Problem of Courthouse Parking Aired

An old problem — parking — cropped up again for the new Marion County Courthouse Thursday and Sheriff Denver Young was authorized to issue tickets to violators.

Sheriff Young appeared before the Marion County Court Thursday morning to report repeated complaints of double parking and illegal parking in marked stalls. In one incident the rightful occupant of a parking stall, finding the stall already occupied, parked and locked his car behind the other and was given a ticket, Young reported.

The sheriff indicated that an effort might be made to check and ticket automobiles of businessmen in the courthouse vicinity who have been using parking places reserved for use of courthouse patrons.

Herman New Thornton Aide

Appointment of Peter S. Herman as an assistant attorney general was announced by Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton here Thursday.

Herman was born in Brooklyn, N. Y., and served in the U. S. army from 1945 to 1947. He spent a year in the Philippines where he served as a claims investigator for the army.

Oregon Labor Supply Lowest In 3 Years

Oregon's labor supply, estimated at 15,900, has dropped to its lowest level in three years, the state unemployment compensation commission reported Thursday.

Klamath Falls issued an urgent call for about 600 potato pickers for a five-week harvest.

Most serious shortages of workers were around Portland and in eastern Oregon.

Fewer than 2,000 persons east of the Cascades were looking for jobs, commission officials said.

Living quarters are available for single men near the potato fields but because of the few labor camp cabins unoccupied, families or groups were advised to check with local officials before entering the area.

Most Willamette valley and coastal employment offices reported more persons looking for work than a month before with Salem, Astoria, Tillamook and Coos Bay having the largest increases.

Payments of benefits to insured workers during September dropped to \$476,516, lowest since July, 1952. The monthly total was 20.1 per cent lower than in August, 57.2 per cent below a year ago and the lowest September in four years. In addition \$11,900 was paid to laid-off federal personnel and \$20,617 to veterans of the Korean action.

Three to Leave For Military Duty

Three Marion County men will leave Salem Monday for induction into the armed services the following day at Portland Induction Station.

Marion County Selective Service Board announced Thursday that these men are scheduled for induction: Richard H. Buren and Chester S. Cushing III, both of Salem, and Noble Dean Palmer of Silverton.

County Needs Foster Homes For Teenagers

Marion County's juvenile department went home hunting Thursday for a foster home for its "awkward" age 13 and 14-year-old wards.

"If we had a juvenile tonight between the ages of 12 and 14 we would not have a place to put him," Dr. James Ashbaugh, county juvenile officer stated. The foster home used for the past year by the county is no longer available because the woman who operated it has moved out of the county, Ashbaugh said.

Circuit Judge Joseph Felton pointed out that the department is not permitted to keep youngsters under 14 who are wards of the court by reason of dependency in the juvenile detention ward of the county jail.

"We have a foster home willing to take these youngsters up to the age of 12, but that doesn't take care of those in between," Judge Felton said.

Some 49 juvenile court wards were kept a total of 434 days at the previous foster home during the past year, Judge Felton reported.

The court needs a foster home where it can take youngsters at any time of the day or night and where they will be fed and supervised while waiting disposition of the court.
