Sgt. Manuel J. Boyes, state policeman and assistant in the Oregon Crime Laboratory, was appointed Tuesday as acting director of the lab.

Sgt. Boyes to Direct State Crime Lab.

Sgt. Manuel J. Boyes has been named acting director of the Crime Detection Laboratory to succeed Dr. Homer H. Harris, who resigned to enter private practice. It was announced jointly Tuesday by the superintendent of the Oregon State Police and the dean of the University of Medical School, where the laboratory is located.

Sgt. Boyes entered state police service in 1949 and has been operating in the field until his recent assignment to the laboratory as an assistant to the director. Born in Colorado but brought up in Oregon, he attended public schools in Tillamook and after serving five years in the armed forces during World War II entered Lewis and Clark College in Portland. He majored in chemistry and was graduated with a B.S. degree in June 1949. In Army, Air Force

His war service included five years with the 41st Infantry Division where he advanced from private to staff sergeant. He took part in several engagements in the South Pacific and left the division after the operation on Biak Island to become attached to the Air Force, where he continued to serve until his discharge in August, 1945. He holds the badge of combat infantryman.

To Offer Services

The acting director and members of his staff at the laboratory will continue to perform the technical services for district attorneys, sheriffs and police agencies throughout the state, but will not be in position to offer professional medical assistance, Tuesday's announcement said.

Until such a time as a doctor may be engaged, the services of the laboratory will be of non-professional character and the authorities will, of necessity, be compelled to seek the assistance of private practitioners when there is need for medical advice, it was disclosed.

Jewelry Store In Salem Sued For \$25,000

A Salem jewelry store was sued for \$25,000 Tuesday by a woman who charged it with misrepresenting the value of a diamond ring she purchased there in April.

The suit was filed against Weisfield's and David W. Flaks, who sold her the ring, for \$275.

Mrs. Stanley Zeeb, who states she has already paid \$160 on contract for the diamond ring, alleged the store and Flaks acted fraudulently in representing that the ring had a market value of \$550, when its true value was not more than \$150.

In addition to the \$25,000 in punitive damages, she asks \$400 actual damages.

House Damage To Be Paid by Boys' Parents

Parents of two pre-school aged boys have agreed to make restitution to owners of a house the boys vandalized to the tune of several hundred dollars on Hollywood Ave., Marion County sheriff's office reported Tuesday.

The house, located at 3540 Hollywood Ave., was entered by the boys sometime between Aug. 17 and 21. With an axe as a weapon, the boys chopped 26 large holes in its rooms, left numerous axe marks on walls and also damaged tile and floors in the kitchen and bathroom, sheriff's deputies said.

The house, which is for sale, was unoccupied. The boys gained entry through an unlocked door.

Mrs. Robert Short and three children Tuesday received \$123.50 and 12 jars of fruit, pickles and preserves from Statesman subscribers who thus expressed their appreciation for the heroism of their husband and father who died a week ago.

The money consisted of three \$10 checks, one \$10 bill, eight \$5 checks, one \$2 check, four \$5 bills, 21 \$1 bills and 50 cents. In most cases, donors remained anonymous.

Robert Short died in a truck crash in Oregon City when his truck went out of control on a hill. Instead of jumping to safety, he clung to the vehicle honking the horn and shouting to pedestrians to get out of the way. Short had been working in Yamhill County as a logger. His financially-pressed family reside at 4230 Auburn Rd., Salem.

At Oregon City, a trust fund for the Short family, sponsored by the Oregon City Enterprise-Courier was reported Tuesday to have exceeded \$1,000.

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
