### Area Loses Employment Preference

The Portland - Vancouver area has been reclassified so that it no longer is entitled to special consideration in awarding defense contracts, the U. S. labor department advised the state unemployment compensation commission Thursday.

Because of a high level of unemployment, the area has been classified in group D for the past year. This classification gave the area a preference in awarding contracts for defense.

But reduced unemployment in the region has resulted in reclassifying it in group C.

The area includes Clark county, Wash.; and Multnomah, Washington and Clackamas counties in Oregon.

The area now has 248,000 non-farm workers, compared with 229,900 last winter, and 242,400 a year ago.

Average weekly earnings in the four counties rose to \$53.66 in August, a gain of \$6.67 above a year ago.

As a result of being placed in group D, a Portland firm got a big ship conversion contract that will give jobs to 1,000 workers.

### Investigators Form Firm

A private investigations firm was added to the Salem business list Thursday with the filing of an assumed name for Private Investigators by E. J. Perry, listing a Salem address of PO box 1616.

The firm intends to conduct a bureau of investigation in Oregon, Nevada and California, according to the document filed with the Marion County clerk's office.

### Kellogg Park Industrial Use Possible

Possible release of Kellogg Park, Milwaukie, for industrial development providing interested agencies offer some other site suitable for a permanent army reserve training center, was indicated by Col. N. A. Matthias, Corps of Army Engineers, Seattle, in a letter to U. S. Rep. Walter Norblad received Thursday.

Or as an alternative, Matthias said, the army might release all but five acres of the tract required for construction of the reserve training center.

Norblad was advised by Matthias that pending construction of an armory there is a military requirement for some 3.5 acres and buildings consisting of a community building, garage and fire house.

Matthias said the General Services Administration has been advised as to the extent of army requirements and it would appear that the remaining lands in the project could be released by the agency insofar as army necessities may dictate.

He said it also had been suggested to local agencies that it might be possible for the army to use some other site in the vicinity providing the interested agencies arrange to make a suitable site available.

### E. A. Schlecht Rites Friday

DALLAS—Services for Edward August Schlecht, 54, Pendleton, will be at 2 p.m. Friday at the Bollman Chapel in Dallas. Interment will be at Dallas Cemetery.

Schlecht, who died Monday at Pendleton, had lived in that area for five years. He was born Aug. 18, 1901, in Cumming County, Nebraska.

Survivors include three brothers, Fred of Dallas, Irvin of Independence and Herbert of Klamath Falls.

A retired carpenter, Mr. Donahue moved to Woodburn about a year and a half ago.

He was born in Iowa, Sept. 15, 1871. He and Emma L. Styers were married July 28, 1891, in Beaver City, Neb.

He leaves his wife in Woodburn; brothers John and Clinton; Cheyenne, Wyo.; sister Mrs. Winifred Johnson, San Diego, Calif.; granddaughter Mrs. Beryl Wagner, Vancouver, Wash.; and two great-grandsons. His only son died in 1941.

The Rev. S. E. Harris of Woodburn will conduct the funeral.

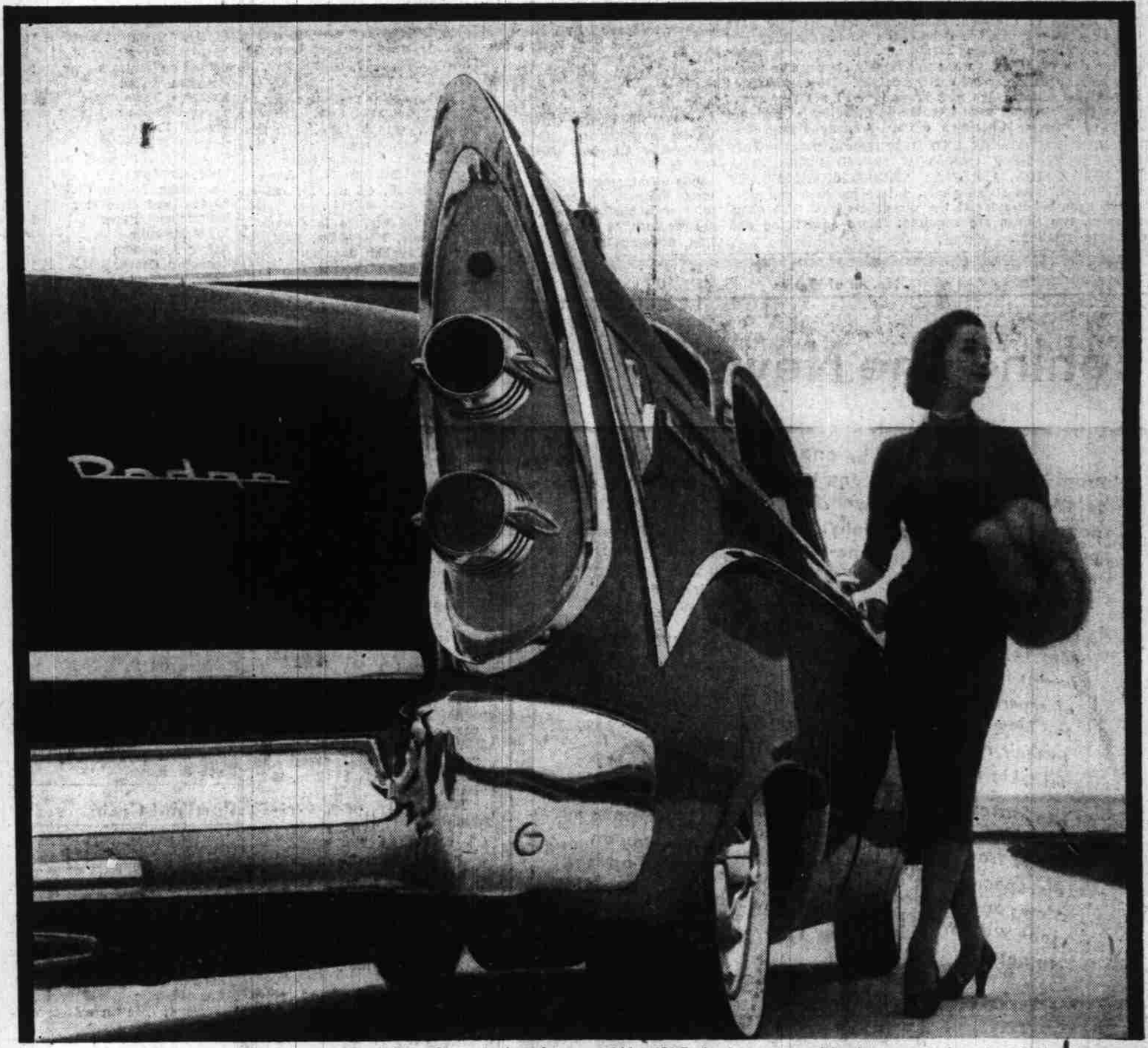
### Student Housing

The First Presbyterian Church has announced it would build in the block in which the razing now is underway but the exact location of the new church has not been determined.

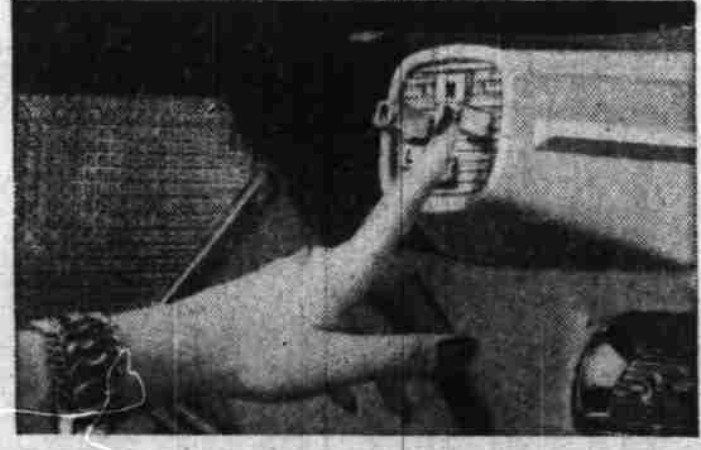
