DAR Chapter Holds First Meeting

The Rev. Addison Talbot, of the National Council of Churches, who is employed at Chemawa Indian School, was the speaker at the Saturday meeting of the Chemeketa Chapter, DAR at the YWCA. He told of the attempts to integrate the Indian into the white man's culture and of the difficulties involved. Chemawa is the oldest boarding school for Indians off the reservation in the country, having been established over 70 years ago. This year there are 487 Navajo Indian students and 141 Northwest Indians in attendance.
