Grand Champions in Shorthorns, Red Polls, Jerseys, Holsteins Chosen at Oregon Fair

Four big breeds of cattle were judged Tuesday to complete one of the heavy judging days of the 90th Oregon State Fair. Included were Shorthorns, Red Polls, Jerseys and Holsteins.

Grand championships were somewhat divided in the Jersey showing. The grand champion cow was Chehalis Beacon VI, winner in the five-year-old class, exhibited by Frank Kinnicum and son, Ronald of Grand Island Jersey Farm at Dayton. Rex Ross of Mt. Angel showed the junior champion, Rosemere Calico Slipper.

Ross Shows Top Jersey

In the Jersey bull division the grand and senior champion was Rosemere's Supreme Crown, bred by Ross but now owned and exhibited by Calvin Mikkelsen. Re-

serve champion, Radar's Sir, exhibited by Eugene Fisher of Halsey. Robert Liff of Independence, showed the junior champion bull.

First place winners were: Bulls—junior calf, senior calf, Robert Liff; senior yearling, Rex Ross; two-year old, Eugene Fischer; 3-year-old, Calvin Mikkelsen. Five-year-olds, Grand Island Jersey Farm, owned by Frank Kinnicum and son, Ronald; 4-year-old, Finnium; 2-year-old, senior heifer calf, dairy herd, junior get of sire, produce of dame, best of three females, Rex Ross, Mt. Angel; three-year-old junior calf, D. C. Brock, Salem; junior yearling heifer, Alex Maurer, Mt. Angel; senior heifer calf, Eugene Fisher. Get of Sire, best uddered cow in show, Finnium.

W. A. Savage of Ladner, B. C. placed the Jerseys.

Holsteins Hold Show

Holstein winners were nearly all from Washington and Multnomah Counties, with the Washington County herd, a Holstein herd composed of cattle from three owners, placing at the top. A. P. Ireland took the grand champion on their senior bull, Linmere Renown Valiant, a 7-year-old who has paced the breed at the last two state fairs and the last two Pacific Internationals at Portland. The Junior champion was exhibited by Lindow while Albert Evers and Son, owner of Ever May Farms, Forest Grove, showed the reserve champion.

The senior champion cow also went on to grand. This was Linmere Rozetta Beauty, owned by Lindows of Portland. Lindows also took the junior championships while the reserve champion went to Elmer and Melvin Bernards of Carlton. Only other blue ribbon winner in the show other than Evers, Bernards, Lindows and Irelands, was Edwin and Priscilla Barber of Nehalem.

Canadians Win

P. J. Rock & Son of Alberta, Canada, was winner of grand champion in the Shorthorn beef cattle female classes that show Tuesday. Rock also won reserve senior championship in females.

The junior champion was exhibited by Remittall Cattle Co., also a Canadian group, and the reserve junior champion by Milloma Farms, Powell Butte. The reserve grand champion was a Remittall animal.

In the Shorthorn bull classes Rock again exhibited the grand champion; Milloma Farms, the reserve senior champion, and Rock the junior and reserve grand champion bull. Only other first place winners in this breed were J. C. Moran of Vernonia.

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Sheep Men Await Award Wednesday

Sheepmen were clicking off their prize winners Tuesday, awaiting the presentation of the Sheepmen's Golden Bell which will be presented Wednesday afternoon following the completion of judging in the sheep division.

The Sheep Breeder offers the bell each year at the Oregon State Fair to the breeder showing the best pen of four lambs, either sex.

Winners in the sheep division Tuesday included: Columbias—Ernest J. Handley, McMinnville, champion ram; Clarence Bernards, also of McMinnville, champion ewe. Bernards took all blue ribbons with the exception of the junior ram blue, which went to Handley. J. M. Davidson of Laramie, Wyo. did the placing.

Both champions in the Shropshire division were exhibited by John W. Hill of Eugene. Edward Gath, Salem, placed this breed, and gave blues to Hill including the yearling ram, ram and ewe lambs, and breeders young flock.

A. B. Leffler, Scio, however, won the silver tray presented by the American Shropshire Association for the best open flock.

Leffler won the blue on his pen of rams. M. O. Pearson, Turner, was also a blue ribbon winner in this breed, showing the tops in yearling ewes, pen of yearling ewes, get of sire and produce of ewe.

Don F. Kessie & Son of Harlan, took nine firsts for Cheviots, including both champions. Bert Denham of Vida, placed first for his ram lamb in this breed and E. F. Mathias of Clackamas took first place in produce of ewe.

In Cotswolds, C. B. Wheeler of Dexter, won all firsts including champion ram and champion ewes.
