School Traffic Safety Problem At Hayesville

HAYESVILLE—Registration for school will be on Friday, Sept. 9, from 9 to 10 a.m. School begins the following Monday.

Principal Kenneth L. Mohney has issued a special plea that all children exercise extreme caution while on the way to or from school. "One of our biggest problems next week," Mohney said, "will be arranging for adequate highway safety measures for the children."

The highway department, after consultation with Superintendent Snyder, will provide sidewalks on the west side of the south-bound leg of Portland Road, and on the east side of the north-bound leg of Portland Road, from the Park Lane-Kappahn Road intersection to the school.

The sidewalk plan provides school crossings, with 20 mph signs, on one-way legs only. The only two-way school crossing will be directly in front of the school. Principal Mohney will give the twenty children affected by the traffic interchange sidewalk plan special instructions on registration day.

A familiar figure at the school crossing during the morning and afternoon will be Harold Button who begins his ninth year as school custodian and unofficial Traffic Safety Patrol Advisor. Mohney has expressed the gratitude of the community for Button's personal interest in the welfare of the children over the past years.

Hayesville has all returning teachers, with the exception of the principal who transferred here from Hall's Ferry and replaced Wallace Turnidge.

Faculty members are Mrs. Patricia Lee, Mrs. Faith Rice, Mrs. Ethel Carothers, and Mrs. Frances Rawlins, who is also beginning her tenth year at Hayesville.

Mrs. Ardith Case is again in charge of the cafeteria which will serve lunches on the opening day.

TURNER — Funeral services for little Jimmy Leon Bones, who drowned in a shallow ditch near his home at Turner Saturday, will be held in Salem Wednesday.

Services will take place at 10:30 a.m. at the Virgil T. Golden Chapel with interment at Belcrest Memorial Park.

The tragedy occurred when the 18-month-old youngster toddled to the nearby ditch when a babysitter was not looking. Artificial respiration failed to revive the tot.

He is survived by his brother, Billy, 4, and parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lester N. Bones and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Leo Kockstad, and Mr. and Mrs. Vester Bones, all of Turner.

Fire Hazard Closes Woods In Washington

OLYMPIA — Because of continued dry winds, a shutdown of all logging operations in Western Washington has been ordered by State Forester L. T. Webster until Monday midnight.

Webster Sunday clamped a ban on all logging and other woods operations on forest lands in the entire Olympic Peninsula, and in Southwestern Washington north to the King-Snohomish County line.

All burning permits in forested areas also were cancelled.

Everybody but those persons engaged in fire protection has been barred from the woods.

Turks Assemble In London for Demonstration

LONDON — More than 5,000 Cypriot Turks assembled in Trafalgar Square Sunday to denounce enosis — the campaign to make British-ruled Cyprus part of Greece.

More than 2,000 of the demonstrators marched to the square from the cosmopolitan Soho area carrying banners and shouting such slogans as: "Self determination means bloodshed in Cyprus."

"Enosis will mean war." Greeks in Soho had threatened a counter demonstration, but none developed.
