

Faure Sends Aide To Study Morocco

PARIS (AP)—Premier Edgar Faure Friday sent his new defense minister, Gen. Pierre Billotte, to take a first hand look at Morocco. His government was fighting for its life on the question of reforms in the terrorist-ridden North African protectorate.

Billotte's precise mission was not clear. He spoke of going to inspect the military situation and to talk with Gen. Pierre Boyer de la Tour, the French resident general.

But in view of the tense political

atmosphere, with debate on Moroccan policies in its second day before the National Assembly, there seemed little possibility a member of the government could go to Morocco without discussing the political situation.

Top Deputy
On the same plane with Billotte was Francois de Panafieu, the resident general's top deputy for civil affairs.

De Panafieu has been at odds with Boyer de la Tour and has been absent from Rabat more than a week.

The Assembly debate produced few developments. The future of the government was still uncertain. Backstage strategists were hard at work, some for and some against Faure.

With opposition to the Premier crystallized among the right wing parties of the assembly, his best hope seemed to be a promise from the Socialists to vote for him or at least to abstain on the Moroccan issue.

Vote Planned
To this end, Faure may decide not to make the issue a matter of confidence in his government. The original plan was to call such a vote Monday.

The Socialists never have supported Faure and would be almost bound to vote against him on a question of confidence.

RABAT, Morocco (AP)—France's resident general flew back from the battlefield to the political front Friday to face new and imperative pressure to get the Moroccan home rule reform program moving.

Gen. Pierre Boyer de la Tour left the fighting on the Rif frontier about as it was two days ago. Casualties are not high, but little progress seems being made against rebel Berber tribesmen.

Membership In 4-H Clubs Up 5 Per Cent

Membership in 4-H Clubs in Oregon has gone up almost 5 per cent since last year, reports Burton Hutton, state 4-H leader at Oregon State College. A 1,048-member increase pushed enrollment figures up to 26,537 girls and boys in clubs throughout the state.

Girls led boys 4 to 1 in the membership increase with 852 girls and 186 boys listed as first-year members. This makes a total of 16,891 girls and 9,646 boys in Oregon 4-H Clubs.

Hutton said that more and more members who have been in organization work for six years are staying active. Older member interest was exhibited last summer by a 109 increase in the number of members 16 years or older who attended 4-H summer school at OSC, Hutton said.

Adlai Terms Farm Problem 'Desperate'

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson said Friday night the nation's farm problem is a "desperately difficult one," and the present Republican policy of sliding or flexible supports "is not working."

"Instead of eliminating surpluses as advertised," Stevenson said, "it is eliminating farmers, as not advertised. After two or three years of heroics, ballyhoo and unprecedented applause from the Republican press, our past problems are all still with us, just as we Democrats foresaw."

"Extort subsidies, import quotas still sharply conflict with our declarations about freer world trade. There is still indefensible discrimination between different commodities, storable and perishable."

"And the burdensome surpluses are still burdening us. As a result the problem of controls, effective controls, still remains."

In a speech prepared for the Wisconsin State Democratic Convention Stevenson added:

"Yet the difficulties that now beset the farmer pose grave problems and also dangerous temptations. It will be tempting to us Democrats to say: 'Return the Democrats and the farm problem will be solved.' (And let me say, parenthetically, thank heaven it is a problem of too much instead of too little as it is in so much of the world where I have been.)"

"Well, let's leave that kind of talk to the Republicans. For such promises, or even more moderate ones, will do us no credit in the eyes of an awakened American farmer."

Grill Owner Quits to Join M & F Staff

Otto Roller, who has operated "The Grill" restaurant at 264 N. High St. for 19 years, is quitting the business and joining the Meier & Frank Co. as head cook for the restaurant to be located in its new store. It was announced Friday.

Roller will be re-joining the firm he left in 1936, when on a two-week vacation trip to Salem he bought a half-interest in the "Five and Ten Cent Grill" which later became simply "The Grill."

A few months later, he bought the other half interest and has operated the eatery since with his wife.

A Portland couple, Roller said, is negotiating with him for purchase of the site. The lease and restaurant equipment would be involved in the sale.

As head cook in the M & F restaurant, Roller will be assistant to Paul Edwards, chef, who comes here from Pasadena, Calif. The restaurant will be located on the store's first floor and seat 140.

NEW DELHI (AP)—About 100 persons Friday night were reported dead in floods in the three North Indian states of Punjab, Patiala and Delhi.

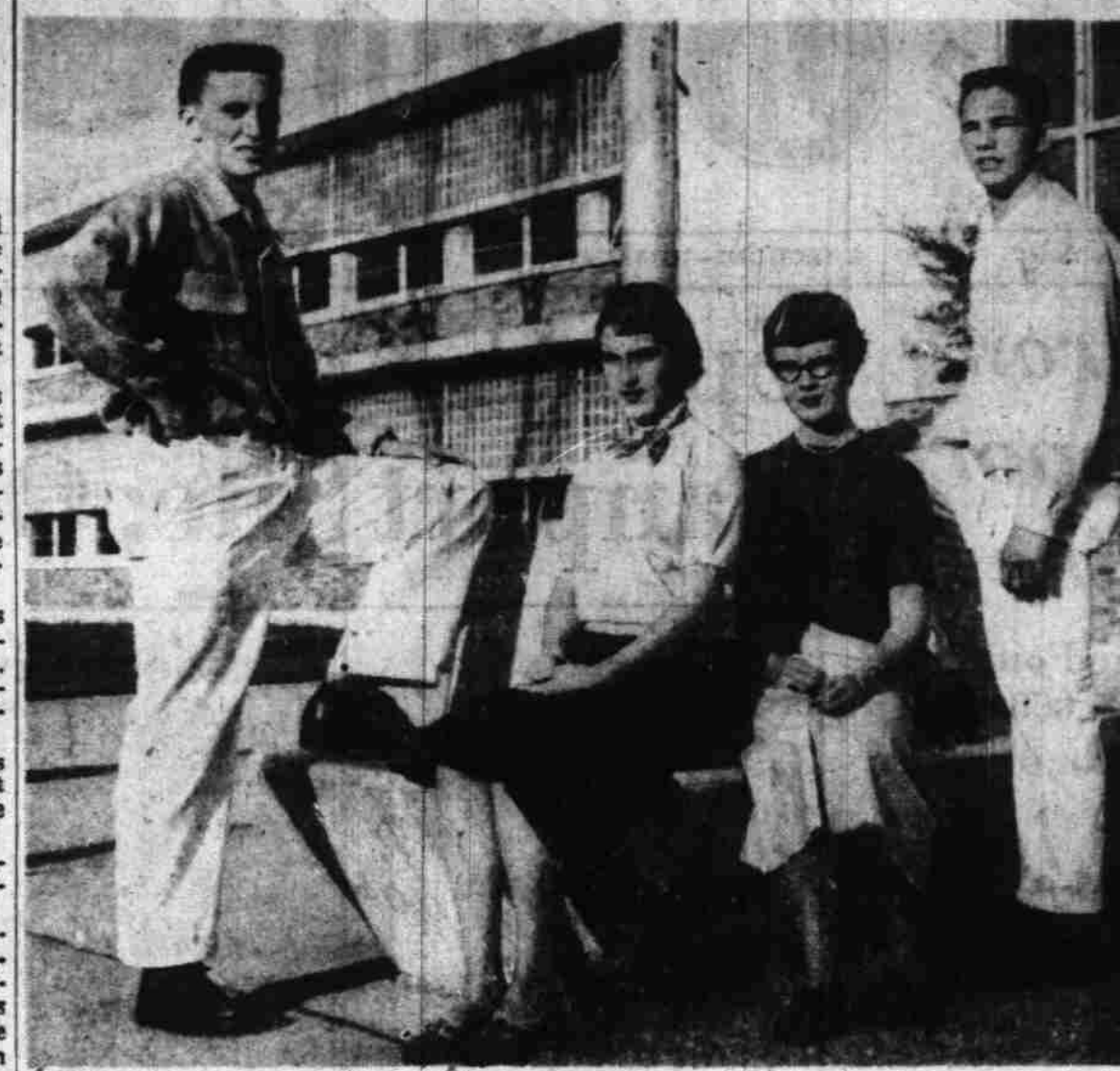

Law Probes Mythical Empire Created by Missing Financier

NEW YORK (AP)—A vanished financier was described Friday as having built a "mythical real estate empire" representing millions of dollars with only 5 per cent cash.

In addition, State Atty. Gen. Jacob K. Javits charged, the financier, Robert J. Morman, issued "hundreds of thousands of shares" of a real estate corporation he headed illegally by not being registered as required by state law.

Javits described Morman's involved financial manipulations in moving successfully to temporarily restrain the missing man and his New York Investors Mutual group from further activities in securities.

Morman, an impeccable dresser of about 50, disappeared from his Park Avenue digs about two weeks ago. That was when Manhattan Dist. Atty. Frank S. Hogan wanted to ask questions about a \$130,000 shortage in the Lawyers Mortgage and Title Co. Morman was a vice president and director of the firm.

Javits said Investors Mutual was losing money, but Morman sent dividend checks to some stockholders to make it look healthy. The money, it was alleged, came not from surplus accounts, the only legal source, but was charged off to expenses.

Using money obtained from the public, Morman "took over millions" in Manhattan real estate, Javits charged.

The attorney general said Morman apparently borrowed money to buy into Lawyers Mortgage, putting up the corporation's stock certificates as collateral.

Then, Javits said, Morman called in these genuine certificates, representing small blocs of shares, and replaced them with forged coupons for larger amounts.

Union Threatens Telephone Strike

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The CIO Communications Workers Union threatens to strike Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. at 8 a. m. Monday if agreement is not reached by then on a new labor contract.

Affected would be some 10,000 operators and 7,600 maintenance workers in Northern California and Nevada.

Both pamphlets are free at all postoffices and Gragg urges their use, especially during the coming Christmas season, to avoid delivery delay and damage to packages.

State Fund Apportioned To Counties

Quarterly apportionment to counties of state liquor privilege tax money and highway revenue and yearly apportionment of amusement device tax money was announced Friday by Earl T. Newberry, Secretary of State.

Marion County received \$197,594.38 this week from the three sources: Polk County, \$46,195.11; Yamhill County, \$69,069.73; and Linn, \$109,973.09.

Of highway revenue allocations, based on the number of motor vehicles registered in the county last year, Marion got \$181,722.26; Polk \$42,193.12; Yamhill, \$63,753.89; and Linn, \$101,778.57.

In liquor tax, distributed on the basis of population, Marion County got \$13,747.05; Polk, \$3,567.83; Yamhill, \$4,539.47; and Linn, \$7,363.82.

Of amusement tax money, distributed on the basis of the amount expended by each county in the year ended June 30, Marion County got \$2,080.07; Polk, \$434.16; Yamhill, \$803.37; and Linn, \$630.90.

Creighton Named To GOP Position

Salem attorney Charles Creighton has been appointed chairman of the Republican Yearbook sales committee, it was announced Friday by Sidney Schlesinger, Marion County Central Committee chairman.

The yearbook will be published in 1956 and become an annual publication, dealing with the history of the GOP in Oregon and the nation. It will describe state leaders and party workers as well.

Creighton will announce committee appointments later.
