MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — An injury to sophomore guard Dave Burkholder Tuesday left Minnesota with a virtually solid lineup of veterans for Saturday's opener against Washington.

Burkholder, who had wrestled a first string job from Capt. Mike Falls, suffered a severe ankle sprain in Saturday's scrimmage and appears definitely out of the starting team.

With Falls back on the first team, sophomore guard Bob Rasmussen is the only rookie in the Gopher lineup.

Injuries also forced revisions on the No. 2 backfield. Norm Anderson was moved up to left half, replacing Dick Blakley, and Tom Uram and Ron Gohde operated at quarterback. Blakley has an ailing ankle and sophomore quarterback Dick Larson is bothered by a sore shoulder.

Mays Hits Two Homers

In the National, Willie Mays hit his 49th and 50th home runs to match a major league record of seven homers in six consecutive games as the New York Giants pelted Pittsburgh in two, 11-1 and 14-8.

Brooklyn's champs beat Philadelphia 6-3 in the first game of a two-night pair with pinch-hitter George Shuba lining a two-run double to break a 3-3 tie in the eighth off loser Murry Dickson. Don Newcombe, who's won 29, started for the Brooks, but gave way to relief-winner Clem Labine in the eighth.

In the nightcap, the Brooks shelled Robin Roberts to his 13th defeat 6-1 and walloped his 29th and 40th gopher balls of the season — a major league record for home runs off a pitcher in one season. Dickson set the old mark (39) with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1948.

Craig Huris Wins

Frank Kellert and Shuba crushed the tying and record breaking homers in that order. Rookie Roger Craig, meanwhile, shut out the Phils until the ninth for his fifth victory.

Lew Burdette shut out Cincinnati while Milwaukee pounded the Redlegs 7-0. And St. Louis pitchers Ben Flowers and Harvey Haddix whitewashed the Chicago Cubs 2-0 as Solly Hemus poled a two-run homer in the first for the Cards. Haddix relieved Flowers with the bases loaded in the seventh and none out and struck out the side.

Downey Grabs Medal Honors

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Mary Ann Downey of Baltimore chipped and potted superbly on the back nine of the Twin Hills Country Club course Tuesday to annex medalist honors in the Women's Trans-Mississippi golf tournament.

The reigning Eastern champion and 1951 Trans titlist posted a 2-over-par 76 on the wind-swept 6,270-yard course which plays to a difficult par of 37-37-74.

Miss Downey needed only 23 putts for the trophy winning round as she 1-putted six greens on the incoming nine.

Grace Demoss Smith of Miami, Fla., co-holder of the Trans medalist record of 72, soared to an 83. Scores went well past the 100 mark for many of the 179 players.

Match play gets underway Wednesday with single 18-hole rounds daily leading to Sunday's 36-hole championship contest.

Washington Drills On Passing, Punt

SEATTLE (AP) — A light workout stressing passing and punting, offensively and defensively, tuned the University of Washington football squad further Tuesday for its Midwest meeting Saturday with Minnesota.

Coach John Cherberg said he probably will start the same eleven he used against Idaho last Saturday. He indicated, however, he probably would play Sandy Lederman at quarterback frequently, spelling off Steve Roake, who carried the major part of those duties against the Vandals.

Restocking of Lakes Started by State Men

PORTLAND (AP) — The State Game Commission will start cleaning fish out of Thompson Valley Reservoir Sept. 28, the first of five bodies of water to be rehabilitated this year.

Rotenone will be spread over the 600-acre water area to kill the fish. After about three months the reservoir will be restocked with rainbow trout.

To get the same treatment later are Lake of the Woods, Malheur, Warm Springs and Beulah reservoirs.

Injury Plague Hits Bearcats

Willamette to Play Whitworth Saturday

A plague of injuries drew its toll at Willamette Tuesday but the Bearcats still went through an offensive scrimmage as they prepare for their opening football game of the season Saturday night against the highly-touted Whitworth.

Currently nursing injuries are Dean Benson, veteran end who bruised his shoulder in a tackle; Dale Greenlee, letterman tackle who missed the game because of a strained back; Vern Coates, sophomore guard who has a sprained ankle, and Benny Holt, top candidate at quarterback who still has a bruised arm from last Saturday's scrimmage.

Freshmen Praised

Coates and Holt are expected to be all right by game time but may not see full time duty.

Several freshmen drew praise from Coach Ted Ogden and his assistant, Jerry Long, after the Tuesday scrimmage.

Jim Anderson, halfback from South Salem High; Gary Raid, tackle from Woodburn, and three freshmen guards, Dave Ogden of Portland, Jerry Cyphert of Springfield and Jack Sebade of Vancouver, Wash., all gave good accounts of themselves.

Long said the line may be weak in spots due to injuries and inexperience but that he expects the club's forward wall will strengthen as the season progresses.

Guard Switches

Sam Haina, a converted guard, will take Greenlee's place at tackle.

Charles Koani, the Hawaiian 220-pounder who plays both fullback and guard, will probably be used as starting fullback. If he is needed in the line, his younger and 20-pounds-lighter brother, George, will likely fill the backfield post.

The ends should be fairly strong. Long speculated, providing injuries do not take the starters. Benson, Phil McCallister and Vic Backlund are presently able to handle the wing spots well, although Backlund needs more blocking experience.

Dodger Infield Rated Over Yanks, Indians

NEW YORK (AP) — Thirsting for their first world series championship in eight attempts the Brooklyn Dodgers will enter the 1955 fall classic with a formidable infield blended with experience, versatility and youth.

Brooklyn's inner array appears to have a slight edge on both the New York Yankees' and Cleveland Indians' infield because of its balance and maneuverability.

The Dodgers' starting infield shapes up with Gil Hodges (.291) at first base, rookie Don Zimmer (.238) at second base, Pee Wee Reese (.281) at shortstop and

Jackie Robinson (.251) at third base.

Frank Kellert (.324) can spell Hodges at first and Don Hoak (.244) is a capable replacement for Robinson at third. Junior Gilliam, expected to patrol left field, can fill in for Zimmer at second.

Hodges and Reese, both steady hitters and smooth fielders, are the infield standouts. Hodges, a long ball threat, has knocked in 100 or more runs for seven straight seasons. Reese, who has had the unpleasant task of taking part in all five losing series against the Yanks, owns a .278 lifetime series average.

The 36-year-old Robinson, one of the game's most versatile performers and fiery competitors, still is feared as a clutch-hitter and a daring base runner. In Robinson's four previous series he has played three different infield positions as well as the outfield.

Zimmer, Hoak and Kellert all have been instrumental in the Dodgers' surge this season. Zimmer's fine play at second base made possible the shifting of Gilliam to the outfield.

The Yanks also are well-fortified in the infield with a quartet of players who have proven themselves under world series fire. The

New Yorkers have depth among their infielders, but they do not rate as strong defensively as Brooklyn.

The Yankees' veteran infield array includes Joe Collins (.234) at first base, Billy Martin (.235) at second base, Phil Rizzuto (.239) at shortstop and Gil McDougald (.282) at third base.

Collins is expected to alternate at first with Bill Skowron (.318) and Eddie Robinson (.200) who also is available for pinch-hitting duties. Jerry Coleman (.229) can play both second and short, while Andy Carey (.255) was the third baseman most of the season.
