Report Shows Turkey Sale Volume Gains

A 65 per cent increase in business over the previous year will be one of the big items of interest in the report to be given at the annual meeting Tuesday of the Oregon Turkey Growers, a cooperative with headquarters in west Salem.

The reports to be given at this meeting will include business up to the close of the fiscal year, ending March 31. Reports also show that the increase in business so far this fiscal year is holding well over 20 per cent above last year's big increase. There is no indication, according to William F. Gerts, manager, that there will be any drop, other than the usual seasonal drops, in this year's turkey sales. Every indication, he said, is for a continued increase throughout the year.

"People are just eating more turkey and in many more ways," he explained Monday in making announcement of the meeting. The report on the physical plant itself will show considerable improvement and expansion. It is now rated as one of the most efficient poultry plants in the state. A feature of the Tuesday afternoon program will be the discussion by Professor James McGinnis of Washington State College, Pullman, Wash., on turkey feeding.

Prof. McGinnis, listed as one of the top authorities nationally in turkey nutrition, will center his talk around the use of barley in turkey feeds. He will also speak of recent nutritional studies on feeding breeder turkeys and the effectiveness of antibiotics in turkey starter feeds. In former reports, Professor McGinnis has stressed the benefit of the antibiotics in controlling many of the diseases which have previously taken heavy tolls among turkey poults. There will be a brief question period, too, during which the speaker will attempt to answer questions asked along turkey nutritional trends.

The meeting will begin at 2 p.m. in Mayflower Hall, and following this the turkey growers will go to the west Salem plant to inspect the improved plant.

At the close of business and plant inspection, the turkey growers will enjoy a turkey barbecue at the plant.

River Victim Identified as Californian

The body of a man found last week in the Willamette River near Keizer has been identified as that of a 43-year-old Marysville, Calif. resident, the FBI reported to the Marion County sheriff's office Monday after a check of fingerprints.

The prints in files at Washington, D. C. showed the man to be Chester Allen Wear, deputies were informed. The prints were the only hope of identification after the jeans-clad body was discovered last Wednesday. The coroner's office said the man had been in the water about two weeks and an autopsy indicated death by drowning.

Reports from several sources told of seeing a man wearing jeans swimming in the river about a week before the body was found. Interment was to be at City View Cemetery Saturday.

Salem Man Gets 3-Year Prison Term

Francis Bernhardt Pattee, 30, 864 1/2 Jefferson St., was sentenced to a maximum three year term in the Oregon State Penitentiary Monday by Marion County Circuit Judge George R. Duncan.

Pattee pleaded guilty to a bad check charge last week. He was the only man sentenced to prison during usual Monday arraignments although Jerome Norbert Gibbons, 19, Sherwood, had his probation revoked on an assault with a dangerous weapon charge and was given six months in jail.

G. Warren Stikeman, 44, Newport, waived grand jury investigation on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. Stikeman did not enter a plea.

Pofrio Menes Higuera, 30, 1245 Mill St., also waived grand jury investigation on a charge of burglary of a Portland Road tavern. Higuera, however, entered a plea of innocence to the charge. Trial date will be set.

Two other men, Larry Foss, 20, and Frank Haertel, 18, both Salem, pleaded guilty to bad check charges after waiving grand jury investigation in circuit court. Both were continued pending receipt of an FBI report.

Damage Suits Filed After Car Accident

Two damage suits stemming from a single accident north of Salem in June were filed Monday in Marion County Circuit Court.

Marnalee Popovich brought the first suit against Emerson Teague alleging his negligence in attempting to pass another car without sufficient clearance caused a head-on crash which injured her. She was riding in a car driven by Jack L. Kaufman, the complaint states. She asks \$35,000 general damages, \$75 for a camera which she states was destroyed and an unspecified amount in special damages.

The second suit, also against Teague, was filed by Robert Popovich, who was also in the Kaufman vehicle. Popovich asks \$2,000 general damages and an unspecified special damages.
