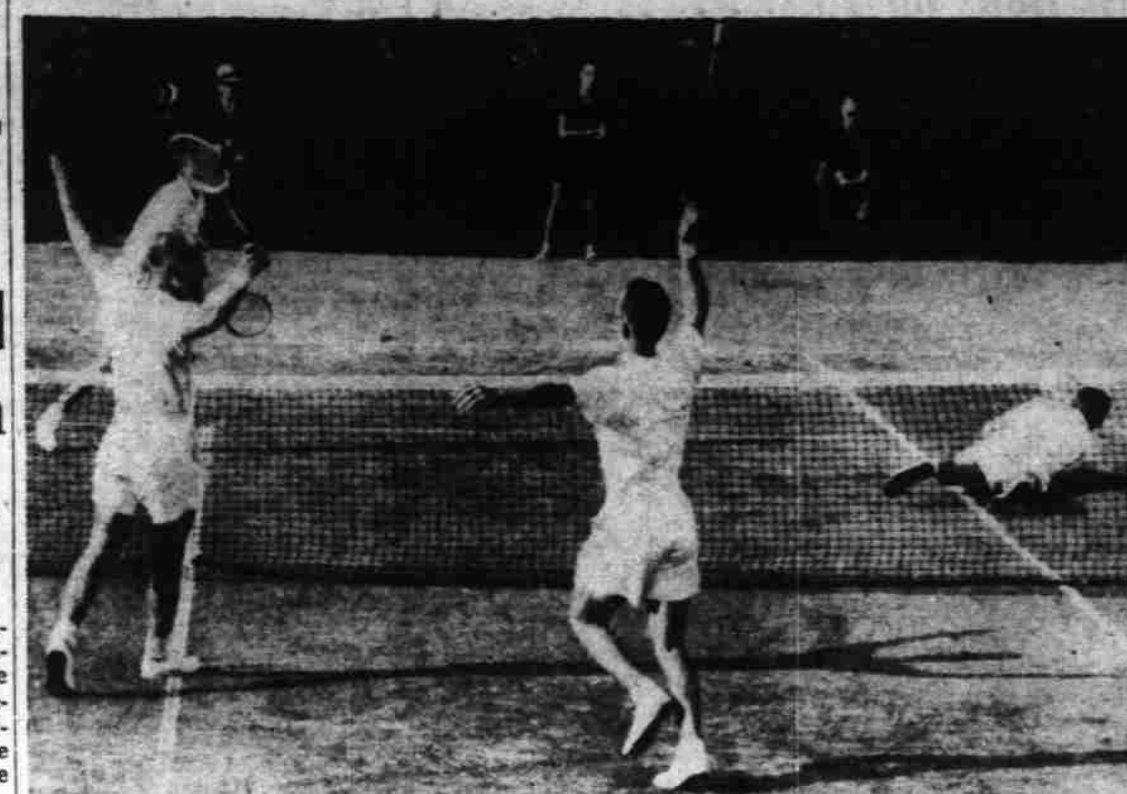

Oakland Sweeps Two From Beavers

Chiefs to Open Here Tonight

A seven inning one-hitter by big righthander Bill Walsh kept the Solons from dropping their third straight game in the series against the Yakima Bears Sunday as the Senators downed the Bears 4-0 in the second game of a doubleheader at Waters Field.

Salem had dropped the first contest Sunday 6-5 in ten innings to the visitors as Herm Lewis walked with the bases loaded, forcing in the winning run. Salem had rallied to tie the score in the ninth. Yakima won Saturday night 5-2.

Walsh, in winning his ninth game against seven losses, had little trouble with Yakima and the lone hit came in the top of the third when Sam Mitchell singled to center field.

Walsh walked five batters and struck out two and faced only 22 batters officially.

Salem broke into the scoring column in the first inning when Mel Krause walked and went to second on a wild pitch, Jack Dunn walked, and then the first run scored on an attempted double play when shortstop Gary Robbins threw the ball away. The second run scored on a double by Gene Tansell.

Tansell Booted

On Tansell's double he stepped off second base and was picked off by a throw from centerfielder Lewis. Tansell argued with base umpire Bogle and received the thumb. Rookie Ray Webster replaced Tansell in the line-up.

The Senators then went scoreless until the sixth frame when successive singles by Webster, Shields, Agosta, and Steinagel drove home the final two runs. In all the winners had seven hits off loser John Kelly, with Agosta having two of them.

The first game was taken in the 10th inning to ruin what had been a rousing relief stint by Bill Dials.

Dials had taken over for staggering Bud Francis in the fourth inning, snuffed out a rally and found himself behind by a 3-0 count. The Yaks had tallied four times off Francis in the third, with Dave Hammermeister's three-run double the big wallop of the uprising.

The Solon relief star then retired the next 16 straight swings, which carried him through the ninth inning. All went blooey in the tenth, even after a double play had erased the first two Yak batters. Sam Mitchell as third up drew a walk, and Lee Maye bounced a drive off Dials' foot, one that caromed into right field and went for a double.
