

Sultan 'Agrees' to Quit Morocco Rule

PARIS (AP) — French informants said Friday night Sultan Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafat has promised to quit the French Moroccan throne peacefully for the sake of calm and order in the protectorate.

A statement to this effect was signed by the aging Sultan without any conditions and he is expected to leave in the immediate future, said these usually reliable sources.

Man Rescued From Box Car After 5 Days

TACOMA (AP) — A wiry little Indian who gambled for his life with a piece of string was rescued Friday after spending five days in a refrigerator boxcar.

Nelson George, 46, said he had given up hope of getting out of the boxcar alive when a brakeman on a passing train spotted his makeshift distress flag.

More thirsty than anything after his ordeal, George said he crawled into the boxcar on a siding in nearly Puyallup Monday to "get out of the rain."

"I dozed off and then I heard the door slam shut," George said Friday night at a hospital here. "I shouted for them to open up but I guess no one heard."

"I didn't think I'd get out alive," George said. But after four dreary days of "conserving" his strength, he started to burrow his way to freedom.

George, a part-time gardener from the Quinalt Reservation, had a pair of pruning shears in his jacket pocket.

He scratched through a four-inch layer of insulation and then gouged a small hole through the side of the car with the shears.

He tied a bit of cloth to the end of a piece of string, shoved it through the hole and started pulling it up and down outside of the car to attract attention.

A brakeman on a passing freight saw the flag and notified Northern Pacific Railway officials at Puyallup.

Hugh Dietz, an NP employee, located the car and police released George from his near-tomb.

George, apparently in good condition despite his ordeal, was kept at a hospital here Friday night for observation.

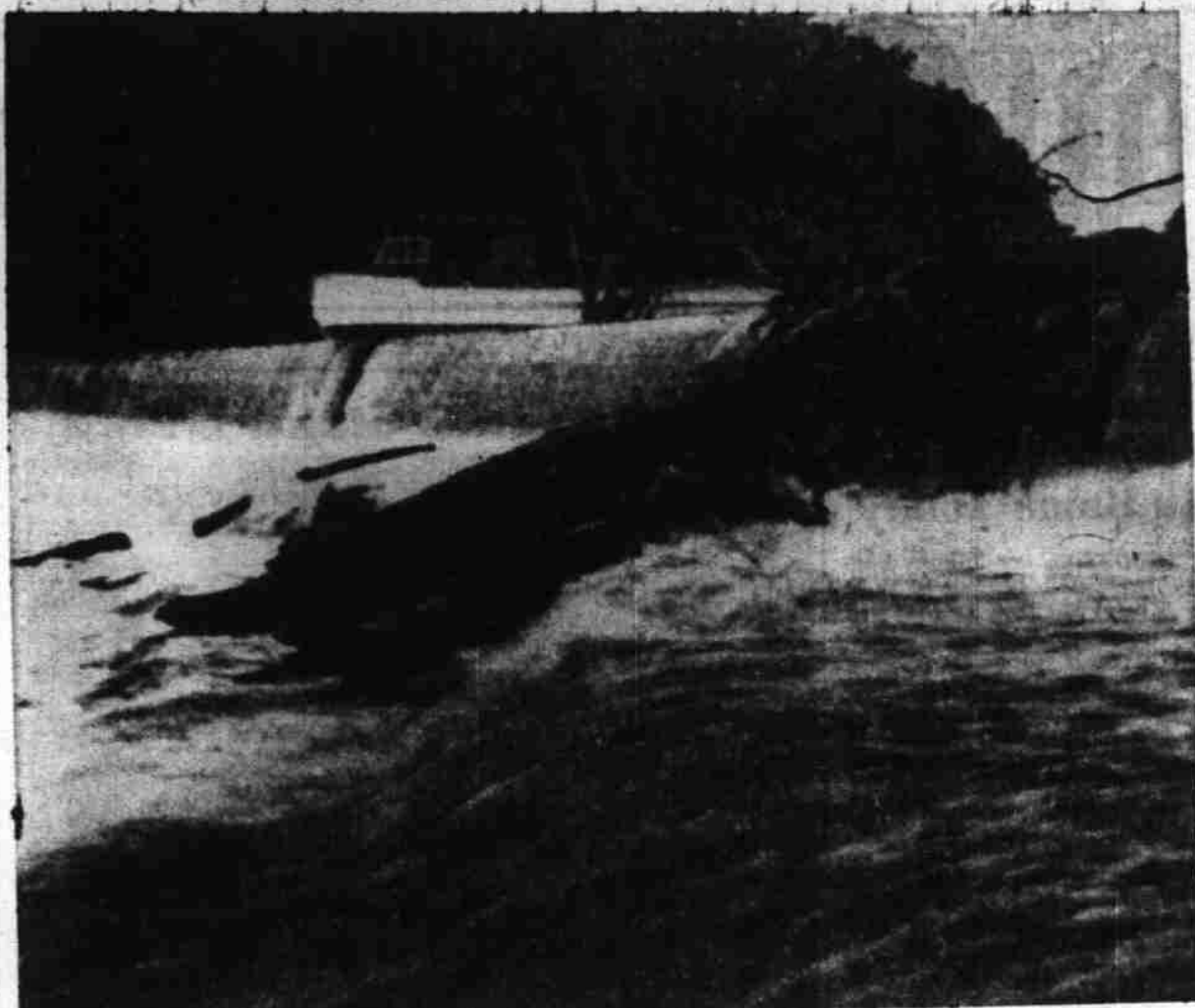

Janet's Rains Wash Away, Mexico Roads

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Rivers flooded by hurricane Janet's heavy rains covered or washed out highways and communications lines over a long stretch of Mexico's Gulf Coast Friday, delaying reports of the storm's toll.

Coastal towns from Tuxpan to below Nautla, a small fishing port 75 miles north of Vera Cruz, have not been heard from directly since the season's most vicious tropical storm crashed inland Thursday and beat itself out against the Sierra Madre Mountains.

Floods extended inland as far as Pachuca, 100 miles west from the coast and 70 miles north of Mexico City on the main tourist highway from the United States.

There were some radio communications with the fringes of the flooded area and no reports mentioned any deaths or injuries.

Before dying in the mountains Janet had taken an estimated toll of 200 lives in Mexico, chiefly on Yucatan Peninsula plus 200 others as she roared across the Caribbean islands.

A fleet of cargo planes took off Friday with food, clothing and medicines for Chetumal, hardest hit of the Yucatan towns. Air force pilots estimated 170 died in Chetumal, a town of 5,000 population, when 125-mile winds leveled its wooden buildings.

The airlift to Tampico, an oil port of 110,000 which has been flooded by three hurricanes this month, continued to augment dwindling food supplies and bring in medical supplies to combat outbreaks of typhoid and dysentery.

A relief ship was unable to enter the port because of power currents sweeping down the flooded Panuco River.

Thousands began a mass exodus from Tampico Thursday.

Dairy Cattle Congress to Open in Iowa

WATERLOO, Iowa (AP) — The 43rd national dairy cattle congress opening here Saturday, will have an international accent this year.

First cattle to reach the exposition barns were 17 sleek milking Shorthorns from Northland Farms, Paris, Ontario, Canada. There will also be an entry from South America, congress officials said.

In all, 2,000 head of blue ribbon cattle and 120 Belgian horses are entered. The show last through Oct. 8.

Highlighting the congress, will be official national breed shows of Ayrshires, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein and Milking Shorthorns. A nation-wide showing of Jerseys will round out the cattle events.

The national Belgian horse show and mid-west saddle horse show are also popular congress events. Three national dairy cattle judging contest, will be held during the congress.

They are the intercollegiate, 4-H, and Future Farmers of America.

Two Selected as AP Chairmen

PORTLAND (AP) — Roland Miller and Lucien P. Arant Friday were named chairmen of the Washington and Oregon Associated Press members.

Miller, publisher of the Walla Walla Union-Bulletin, was re-elected to his post by Washington members. Arant, publisher of the Baker Democrat Herald, succeeds Frank Jenkins of the Klamath Falls Herald & News, as Oregon chairman.

Robert L. Taylor, 34, Lebanon, who died Friday from injuries suffered in an auto accident near Gates Sept. 23, was a native of Marion County, having been born in Mill City June 8, 1921.

He attended Mill City schools and moved to Lebanon in 1940. The same year he married the former Helen Bassel of Sublimity at Clayton. She survives as do the couple's three children, Robert, 13; Charlotte, 12, and Larry, 8, all of Lebanon.

Taylor operated the Santiam Electric Co. at Lebanon and resided with his family at 571 W. Rose St. there. The deceased was a World War II veteran, having served in the U. S. Navy, and belonged to the Elks, Knights of Columbus and Catholic Church.

Other survivors include the father, Frank A. Taylor, Salem; step-mother, Mrs. Blanche M. Taylor, Salem; mother, Mrs. Grace Lamericks of Texas; sisters, Mrs. Margaret Satrum, Lebanon, and Mrs. L. C. Debus, Alaska; uncle, Ervin E. Taylor, Woodlake, Calif.; two nephews and a niece.

Funeral arrangements are pending. The Virgil T. Golden Co. is in charge.

Hope Grows For Hurricane Hunter Crew

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Faint hope that 11 men who vanished on a hurricane hunter plane may still be alive spurred the Navy Friday to continue its air and surface search of the Caribbean.

An Air Force plane reported that it had sighted what appeared to be two life rafts in the Caribbean. The plane was flying at 8,000 feet and said it could not make a search because it didn't have sufficient fuel.

Navy authorities directing the search said they were "not too enthusiastic" because the area where the life rafts were reported was "not too close" to the area where the missing plane was last reported.

The plane was last heard from at 8:33 a. m. (EST) Monday. It reported then that it was entering the wall of winds surrounding the center of hurricane Janet, the season's most vicious storm that swept through the Caribbean and into Mexico, leaving a trail of about 400 dead and thousand homeless.

Portland Tavern Brawl Kills Man

PORTLAND (AP) — Jesus Avalos, 24, a Mexican farm worker, died early Friday of stab wounds after a brawl in a tavern.

Police charged another Mexican worker, Arnold Y. Valencia, 34, with second degree murder. John Auss Castillo, 32, was jailed as a material witness.

Special U.S. Envoy Meets Nasser Today

CAIRO (AP) — A special American envoy, George Allen, meets Premier Gamel Abdel Nasser Friday in an 11th hour bid to counter Egypt's announced intention of buying arms from the Communist bloc. But his mission met with annoyance in high Egyptian circles.

Members of Egypt's governing Revolution Council privately expressed anger at press reports the U. S. assistant secretary of state might threaten to cut off American economic aid to Egypt if she goes through with the deal to swap cotton and rice for Czechoslovak arms. Egyptian leaders interpreted this to mean Allen came to Egypt to serve an ultimatum.

Allen arrived Friday. The British and French ambassadors planned to see Nasser Saturday also to add their voices to the protest.

In Washington, as Allen left on his mission, sources said he was prepared to warn Egypt if she brought about a radical change in the power balance, the United States would be obliged to review its policy of economic cooperation with Cairo for economic development.

Informed quarters here said Allen might offer Nasser a scheme to finance Egyptian purchases of American arms as a substitute for the Czech deal.

On his arrival here, Allen would not expand on the reasons for his visit except to say that "Much which has been printed about my mission has been incorrect." He said he came to Egypt to try to understand Egyptian policy and clarify American policy.

The Egyptians indicated they were in no mood to receive an ultimatum from any quarter.

Jets Attack British Ship

TOKYO (AP) — Peiping radio said Saturday two Chinese Nationalist Thunderjets Friday attacked a British freighter off Red China's southeast port of Swatow, wounding two crewmen.

The broadcast said the 1,972-ton Tefkros was subject to two diving attacks by two of four Thunderjets which appeared over Swatow. The radio receiver and a store room were reported damaged.

Peiping quoted the ship's captain, A. J. Marchant, as saying the attack was "a plain murder." The two crewmen were taken to a hospital in Swatow, Peiping said.

Fuel Surges To Alaska by Long Pipeline

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Fuel for aircraft at Alaska's interior bases has begun to flow through a new 626-mile military pipeline.

The 40 million dollar ribbon of steel "has been tested and is in full operation — Performing as it was designed — pumping jet and diesel fuels, aviation and automotive gases northward."

The Corps of Engineers Alaska District announced at its headquarters here.

The new line eliminates the risk of transporting the fuel for aircraft at the big interior bases by ship across the stormy and vulnerable Gulf of Alaska, where submarines could lurk in time of emergency. Tankers ply the protected "inside route" to Southeast Alaska to discharge their cargoes at the head of enclosed Lynn Canal.

Dog's Life Better Than Human's, Judge Declares

KITCHENER, Ont. (AP) — A city magistrate says an inmate of the Kitchener jail doesn't lead even a dog's life.

A proposal before the city council calls for building a new humane society shelter for \$40,000. Magistrate J. R. H. Kirkpatrick said he favors the plan but wants similar consideration for human prisoners.

The judge said animals at the humane society's kennels are better off in three respects — they have better food, more privacy and also enjoy exercising privileges.

POLIO FATAL

OSWEGO (AP) — Clackamas County recorded its first polio fatality of the year with the death Thursday of Gordon B. Robinson, 28-year-old Oswego businessman.

Court Upholds Conviction of Dickenson

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U. S. Court of Military Appeals Friday upheld the conviction and 10-year sentence given Corp. Edward S. Dickenson for collaborating with the Communist captors in Korea.

The decision by the three-man court was unanimous.

Chief Judge Robert E. Quinn said in the court's opinion that the court martial which convicted Dickenson had before it adequate evidence that Dickenson had informed on fellow prisoners and otherwise had carried favor with the Communists.

Dickenson, 24-year-old soldier from Cracker Neck, Va., was tried by court martial in the spring of last year.

U. S. QUITS EFFORT

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The U. S. government has given up in its 10 year long effort to deport Harry Bridges and will not appeal a recent Federal court decision holding that the government had not proved Bridges was ever a Communist.

State Colleges Enrollment Hike Tops Estimates

EUGENE (AP) — Registration at the six schools under the Oregon System of Higher Education is running well ahead of the 8 per cent budget estimate.

This means that the Board of Higher Education probably will have to submit a revised budget. At the present rate of enrollment, enrollments will exceed those of a year ago by 16 per cent, the Chancellor's office said.

The colleges and the university still have several registration days left, and enrollment has not yet started at the Medical and Dental schools.
