Trautman Says Minor Leagues Will Increase

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Minor league baseball, stifled by dwindling interest, is "prone to compare itself too much with the peak years," the head of the lower leagues said Friday.

George Trautman, president of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, added that he felt there would be more minor leagues in operation next summer than the 33 which opened last spring.

"We didn't lose a league all season," Trautman told a press conference. "That's the first time since 1950 that we didn't drop one somewhere along the line. All we lost this year were five cities. I'm convinced that we'll have more than this year's 33 leagues going next summer."

Trautman denied that his visit here has any connection with the plight of the Pacific Coast League, in which both San Francisco and Oakland are the hardest hit by lack of patronage.

Sale Considered Sale of the San Francisco franchise will be considered at a special league meeting Monday in Seattle, and Oakland has indicated it plans to move to Vancouver, B.C., next year.

"I've been invited out here by the Pacific Coast League and other minor leagues just to take a little inventory," Trautman declared. "The immediate future of the Pacific Coast League is a prime problem. I'll admit it. It has been one of the finest of the minor leagues for many years. I wish I knew what was wrong, but I don't. Neither, apparently, does anyone else."

Although declining to say so definitely, Trautman inferred strongly that he felt television was the basic cause of declining gate receipts.

"Sports generally is finding it hard to sell more and more in the hands of commercial sponsors," he said. "Baseball is finding it hard to compete with radio and television, although we had our greatest prosperity in the early days of radio. Now, minor league games are a drug on the market, because stations can buy rights to a major league game for much less than they air a local game."

"The New England area is a prime example. The whole section is under an umbrella of major league broadcasts and as a result we have only one minor league still in operation in the entire area."

Trautman said he planned to attend the PCL meeting at Seattle "if they'll let me in."

CHICAGO (AP) — Members of the Brooklyn Dodgers Friday termed a "hot debate" between Don Newcombe and Duke Snider at Thursday night's victory party in Milwaukee as greatly exaggerated.

Newcombe protested, and directed most of his remarks to Snider, when somebody stole his straw hat and filled it with beer during the three jinks in the clubhouse.

About the exchange of words between the star pitcher and outfielder, Jackie Robinson said: "Newcombe is the type who doesn't like to have anybody fool around with his clothes. This, however, wasn't a routine party and I think now Don is upset at himself for saying what he did."

"After all a team doesn't clinch a pennant every day, and everybody was having fun. Don wasn't the only player to lose his hat."

"Frankly, Newcombe has a semi excuse since he wasn't around two years ago when we had a party just like last night's affair and a lot more hats were lost during the frolic."

SEATTLE (AP) — Two light scrimmages prepped University of Washington football hopefuls Friday for Saturday's game-condition session when Coach John Cherberg hopes to get a line on which men he will start against Idaho Sept. 17.

Sandy Lederman, quarterback on the 1953 squad but out last year with a broken leg, moved up to the first squad Friday as Cherberg continued to experiment with possible successors to the injured Steve Roake.

Lederman, Jerry Redmond and Al Ferraro all will be battling Saturday for the starting choice. The session will be behind locked gates of the stadium and it is unlikely Cherberg will report later who stood out.

McElhenry's Foot on Mend

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The word was good Friday on the injured left foot of Hugh McElhenry, the San Francisco 49ers star running back.

Dr. George C. Bennett, Johns Hopkins Clinic specialist, who checked McElhenry's foot in Baltimore, advised that Hugh soon should be running again.

Dr. William O'Grady, 49er physician, said Dr. Bennett reported nothing seriously wrong. McElhenry, hurt Aug. 13 in an exhibition game with the Pittsburgh Steelers aggravated an old college injury.

After talking by phone with Dr. Bennett, a specialist who worked on Joe DiMaggio's heel and Mickey Mantle's knee, Dr. O'Grady said: "Hugh's injury is nothing we cannot handle locally. We expect to have him ready for the first league game with the Rams Sept. 25."
