## Jackson Stops Layne in 6th

DETROIT (AP) — Tireless Tommy Jackson, the New York hurricane, took Rex Layne's pile-driver rights for four rounds Friday night. Then he opened up and stopped the lanky Utah heavyweight on a badly cut right eye in the sixth round at Olympia Stadium. Layne weighed 202, Jackson 194½.

With blood gushing from a cut over Layne's right eye, Referee Lou Handley called a halt to the nationally televised bout at the 25 second mark of the round.

**Jackson Outclassed**

Badly outclassed through the first four sessions, Jackson answered the wild pleas from his corner and started firing away with both hands in the fifth.

The 23-year-old Negro hammered Layne from corner to corner, slicing his pudgy opponent over the eye. Layne was quite willing to fight back, even though his face was an ugly crimson mask.

Layne's corner did a quick patch job on the eye between rounds, covering the cut with cotton. But Jackson's first pop in the sixth opened it, and the red river started running again.

When the end came, Layne was ahead of the scorecards of two of the three officials. The Associated Press gave the one-time farm boy a solid margin in the first four rounds.

But Jackson's amazing stamina, which has worn down such fighters as Ezzard Charles, Jimmy Slade and Dan Bucceroni, proved the decisive factor in this struggle between two crude, but willing warriors.

## Amity Whips Chemawa, 27-7

## Oregon Rated As Underdogs

### Colorado Favored In Intersectional

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Hefty Colorado, hopeful of uncrowning Oklahoma as Big Seven football champion, is rated a 7- to 14-point favorite over Oregon in their intersectional game here Saturday.

The action, starting at 2 p. m. (PST), will be televised to California, Oregon and Washington by the Columbia Broadcasting System as the NCAA's regional game of the week.

The prospect of showers improved the outlook for the Buffaloes, victorious and unscathed upon in their two opening contests. Oregon's fast, shifty backs were expected to have trouble moving the ball against a Colorado line that averages 210 pounds per man.

**Defense Strong**

Colorado's defense has yielded only 160 yards on the ground in two games against Arizona and Kansas.

The Buffs' pass defense has been less effective but Oregon's aerial game has not been impressive in its three games.

Oregon shaded Utah, 14-13, in its opener, but then lost in Coast Conference play to Southern California, 42-15, and to Washington, 19-7.

Colorado supporters have been disappointed with their team's offensive showing. They are hopeful that Coach Dallas Ward's signaling attack will start clicking against the lighter, out-manned Oregonians.

**Salerno Big Tackle**

Behind a line anchored by 227-pound tackle Sam Salerno (No. 73), Ward will start a backfield featuring Homer Jenkins (10) and John Bayuk (30).

Tailback Jenkins, a speedy 170-pound senior, is Colorado's top runner and does most of the passing and kicking. Bayuk, 205, fullback, led the Big Seven in rushing last season with 824 yards in 145 carries.

Colorado switches to a T-formation when Dick Hyson (40), a sharp-passing sophomore quarterback, enters the game.

Colorado has defeated Arizona, 14-0, and Kansas, 12-0.

Quarterbacks Tom Crabtree (12) and Jack Crabtree (17), who are not related, direct Oregon's T-offensive. But most of the Ducks' yardage this season has been amassed by the running of halfbacks Dick James (24) and Jim Shanley (30) and fullback Jack Morris (40).

End Phil McHugh (84), James and Shanley have been Oregon's leading pass receivers.

## Irish Blank Miami 14 to 0

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Notre Dame's Fighting Irish, taking to the air for the first time this football season, rode Paul Hornung's passing arm to a 14-0 victory Friday night over a fumbling Miami team that couldn't cash in on its scoring opportunities.

Hornung's 11-yard shot to Eugene Kapish in the Hurricane end zone put Notre Dame in front in the first minute of the second period and the big Irish quarterback put on the clincher in the third with a 32-yard throw to swift Aubrey Lewis.

**Win Streak Ends**

A crowd of 75,685, the biggest ever crammed into the Orange Bowl, watched Notre Dame win its 11th straight game under youthful Coach Terry Brennan and score its third consecutive shutout this year. At the same time, the Irish cracked Miami's 10-game winning streak on its home field.

Penalties kept the score down as each team had a touchdown called back. In the second period, Miami's third string sophomore halfback, John Varone, sped 12 yards across the Notre Dame goal with a backfield-in-motion penalty nullified the score.

**Clipping Penalty**

In the fourth quarter, a clipping infraction cost Notre Dame's Jim Morse a touchdown on a brilliant 65-yard return of a stolen pass.

Hornung also was called back because of an illegal shift after he had broken away on a "keep" play for a 51-yard run from scrimmage in the third period. And early in the game, an offside penalty wiped out a 21-yard sprint by Miami's Jack Losch to the Notre Dame 18.

### Colts, Packers Play Tonight; Giants Meet Steelers Sunday

The Baltimore Colts and Green Bay Packers — of all teams — battle it out Saturday night for the Western Conference lead in the National Football League and that's just one indication of the goofy goings-on in pro football this season.

These two teams were the league doormats last year, but already this season both have knocked off the Detroit Lions, three-time Western Conference champions, and go into Saturday night's game tied with the Los Angeles Rams for the Western lead. Each team has won two games and lost none.

One big reason for the Colts' emergence is Alan (The Horse) Ameche, Wisconsin's All-American fullback of last season, who is as great a standout as a rookie pro as he was in college.

**Big Crowd Expected**

Saturday night marks his first pro appearance in Wisconsin and some 40,000 fans, a record for Milwaukee, are expected to watch him.

Los Angeles visits Detroit Sunday for a game that's all-important to Coach Buddy Parker's hopes. If Detroit can't win this one, its chances of retaining its division title will be very slim. The injuries that hampered the Lions in the first two games are just about cleared up while the Rams have Tank Younger, Don Paul and Charley Toongood out with injuries.

The third Western Division game finds the Chicago Bears and San Francisco 49ers in the unfamiliar position of looking for their first victory in three games at Chicago.

**Redskins on Top**

The Eastern Division standing is just as surprising with the Washington Redskins up on top for the first time in years and Cleveland's league champions trailing after two games.

Washington, which trounced Cleveland, then edged out the favored Philadelphia Eagles 31-30, seeks its third straight victory against the also-surprising Chicago Cardinals.

Cleveland's Browns and Philadelphia, the preseason favorites in the east, meet in Cleveland and the New York Giants go after their first victory in Pittsburgh.

Although light heavyweight Archie Moore was born and raised in this country, he gained his first reputation as a fighter in Australia.

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# Favored UCLA Nabs PCC Win

## Brown, Davenport Lead Ground Attack

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Heavily favored UCLA, with Sam Brown and Bob Davenport leading a crushing ground attack shut out Oregon State, 38-0, in a Pacific Coast Conference football game Friday night before 57,664 fans.

UCLA took advantage of three dismal punts and intercepted two passes to account for five touchdowns.

In a battle between two single wing teams, tailback Brown scored

## Knox Tries Passes

Highly publicized Ronnie Knox took UCLA into the air for the first serious attack above ground in the last eight minutes of the game. Against a weary and worn Beaver team he guided UCLA 56 yards in 13 plays, completing a touchdown throw of 11 yards to Doug Peters.

The final UCLA score came after Bob Enger, a third string back, snagged an Oregon State pass and ran it back 12 yards to the enemy 8. A moment later Doug Bradley pitched a touchdown to Pete O'Garra for two yards to end the wallowing.

Oregon State went into the game unbeaten, including an upset over Stanford, and unscored upon.

The game featured a friendly coaching rivalry between Red Sanders of UCLA and his former top assistant, Tommy Prothro.

**One Serious Threat**

Oregon State made one serious scoring threat. In the second quarter Joe Francis completed a pass to Bob de Grant for 43 yards to reach the Bruin 24.

Francis picked up two more yards to the 22, which was the closest the Beavers got to the goal all night. A holding penalty sent them back, and a moment later Bob Bergdahl, UCLA quarterback, intercepted a pass, returned it 40 yards and the Bruins roared on to score.

The Beaver miscues on their punts and passes cost them dearly. The scrappy Beavers soon became the sentimental favorite of the crowd. Bergdahl, after his pass interception and runback of 40 yards in the second quarter, fumbled. Oregon State recovered but a whistle had blown—and the crowd boomed lustily, believing the touting came too quickly.

The Beaver stand against superior material was game, and in the first half UCLA appeared more frustrated than fancy at stages.
