

French Form New Regime For Morocco

PARIS — France rushed preparations Wednesday for a change of regime in Morocco despite reports from Rabat that the protectorate's nominal sovereign, Sultan Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafa, will resist efforts to oust him.

Simultaneously, the French officially granted modified home rule to their other North African protectorate, Tunisia, in what they hope can be an example for a solution of the turbulent Moroccan crisis.

Premier Edgar Faure's "committee of five" for North African affairs met twice to study how and when to remove Moulay Arafa from the Moroccan throne and set up a three-man council of the throne to carry on the Sultan's political and religious functions.

The best guess among informed officials was that this delicate operation will be performed early next week as soon as the new French resident general, Gen. Pierre Boyer de Latour du Pin, has taken hold.

Faure announced Boyer de Latour's appointment Wednesday as the premier officially accepted the resignation of Gilbert Grandvaux from the job.

Pork Prices Low, Farm Report Says

WASHINGTON (UP) — Housewives can take a tip from the Agriculture Department's current farm price report—pork is a good food buy now.

The department noted in its report Tuesday that prices farmers got for hogs during the month which ended Aug. 15 were down 26 per cent from a year ago. And with this year's spring pig crop, 9 per cent up from last year's, now beginning to come to market, prices are likely to retreat even further in the next few months.

While the report may have been good news for housewives, it wasn't for farmers. It showed that the hog price drop, aided by drops in prices of corn and wheat, pushed the index of prices received by farmers down 2 per cent from a month earlier.

At 23 per cent of its 1910-14 average, the farm price index was 6 per cent below a year earlier and marked the fourth consecutive month of decline.

Shark Killed After Attack On Lifeguards

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (UP) — A five-foot shark was killed Tuesday after attacking three county lifeguards and biting one of them.

The lifeguards were called to the area after the shark was spotted circling three women swimmers. They encountered the shark 50 feet off the shore crowded with bathers.

The shark was towed to shore after it had been killed by the lifeguards.

Stock Market Rising Again

NEW YORK (UP) — The stock market decided to move up again Wednesday after two days of hesitation following last week's rally.

Gains ran to around 3 points while most losses were in fractions.

Volume totaled 1,890,000 shares compared with 1,740,000 Tuesday.

Of 1,129 issues traded there were 569 advances and 318 declines. There were 41 new highs and 5 new lows.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks rose \$1.00 to \$175.40, with industrials up \$1.90, rails up 70 cents and utilities up 10 cents.

South Auditorium Site Favored by Portland Group

PORTLAND (UP) — The Portland Retail Trade Bureau's executive committee Wednesday was on record favoring the south auditorium site for Portland's proposed 8 million dollar exposition-recreation center.

J. B. Rinker, president of the organization representing some 400 Portland businesses, said the decision was based on a City Planning Commission survey.

Grants Pass Log Accident Fatal

GRANTS PASS (UP) — Lester Oden, 48, was killed in a logging accident in the I. D. Hardin operations about 18 miles southwest of here Wednesday.

Oden was riding a wheeled loader which was being towed by cable attached to a tractor. Witnesses, including Oden's 14-year-old son, said the cable broke and whipped up a cloud of dust.

When it settled, Oden was found unconscious beside the loader. He was rushed by jeep over a logging road to an ambulance sent from here, but was dead on arrival.

Wheat Prices Remain Firm

CHICAGO (UP) — Wheat provided a show of firmness in an otherwise soft grain market on the Board of Trade Wednesday.

The bread cereal closed on gains averaging about a cent, setting the session's best in the final minutes. Trade was rather slow in all grades.

Wheat closed 1/4-1/2 higher, corn 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher, oats 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, rye 1/4 lower, soybeans 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher and lard unchanged to 12 cents a hundred pounds lower.

One factor acting to depress all cereals was that Thursday will be the first day to deliver cash grain on September futures.
