Little Oddities

Pumpkin, Peppers Go Into Kettle To Brighten up Wintertime Menus

Pumpkins mean Jack-O-Lanterns to some folks, pies to others, but now we find a recipe that can widen the use of this fall vegetable, making it useful to more folks.

New Englanders put large or small pumpkins on their front stoops, by way of heralding the harvest season and brightening up the house on dark autumn days. We found it a colorful custom—just as pretty and significant as our front door Christmas decorations.

Try this on your pumpkin:

PUMPKIN PICKLE
6 pounds pumpkin 2 tablespoons whole cloves
5 pounds sugar 6 sticks cinnamon
2 cups lemon juice or
1 white vinegar

Discard seeds of pumpkin and peel it. Slice and cover with sugar. Let stand overnight. In morning add lemon or vinegar, bring slowly to a boil and cook until pumpkin is clear, adding spices tied in a bag. (May omit spices if desired.) When clear and syrup thick, pack in hot jars, pour syrup over it and seal.

ZUCCHINI JAM
5 pounds zucchini squash 3 lemons (juice and rind)
10 cups sugar 3 pieces ginger root

Peel and cube zucchini fine, discarding seeds. Let stand with sugar overnight. A good amount of liquid will be drawn off during the night. Cook this liquid down for awhile, until beginning to show a tendency to thicken. Add zucchini. In the meantime, grind lemon rind with the ginger root which has been softened in some of the juice. Add the zucchini and ginger-lemon to the syrup and boil until it is thick enough. This makes 5 pints.

Then there is another favorite recipe in many circles—a recipe for red pepper jam, to use this vegetable that has a relative short season, and shows such intriguing color. The jam's pretty, too.

RED PEPPER JAM
12 sweet red peppers 1½ pounds sugar
2 quartered lemons 1 vinegar

Seed and chop the peppers. Cover with cold water, bring to a boil. Drain and cover with vinegar. Add lemons, cook slowly for 30 minutes. Remove lemons, add sugar and cook until thick as marmalade.
