

Sailplane Pilot Glides to Pleasure With Updrafts

WASHINGTON — (UP)—Commander H. C. N. Goodhart, a Royal Navy officer with the British Joint Services Mission here, is an expert sailplane pilot. Goodhart called sailplane flying, or soaring, "an indescribable pleasure."
"Two months ago I went up to 37,000 feet over the Sierra Nevada in California. It was absolutely delightful. The scenery was superb, the silence complete," he said.

Staying aloft in soaring is a matter of finding a thermal, or updraft of air, and circling upward in it until the current is no longer strong enough to sustain the craft. The pilot then glides to another thermal in order to stay up. The best updrafts are found under newly formed cumulus clouds. Taking off is usually accomplished by getting a tow from a conventional airplane or a truck.

Going Up Is Best
"The most exciting part of soaring is circling your way up in a thermal," Goodhart said. "When you enter you feel a slight turbulence, a bubbling sensation. The thing is alive. It effervesces. The plane gives an upward heave and you bank sharply until you find the 'That's where the art and skill come in—knowing how to keep in the center of the updraft and how fast to climb without stalling.'"
The typical sailplane is 18 feet

long with a 45-foot wing span. It is generally made of wood or aluminum and weighs about 350 pounds. Cost is about \$3,500.
Goodhart's most recent triumph in the sport was at the 22nd annual soaring championships, held at Elmira, N. Y., July 2-14. He outpointed 28 competitors to win the event but was declared ineligible because he is not a U. S. citizen. Longest flight in the contest was from Elmira to Wilmington, Del., a distance of almost 200 miles. Goodhart did it in five hours and 47 minutes.

Texas Updrafts Bigger
The 35-year-old officer's gliding ambition is still unfulfilled, however. He has yet to receive a Gold C with three diamonds, awarded to those making a sailplane flight of 312 miles. No Britisher has ever won the honor but Goodhart offered an explanation for this—"You can't go 312 miles in Great Britain without going over the edge."

He hopes to achieve his goal sometime in August in Texas where the updrafts "like everything else in that state, are bigger and better than anywhere else in the world," Goodhart said the summer heat in Texas provides thermals rising to about 15,000 feet, which would give excellent gliding conditions at 12,000 feet for the flight.
Goodhart has 22 years military service behind him, four of them as a test pilot. "Wonderful work, test piloting," he said. "Laziest work in the world."

Stock Market Sags Quietly

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market sagged quietly Tuesday until the final hour when a modest buying flurry pepped up prices.
The net result was a lot of improvement all around but a mixed close that had a slightly lower look about it.
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was down 10 cents at \$100.00. The industrial component was up 10 cents, rails were up 10 cents, and utilities were lower by 20 cents.
There were 463 stocks higher and 467 lower out of the 1,197 traded. Thirty-five stocks made new highs for the year and 15 touched new lows.
Volume was moderate at 2,090,000 shares. That compares with 2,380,000 Monday.
