Mint Control Area Planned In 3 Counties

A mint control area will become operative in Jefferson, Crook and Deschutes counties Oct. 10, the State Agricultural Department reported Wednesday.

This means, officials said, that any planting stock going into that area from any other place in Oregon from outside the state must be cleared by plant officials.

Planting stock, under the order, must be free of these diseases, pests and weeds: wilt, rust and nematode organisms, strawberry weevils, mint flea beetles and the common symphylids, yellow nut grass, quackgrass, morning glory, Canada thistle, white top or hoary cress, Bermuda grass and Russian knapweed.

Rev. Holland Accepts Post At Ashland

The Rev. B. J. Holland will leave Salem to become pastor of First Presbyterian Church in Ashland, Nov. 1.

He has been assistant pastor of Salem's First Presbyterian Church the past four years. His resignation was given Tuesday night to the session of the church. A committee was then named to work with the pastor, Dr. Paul N. Poling, in selecting a new assistant pastor.

The Rev. Mr. Holland preached in Iowa and Illinois churches before coming to Salem. He is a graduate of Presbyterian Seminary of Dubuque.

In other church business, decision was made to begin on Nov. 17 the finance campaign for a new church for the congregation. The present church at Winter and Chemeketa Streets in the Capitol Mall has been sold to the state. The new church will be located somewhere in the block south of Chemeketa and west of Winter, where the church owns two properties. Stanton, Boles, Maguire and Church, Portland architects' firm, has been retained to plan the new structure. Partner Glen Stanton had helped design the present church about 25 years ago.

Traffic Light Proves Costly

Running a red traffic light at Fairgrounds road and Myrtle street resulted Wednesday in \$43 in fines for Harold L. Copeland, 2784 Brooks Ave.

It was not a case of an unusually high fine for missing the light. Copeland paid \$3 for that, two fines of \$5 and \$10 for driving without an operator's license, and one for \$25 on a charge of disorderly conduct.

Tumble From Truck Brings Damage Suit

A tumble from the back of a truck was the basis Wednesday for a suit filed in Marion County Circuit Court against a Stayton man for \$27,500 damages.

The action was filed by Ben M. Entekin who alleges he suffered disabling and disfiguring injuries because of the negligence of Hubert K. Bones last Aug. 14. Entekin said he was riding on the back of the truck, operated by the Bones, about three miles south of Aumsville, when the mishap occurred.

Entekin said because Bones drove too fast, swerved unnecessarily and the tailgate on the truck was too low, that he was bounced from the truck. He said he suffered a brain concussion, abdominal, shoulder injury and a broken toe as a result.

Mrs. Thiessen Of Salem Dies

Mrs. Mildred Thiessen, longtime resident of Salem and wife of H. A. Thiessen Sr., died Wednesday at a Salem hospital.

Late resident of 412 N. 21st St., Mrs. Thiessen was a member of Order of Eastern Star, Victoria Chapter 76 at Turner and a member of the Christian Science Church.

She was born March 14, 1882, in Ringwald, England, and came to the United States about 1888. She arrived in Oregon in 1899 and has lived in the Salem and Turner area since.

In addition to the widower, she is survived by son, H. A. Thiessen, Jr., of Jefferson; daughter, Usona Thiessen of Salem; brothers, Gerald Gower of Portland and William Gower of Newberg; two grandchildren, and three nephews and a niece.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 1:30 p.m. at the Clough-Barrick Funeral Chapel.

Thief Raids Cabin, Ready For Winter

A thief, apparently with a thought for the long, cold winter nights ahead, raided his North Santiam River summer home, James S. Mosolf, Salem manager of Sears, reported Wednesday. Listed as missing from the Mosolf house as a result of the burglary were eight blankets, six pairs of sheets, six pillow cases, two chenille bed spreads, one sleeping bag, a woman's suit and other items of clothing.

Marion County sheriff's deputies who investigated the break-in said the burglar pried open a bedroom window and then stripped the beds and closets of bedding and some clothing.

Other items in the house, including a gun over the mantel, were not molested, deputies said. Mosolf said the burglary had occurred some time between September 25 and Tuesday when it was discovered.

Unclassified State Workers 'Entitled' to Vacation Rights

Employees and officers in the unclassified service of the State of Oregon are entitled to the same vacation privileges that are provided for personnel of the Classified Civil Service, Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton held Wednesday.

Thornton said the resignation of George Spaur as state forester, followed by presentation of a voucher for compensation due him.

The attorney general ruled, however, that the 1953 act authorizes vacations for unclassified officers and employees without regard to the manner in which their regular compensation is authorized.

Reference in the 1953 act to "salaries fixed by law," Thornton said, is limited to the requirement for establishing a pay plan, comparable to the general state pay structure, for unclassified employees and officers whose compensation is not fixed by law.

for 200 hours "annual leave with pay," representing vacation not taken, furnished the first occasion for construing the 1953 act.

Question was raised by accountants for the Secretary of State as to the legality of making such payment to Spaur in lieu of vacation, on the basis that the state forester's salary is fixed by law.
