

'Coverup' Charged In Alleged Federal Power Selling Try

WASHINGTON (AP) — Assistant Secretary of Interior Fred G. Aandahl disclosed to House investigators Wednesday night there had been "several White House conferences" over this far unsuccessful government effort to sell public power to a Georgia private utility company.

The conferences, he indicated, were prior to delivery of a ruling by Attorney General Brownell last July 15 holding that the proposed action "flouts the congressional purpose" in disposition of federal power.

Girl's Return Halts Search

A 9-year-old mute girl missing five hours from her home in the Keizer district was found about 6:30 p.m. Wednesday peacefully returning from a long walk, but not before searching parties were being found.

Object of the hunt was Connie Holmes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne E. Holmes, 1965 Chemawa Road, State police, sheriff's officers and members of the Keizer Lions Club, Volunteer Fire Department, Boy Scout Troop 41 and Explorer Post 41 were joining the search with Keizer merchants before she was spotted on the edge of the community quietly returning to her home.

Her parents reported that she appeared unharmed and apparently had just taken a long walk. The girl can hear and understand although she cannot talk.

All Americans 'But 19' Free to Leave Red China

TOKYO (AP) — Peiping radio said Wednesday only 68 Americans remain in China and all but 19 accused of crimes are "free to leave China any time they apply for departure."

A broadcast said Red China "is now examining" the cases of the 19 "one-by one" according to Chinese legal procedure and will hand over results to Con O'Neill, British charge d'affaires in Peiping.

Peiping, quoting from the official Chinese Communist newspaper People's Daily, said none of the other 47 so far have asked for exit permits.

Under an agreement reached in talks at Geneva last month, Red China promised to release 22 detained Americans. The Reds also agreed to "expeditiously examine" the rights of the 19 to go home.

Fourteen of the 22 Americans have been released through Hong Kong.

Fire Kills 2 In Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — A mother and her 3-year-old daughter suffocated in a fire that damaged their home here Wednesday night.

Police identified them as Mrs. Eileen McCormack, 39, and her daughter, Sheila.

Firemen said both apparently awakened after the fire started, but were overcome by smoke before they could reach the door. Cause of the fire was not immediately determined.

Conservation Expert Dies In Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — Dr. Stanley G. Jewett, 70, who started as a bookkeeper but became one of the West's noted conservationists and wildlife experts, died at a hospital Wednesday.

He was stricken with a heart attack at his home here five days ago.

A biologist with the federal Fish and Wildlife Service for years, he was the author of two wildlife books, hundreds of articles and was the recipient of a number of honors from colleges and scientific organizations.

Untrained in biology, he was a bookkeeper in Portland when he began sending scores of birds and animals to the Biological Survey in Washington, D.C., for identification early in this century. Impressed, that organization hired him in 1910. He was sent first to Payette, Idaho.

He ranged over much of the western Hemisphere in succeeding years, although Oregon remained the base for his work.

Such disparate things as a lake in the Wallowa Mountains of Eastern Oregon and a desert flea are named for him.

Funeral services will be held here Friday.

Cars Collide On Wet Street

Two cars were damaged extensively in a head-on collision on wet pavement early Wednesday in the 2300 block State street, according to Salem police.

The drivers were listed as Paul Robert Bello, 1115 S. 22nd St., and John Wollard, 1047 Fir.

Wollard said his head and back hurt but refused first aid, according to officers. Otherwise there were no apparent injuries, they said.

Freighter Hauled From Mud Bank

ASTORIA (AP) — A tug and the steamer Portland pulled the freighter Hoprange from a shoal near the upper end of Puget Island, 30 miles east of here, Wednesday afternoon.

The vessel, from Newcastle-on-Tyne, was headed for the ocean with a cargo of barley for Rotterdam from Vancouver, Wash., when it went aground late Tuesday night.

No damage was expected because it settled in soft mud. But a survey was to be made at Astoria before it resumes its voyage.

Fremont Forest Closure Ended

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon's last forest closure was ordered lifted Wednesday.

The Summer Lake Rim on the Fremont National Forest was opened Thursday by proclamation of the governor, Don Stickney, information officer of the U.S. Forest Service's regional office here, announced. He said rain in the area has eased the fire danger.

Stickney also reported that through Tuesday, only four hundred-caused fires had occurred in the Fremont forest and only one of these had covered as much as one acre.

Home-Made Tractor Kills Sandy Resident

SANDY (AP) — A home-made tractor struck a root and overturned Wednesday, killing Arnold Blaser, 79, on a lot near his home here. His son, Jack, said his father was using the machine to pull a log free from underbrush when the accident happened.

Poland Raises Threat in Bid For U.N. Post

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Poland's Juliusz Katz-Suchy warned Wednesday the budding spirit of international cooperation will be seriously harmed if Poland loses its bid for the U.N. Security Council.

U.S. Chief Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., who is backing the Philippines against Poland for the seat held by Turkey, promptly countered that Poland is not fit for the Security Council.

"Communist Poland is clearly not a nation which has contributed to international peace and security within the meaning of the charter or which is in a position to do so," Lodge said in a statement distributed after Katz-Suchy held a news conference in the U.N.

Katz-Suchy said Poland has all the necessary qualifications and represents Eastern Europe far more than the Philippines. Under questioning, he said failure to elect Poland would have an effect on cooperation in general, would harm the spirit of Geneva, and would be strongly resented by the Polish people.

These statements pointed up sharply the battle raging between two Geneva partners, the United States and the Soviet Union, on behalf of their favorite candidates. The Soviet Union is the only Communist country on the council.

Drifting Barge Towed to Port

ASTORIA (AP) — A derelict 75-foot barge was in port here Wednesday after being towed in from the ocean by the Coast Guard cutter Yocoma.

The barge broke loose in heavy seas Sunday from the motorship Tanginn, the cutter, directed by a search plane from the Coast Guard's Port Angeles, Wash., station, located the barge and put a line on it.

Monday the tug Salt Air, also abandoned by the Tanginn during a storm Sunday, was towed into Coos Bay by the cutter Bonham. The tug's four crewmen were not injured.

The Tanginn, the Salt Air and the barge, with a partial load of lumber, were en route from Vancouver, B.C., to San Diego, when the tug developed pump trouble Saturday. The next day the tow line to the barge snapped.

The Yocoma tried to get the barge to Coos Bay but could not cross the rough bar. It then proceeded to Astoria. Meanwhile, the motorship continued south to San Diego.

Scuffle for Gun Kills Man Near Klamath Falls

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) — Jason Charles, 50, farm worker, was shot fatally at Long Pine, 40 miles northeast of Klamath Falls Wednesday.

Police arrested George Dumont, 54, and said he told of a scuffle in which Charles was shot.

State policeman Dick Finnell and sheriff's deputy Alvie Youngblood said Dumont told them the argument was over whether to go deer hunting. The policemen quoted Dumont as saying Charles tried to shoot him, but he managed to wrest away the rifle. Charles was wounded in the stomach.

He was brought to a hospital here where he died at 10 p.m.

Death Claims Rev. Bates, 75

The Rev. Arthur C. Bates, 75, retired minister of the Christian Church at Mill City and Silverton, died Wednesday in a Salem hospital after a short illness.

He and Mrs. Bates had lived in Salem at 838 Rosemont Ave. since his retirement a year ago.

The Rev. Mr. Bates was minister of the Christian Church at Smithfield before moving to Mill City where he built the church in 1925. Later he served at Klamath Falls and moved to Silverton eight years ago. He also served as a state evangelist three years.

He was born in Eugene April 19, 1880. He and Flora Byers were married at Junction City Oct. 29, 1905. He and Fern Duvivier Bailey were married in Mill City Nov. 12, 1930.

Since his retirement, the Rev. Bates was a member of the First Christian Church in Salem.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Fern Bates, Salem; son, Arthur Harold Bates, Japan; daughter, Mrs. Iris Stephens, Klamath Falls; stepson, Marvin Bailey, Redding, Calif.; two half-brothers, E. L. Landers, Salem, and Loma F. Field, Newberg, and four grandchildren.

Services await word from the son in Japan at the Howell-Edwards Funeral Home.
