Norblad Asks Dredge Work

An adequate budget for the year starting July 1, 1956, to complete the Columbia River dredging program was urged by U. S. Rep. Walter Norblad in a letter sent Wednesday to Rowland R. Hughes, director, Bureau of the Budget, Washington, D. C.

Norblad said the dredge Esayons is coming from New York to the mouth of the river early next spring to begin dredging operations under the current appropriation which he hoped would continue until October or November.

"If money is not made available to continue this work after July 1 of next year it would be a waste of money to have the dredge operate in this area for only two or three months," Norblad averred.
