Good Old Potato, Handy Food No Matter What Language It's Served

Dear old potatoes, or dear new ones, what would we do without them! But lots of folks go through life, eating plain mashed potatoes, or baked or fried ones, and think the world is very good.

They don't know what they are missing in the line of potatoes, else they'd be much more unhappy with a plain-potato existence and long for the unusual.

Take a potato soufflé, for instance, one that's seasoned nicely with onion and carrot, and has cottage cheese to help along. Or even simple recipes like baked potatoes with chives and parsley or boiled potatoes with dill. And then there are fancier recipes like chocolate potato torte to really throw you into a dither.

If you try the torte, don't tell until the compliments begin coming in.

CHOCOLATE POTATO TORTE

Cook potatoes until tender, mealy and dry; mash very thoroughly, and beat well; put through a sieve, then measure one cup. This is most conveniently done when preparing them for a meal. Add this hot, fresh, mashed potato to 1 1/2 cups sugar and 1/2 cup butter which have been previously creamed together. Beat well, and add a small portion of the dry ingredients, and 3/4 cup milk, to which have been added two beaten egg-yolks. At this stage the mixture can remain until after the meal is served, since the flour keeps the sugar and butter from curdling, and the potato is completely separated by addition of liquid, and therefore it cannot harden into lumps.

The dry ingredients consist of 2 cups of flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon grated nutmeg, 1/4 teaspoon allspice and 1/2 teaspoon salt, sifted together. After adding these, add 2 squares chocolate, broken into small pieces, and melted, and fold in the 2 stiff-beaten egg-whites. Pour into a greased torte pan and bake about 45 minutes in moderate oven (350 deg.). Turn from the torte pan, fill with sweetened whipped cream and serve at once. Since this keeps very well it can be made ahead of time, and steamed just a few minutes to reheat before serving.

Now that fresh dill is available, try this recipe:

BOILED POTATOES WITH DILL

Cut potatoes in long strips (about as for French fried) and boil or steam until ready to serve then pour over them a mixture of butter and about a teaspoon or so of chopped fresh dill.

Mashed potatoes are good with the addition of a generous amount of chives or parsley, or both.

Garlic lovers will love this flavorful combination: and they must first get a can of dried rosemary, unless they have fresh in the garden.

FRIED POTATOES WITH GARLIC AND ROSEMARY

3 raw potatoes 2 inch sprig Rosemary (or 1 teaspoon dried)
3 tablespoons olive oil Salt and pepper
3 large cloves garlic, minced

Peel and dry potatoes, slice medium thin. Heat oil, put in enough potatoes to cover bottom of skillet, wrap rest in damp towel to keep white and scatter other ingredients on top and stir. Cook quickly until browned on both sides, push to one side and fry more. Drain on a towel and serve very hot. Don't put too many potatoes at once and cook them quickly.

Potato puffs, potato soufflés, potato toppings are among the other ways to glamorize that most valuable of all vegetables.

Modern Etiquette

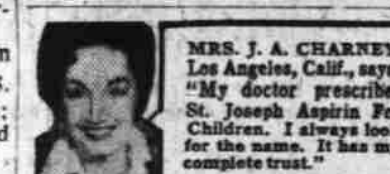
